‘Destination Ladakh’ logo unveiled, gives new visual identity to UT Tourism

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of the Union Territory of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, on December 18 unveiled the “Destination Ladakh” logo, marking a significant step toward strengthening Ladakh’s tourism identity through a unified and meaningful visual representation.

The new logo has been designed by Team Stringmo, a young collective of artists from Kargil, and introduced by the Department of Tourism, Ladakh as part of the UT Administration’s efforts to position Ladakh prominently on the global tourism map.

The ‘Destination Ladakh’ logo presents a distinctive visual identity deeply rooted in the region’s authenticity, cultural richness and unique sense of place. It draws inspiration from Ladakh’s pristine landscapes, ancient traditions, spiritual her-

itage and the resilient way of life of its people.

Explaining the conceptualisation and design process, members of Team Stringmo elaborated on the cultural symbolism, artistic elements and visual philosophy behind the logo. They said the design aims to project Ladakh as a responsible, authentic and globally appealing destination, while remaining firmly grounded in traditional values and ecological sensitivity.

Team Stringmo explained that the logo features the Bhoti letter “La” at its centre, chosen for both its linguistic relevance and deep symbolic meaning. In the Ladakhi language, La means “pass,” an element intrinsic to the region’s geography, mobility and identity. The name Ladakh itself originates from La, reflecting the importance

of mountain passes that have historically served as routes of trade, cultural exchange, migration and resilience.

Kaneez Fatima, Team Leader, Stringmo, said the use of La represents a unifying motif that transcends regional distinctions, sectarian lines and cultural variations across Ladakh, symbolising shared heritage and continuity.

She further explained that the logo’s colour palette, dominated by a deep red hue, carries historical significance as Ladakh was traditionally known as Maryul, meaning the “Red Land,” derived from the reddish tones of its mountains and terrain. Rendered in a bold yet graceful brushstroke, the design evokes Ladakh’s natural textures and geological formations. The colour red also conveys warmth, vibrancy and the spirited hospitality of Ladakhi people, serving as a timeless and culturally neutral visual anchor.

Beyond its aesthetic appeal, the logo encapsulates the narrative of a people who have endured, adapted and flourished in one of the world’s harshest environments. The organic brushstroke reflects generations who crossed high passes for livelihoods, traders who traversed historic routes, and communities that have safeguarded their land over centuries. The visual language also subtly pays tribute to Ladakh’s patriotic legacy and its contribution to national

Ladakh digitises land records; LG Kavinder Gupta launches web GIS portal

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta launched the Ladakh Land Records Web GIS Portal (<https://landrecords.ladakh.gov.in>) on December 29, developed by the Revenue Department, marking a significant milestone in the Union Territory’s journey towards transparent, efficient, and technology-driven governance.

Addressing the gathering, the Lt Governor said that digitisation of land records is a cornerstone of good governance, as clear, updated, and authentic records protect citizens’ rights and support effective development planning and policy-making. He emphasised that Ladakh is modernising land records through advanced technology to ensure direct benefits to the public.

Kavinder Gupta expressed satisfaction that land records for revenue villages in Ladakh are being brought onto a digital platform in a phased manner. He said the initiative would reduce the need for frequent visits to government offices, enhance transparency, minimise land disputes, and strengthen public trust in the administration. He also highlighted that modern survey techniques are being used to accurately capture actual land conditions—crucial for Ladakh’s

geographically challenging terrain.

The Lt Governor noted that the initiative aligns with Prime Minister Narendra Modi’s vision of Digital India, Ease of Living, and Inclusive Development, ensuring that even remote and border areas receive robust digital infrastructure and citizen-centric services.

“Making the administration responsive and efficient through technology is the government’s priority,” he said.

Quoting former Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, Kavinder Gupta said good governance rests on transparency, accountability, protection of citizens’ rights, and sensitivity to public needs. He added that initiatives such as digital land records and transparent recruitment systems are living examples of re-

sponsive, future-ready governance.

The Lt Governor congratulated Chief Secretary Dr. Pawan Kotwal, the Revenue Department, district administrations, and all officials involved, expressing confidence that the portal would prove user-friendly, reliable, and effective. He reaffirmed that such visionary, technology-driven initiatives would establish Ladakh as a model of good governance based on trust, transparency, and accountability.

Speaking on the occasion, Joint Secretary, Department of Land Resources, Government of India, Kunal Satyarthi, praised the UT Administration for the achievement, noting that only a few states have reached this level of digital advancement. He also informed about

NAKSHA (National Geospatial Knowledge-based Land Survey of Urban Habitations), a one-year pilot project under the Digital India Land Records Modernisation Programme (DILRMP), and invited Ladakh to participate.

Chief Secretary Dr. Pawan Kotwal highlighted the universal importance of land records and detailed ongoing digitisation efforts under SVAMITVA and DILRMP as per Government of India guidelines. He stated that documents issued through the portal are legally valid and can be used for purposes such as bank loans, adding that efforts are underway to achieve saturation of digital land records across the UT. Assistant Commissioner Revenue, Leh, Shabbir Hussain, informed that citizens can access 18 land record-related services through the portal and demonstrated the simple and transparent online process for applying for fard intikhab.

The event was attended by Executive Councillor LAHDC Kargil Kacho Mohd Feroz, Principal Secretary Sanjeev Khirwar, Administrative Secretaries Shashanka Ala, Bhanu Prabha, Moses Kunzang, Special Secretary (Law) Qureshi Tariq Mahmood, Deputy Commissioners Romil Singh Donk (Leh) and Rakesh Kumar (Kargil), along with senior officers, tehsildars, NIC officials, and other dignitaries.

LEH: A delegation led by Councillor Cha Stanzin Lakpa met Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, on December 27 at the Lieutenant Governor’s Secretariat.

and early operationalisation of the newly announced districts in a time-bound manner so that residents can begin receiving tangible administrative and developmental benefits.

The delegation expressed gratitude to the Union Territory Administration for announcing the creation of five new districts—Changthang, Zaskar, Nubra, Sham and Drass. They also urged the administration to ensure the formal notification

Members of the delegation highlighted the severe challenges faced by people in these regions due to vast distances, harsh climatic conditions, and limited administrative outreach. They stressed that the establishment of full-fledged

districts would strengthen grassroots governance, improve public service delivery, enhance disaster response mechanisms, and promote inclusive development, while safeguarding Ladakh’s unique cultural and ecological identity. Responding to the delegation, Lieutenant Governor Kavinder Gupta said that the UT Administration is fully committed to fulfilling the aspirations of the people of Ladakh. He informed that necessary steps are being taken to put in place the required administrative, infrastructural, and human resource frameworks for the smooth implementation of the new districts.

The Lieutenant Governor stated that the Central Government, under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, remains firmly committed to the holistic and equitable development of the Union Territory of Ladakh, with special sensitivity towards the needs of people

living in remote and border areas. The decision to create five new districts, he said, reflects the Centre’s resolve to strengthen decentralised governance, improve service delivery, and ensure inclusive growth, while preserving Ladakh’s distinct cultural, social, and ecological heritage.

Reiterating the significance of the move, Kavinder Gupta said that the creation of the five new districts marks a historic step towards decentralised administration, equitable development, and administrative justice for people living in far-flung areas of Ladakh. The long-awaited decision is expected to bring governance closer to the people, enhance access to essential services, and address long-standing developmental imbalances in the region’s challenging terrain.

He further emphasised that stakeholder consultations will continue to ensure that the transition remains people-centric and responsive to local needs.

LG Kavinder Gupta visits Sangam point, stresses sustainable tourism in Ladakh

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta visited the Sangam Point on December 28, one of Ladakh’s most prominent tourist destinations, located about 35 kilometres from Leh on the Srinagar–Leh National Highway. The site marks the spectacular confluence of the Indus and Zaskar rivers and is globally renowned for the striking visual contrast of the blue waters of the Indus merging with the muddy green-brown waters of the Zaskar, forming a single majestic river.

During the visit, the Lieutenant Governor highlighted Sangam Point’s growing importance

as a hub for adventure tourism, offering activities such as river rafting, trekking, and sightseeing, while serving as a key stopover for travellers on the Srinagar–Leh route. He noted that its proximity to Leh enhances its role in Ladakh’s overall tourism circuit.

Emphasising visitor comfort and experience, the LG called for the development of dedicated viewpoints and cafeterias at the site. He also stressed the need to maintain cleanliness and environmental sustainability to preserve Ladakh’s pristine natural beauty for future generations.

Kavinder Gupta reiterated that tourism is a major pillar of Ladakh’s economic growth, contributing significantly to local livelihoods and allied sectors such as hospitality, transport, handicrafts, and eco-tourism. He underlined the importance of promoting responsible and sustainable tourism to protect Ladakh’s fragile ecosystem while ensuring long-term, inclusive development.

The Lieutenant Governor stated that since Ladakh became a Union Territory, accelerated development has taken place across key sectors, with tourism receiving special focus. The UT Administration, he said, is working towards the holistic development of existing and potential tourist destinations through improved infrastructure, connectivity, and visitor facilities.

Highlighting future connectivity, he said the Zoji La Tunnel, expected to be completed within the next two years, will be a game changer by providing year-round all-weather road access to Ladakh. The tunnel is expected to boost tourism by reducing travel time and enabling uninterrupted access during winter.

Stressing the importance of winter tourism, the LG said efforts are underway to promote winter sports, cultural events, and experiential tourism to attract visitors throughout the year and generate sustained employment.

He further reaffirmed the UT Administration’s commitment to developing world-class tourism infrastructure while maintaining ecological balance. Calling for coordinated efforts, he urged officials and stakeholders to focus on community-driven, eco-friendly tourism initiatives.

During the visit, the Lieutenant Governor also interacted with tourists from different parts of the country, receiving first-hand feedback on their experiences. Welcoming them to Ladakh, he assured them of the administration’s commitment to providing safe, comfortable, and memorable travel experiences.

Appealing to people across the country, Kavinder Gupta invited tourists to explore Ladakh’s breathtaking landscapes and rich cultural heritage, reaffirming that the Union Territory is steadily progressing towards becoming a globally recognised destination for sustainable and responsible tourism.

Operation Sadbhavana: 10 KVA solar power plant inaugurated at Khakted village in Changthang

LEH: Under Operation Sadbhavana, a 10 KVA solar power

plant was constructed and formally handed over to Kha-

kted village in the Changthang region of Ladakh on December 24. The initiative was undertaken by the Indian Army in close collaboration with the civil administration, reinforcing efforts to promote sustainable development in remote border areas.

The solar power project aims to enhance access to reliable electricity for the villagers while supporting clean and renewable energy solutions. Through such sustainable initiatives, the Indian Army continues to empower local communities, improve access to essential services, and strengthen the spirit of nation-building in strategically important and remote regions.

On the occasion, former Councillor Konchok Stanzin expressed gratitude to the Trishul Division of 14 Corps for upgrading the existing solar power infrastructure by adding an additional 10 KVA capacity. The plant was handed over to the villagers in the presence of the village head (Nambardar) and other local representatives.

He said that such initiatives not only address critical local needs but also further strengthen civil-military relations, fostering mutual trust and cooperation between the Army and the local population.

LG Kavinder inaugurates ₹25.9-crore 3 Tesla MRI facility in Kargil

KARGIL: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, on December 24 inaugurated a state-of-the-art 3 Tesla MRI facility at the District Hospital Kargil, marking a major milestone in strengthening advanced healthcare services in the remote Himalayan region.

Addressing the gathering, the Lt Governor said the new facility ensures that people living in remote, hilly and border areas will no longer be deprived of world-class diagnostic services despite challenging geographical and climatic conditions. He emphasised that geographical remoteness is no longer a barrier to accessing quality medical care in Ladakh.

The advanced MRI facility was dedicated to the people of Kargil in the presence of CEC LAHDC Kargil Dr. Jaffer Akhoon; Member of Parliament Mohd Hanifa Jan; Executive Councillors of LAHDC Kargil; Chief Secretary Dr. Pawan Kotwal; Principal Secretary Sanjeev Khirwar; Deputy Commissioner Rakesh Kumar; SSP Nitin Yadav; Director Health Services Dr. Tashi Thinles; Chairman Haj Committee Ali Majaz, senior officers, religious heads, medical staff and students.

LG Kavinder Gupta said the installation of cutting-edge diagnostic technology reflects the government’s firm commitment to equitable and quality healthcare and represents a significant step toward strengthening the public health system in Ladakh.

Highlighting Ladakh’s difficult terrain, harsh climate and long winters, he noted that healthcare delivery had historically faced serious challenges. However, he expressed satisfaction over the progress made in recent years, stating that sustained infrastructure development and policy focus have transformed healthcare access across the UT.

Referring to reforms under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the Lt Governor recalled India’s resilient response during the COVID-19 pandemic through rapid infrastructure expansion, modern technology and the tireless efforts of healthcare workers. He said the same national vision is now benefiting remote regions like Ladakh.

The Lt Governor said the 3 Tesla MRI will enable faster and more accurate diagnosis of complex diseases. Earlier, patients from Kargil were compelled to travel to Srinagar, Jammu, Chandigarh or Delhi for advanced investigations, resulting in financial strain, time loss and mental stress. With this facility available locally, patients and their families will receive significant relief and renewed confidence in district-level healthcare services.

He also highlighted the continuous strengthening of healthcare infrastructure across the UT, including District Hospitals, Community Health Centres (CHCs),

Primary Health Centres (PHCs) and Ayushman Arogya Mandirs, aimed at improving accessibility, preventive care and early diagnosis.

Providing details of ongoing projects, the Lt Governor informed that a proposal to enhance the bed capacity of District Hospital Kargil from 100 to 200 beds has been submitted to the Government of India and approval is expected soon. Construction of a new hospital block to expand capacity to 300 beds at a cost of ₹61 crore is underway. He added that Doctors’ Quarters, Staff Quarters and Class-IV employees’ quarters are nearing completion, along with an Administrative Block and a TB Hospital. The ₹81-crore CHC Zaskar project is currently under tendering.

LG Kavinder Gupta noted that Ladakh allocates nearly 8.76 percent of its total budget to the health sector—higher than the national average. He reiterated the administration’s commitment to universal healthcare through Ayushman Bharat and initiatives to strengthen medical education, including the approval of a new Medical College in the UT.

Congratulating the Health Department and all stakeholders, the Lt Governor urged effective utilization of the MRI facility to benefit all sections of society, particularly the poor and residents of far-flung areas. He expressed confidence that the facility would significantly enhance timely diagnosis and help save valuable lives.


CEC LAHDC Kargil Dr. Jaffer Akhoon, speaking on the occasion, congratulated the people of Kargil on the installation of the state-of-the-art MRI facility, calling it a landmark achievement in regional healthcare. He thanked the Lieutenant Governor and Chief Secretary for their support and recalled the pivotal role played by former LG Dr. Brig. B.D. Mishra in developing modern infrastructure at the hospital.

Dr. Akhoon said the new MRI facility will provide world-class diagnostic services free of cost at the doorstep of Kargil residents, especially benefiting marginalized communities who previously had to travel long distances. He highlighted several healthcare initiatives undertaken under his chairmanship, including CSR procurement of a ₹9-crore CT scan for CHC Sankoo through Power Grid.

He urged the administration to address shortages of super-specialists such as cardiologists, urologists and nephrologists, provide short-term ultrasound training to local MBBS doctors in J&K hospitals, and ensure emergency first-aid services for Kargil residents in Jammu. He also appealed for support to upgrade the AMT School into a Nursing College.

Chief Secretary Dr. Pawan Kotwal termed the inauguration of the 3 Tesla MRI facility a significant milestone for Kargil, stating that advanced medical infrastructure ensures timely and accurate diagnosis, reduces patient burden and reflects the UT administration’s commitment to quality healthcare delivery in remote and challenging areas.

Earlier, Medical Superintendent Dr. Mohammad Abbas delivered the welcome address and described the 3 Tesla MRI as a giant leap for diagnostics in Kargil. He said the facility would greatly benefit economically weaker patients by sparing them the cost and hardship of external investigations, while improving treatment outcomes.

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, on December 17 inaugurated the ‘Celebrate Ladakh’ Tourism Calendar, prepared by the Department of Tourism, UT Ladakh, marking a significant step towards strengthening Ladakh’s cultural branding and promoting year-round tourism in the Union Territory. On the occasion, the UT Administration also announced the declaration of nine UT-Level Festivals, aimed at creating a structured and globally recognisable tourism identity for Ladakh.

Secretary, Tourism, Sanjit Rodrigues, stated that while Ladakh hosts over seventy festivals across districts and seasons, the lack of a clearly defined festival hierarchy has led to fragmented branding, limited national visibility, and inconsistent promotion. To address this, the Department of Tourism has identified nine high-impact festivals to be designated as UT-Level Festivals, with

locations and dates fixed for the next three years. The selection is based on cultural significance, tourism potential, geographic spread, economic impact, and alignment with national and international tourism calendars.

The nine UT-Level Festivals include:

- Apricot Blossom Festival
- Ladakh Astro Week
- Changthang Nomadic Festival
- Suru Summer Festival
- Zanskar Festival
- Ladakh Festival
- Himalayan Film Festival
- Ladakh Bike Week
- Ethnic Food Festival

Director, Tourism, Tsering Paldan, said the initiative will enable tour operators, travel platforms, media partners, and airlines to promote Ladakh more effectively as a year-round tourism destination through predictable and well-publicised events. He added that two flagship festivals—the Ladakh Festival in Leh and the Suru Summer Festival in Kargil—have been proposed for national-level promotion under the Ministry of Tourism’s “Two Festivals per State” scheme, with partial central support to maximise visibility and tourist inflow.

“While these nine festivals will receive priority branding, marketing support, and coordinated resource allocation, all other local and regional festivals—approximately seventy—will continue to be celebrated according to community traditions and district-level planning,” he said.

Festivals such as the Zanskar Festival, Changthang Nomadic Festival, and Himalayan Film Festival will be organised in close coordination with the Departments of Culture and Information, ensuring unified branding under the “Ladakh Tourism” identity

while respecting departmental mandates.

The declaration of fixed festival dates for three years is expected to significantly enhance inter-departmental coordination, enable timely promotional campaigns, and eliminate challenges arising from ad-hoc scheduling. By prioritising these UT-Level Festivals, the UT Administration aims to strengthen Ladakh’s cultural appeal, attract domestic and international tourists, and generate sustained economic opportunities for local communities.

Through the launch of the ‘Celebrate Ladakh’ Calendar and the structured festival framework, Ladakh has taken a decisive step towards harmonising its rich cultural traditions with strategic tourism promotion, reinforcing its position as a premier destination for culture, adventure, gastronomy, and sustainable tourism.

Royal Enfield expands Learn to Play Ice Hockey programme to 23 villages in Ladakh

Over 800 children to receive structured skating and ice hockey training during the winter season

LEH: Royal Enfield Social Mission is set to roll out the Learn to Play (LTP) Coaching Programme 2025–26 in Ladakh, reaffirming its commitment to grassroots ice hockey development in the region. A key intervention under Royal Enfield Ice Hockey Season 3, the programme will engage over 800 children aged 6 to 15 years across 23 villages, marking a significant expansion from

10 villages last year and strengthening early access to structured skating and ice hockey training.

Designed as a season-long engagement, the Learn to Play programme commenced in November 2025 with a Basic Coaches Training Camp led by Coach Darryl Easson in Dehradun and will conclude in March 2026. During the peak winter months, structured 8-day

coaching modules will be delivered across participating villages. The programme will be led by 24 trained local coaches, many of whom have progressed through Royal Enfield-supported Train-the-Trainer initiatives, ensuring a consistent coaching framework and community-led implementation.

The curriculum focuses on skating basics and ice hockey fundamentals, with an emphasis on balance, coordination, confidence, and enjoyment of the sport. Alongside physical skills, the programme encourages values such as teamwork, discipline, and resilience, positioning sport as a meaningful part of everyday winter life in Ladakh.

Building on the success of earlier editions, the 2025–26 programme expands its footprint to 23 villages across Nyoma, Durbuk, Kargil, Nubra, Zanskar, Khaltse, and Leh blocks. Preparatory work

is already underway, including coordination with village representatives, equipment planning, and scheduling aligned to local winter conditions to ensure smooth execution throughout the season.

Aligned with the Blueprint for Himalayan Ice Hockey Development, the Learn to Play programme forms the foundation of Royal Enfield’s grassroots-led approach to the sport. It creates a clear pathway from early participation to advanced coaching, officiating, and competitive platforms such as the Royal Enfield Ice Hockey League (REIHL) in Ladakh and the Spiti Cup powered by Royal Enfield in Himachal Pradesh. By delivering quality coaching and structured training from the basics, the programme plays a critical role in building a strong talent pool aligned with the long-term vision of the 2042 Winter Olympics, strengthening the region’s ice hockey pipeline.

Through sustained grassroots interventions such as the Learn to Play Coaching Programme, along with support from the Leh Nutrition Project and Lalok Winter Sports Club, Royal Enfield continues to advance its Social Mission of supporting Himalayan communities through sport—expanding access for children, strengthening village-level ecosystems, and contributing to Ladakh’s growing identity as a hub for winter sports. Further strengthening this community-led development of ice hockey, Royal Enfield Social Mission is supporting the inaugural Himalayan Pond Hockey Championship at Gupuks Lake, near Leh, from 8–16 January 2026. The programme will include Learn to Play training for 80 children during the first six days, culminating in a fun, carnival-style competition featuring a 32-team 3v3, non-contact, mixed age and gender knock-out format, along with community-led engagements.

Bhoti textbook training for Foundational classes launched at DIET Leh

The objective of the programme is to orient teachers with the newly developed Bhoti textbooks for Nursery, LKG, UKG, and Classes I and II, and to strengthen pedagogical

practices at the foundational and primary levels in line with the National Curriculum Framework for the Foundational Stage (NCF-FS) and the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020.

The training is being conducted by Bhoti Resource Persons including Venerable Stanzin Norbu, Dr. Lotos Rabgaia, and Tundup Namgail, who are providing academic and pedagogical guidance to the

participants.

A total of 91 teachers from three educational zones—Nubra, Durbuk, and Nyoma—are participating in the programme. The initiative aims to ensure the effective classroom implementation of the newly framed Bhoti textbooks and to promote mother tongue-based education in Government schools across the Union Territory of Ladakh.

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, on December 17 launched streamlined Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for the procurement of satellite phones for tourism purposes, marking a major milestone in strengthening tourist safety and advancing Ladakh’s adventure tourism ecosystem.

Ladakh, globally recognised for its remote landscapes, high-altitude adventure tourism, mountaineering expeditions, and off-grid travel experiences, has long faced communication challenges in areas with limited or no mobile connectivity. The operationalisation of satellite phone services for tourism addresses these challenges, benefiting tourists, tour operators, and emergency response agencies alike.

Secretary, Tourism, Sanjit Rodrigues, informed that in 2022, the Ministry of

Defence, Government of India, permitted the use of satellite phones for tourism purposes by tour operators in Ladakh, recognising the region’s unique geographical and operational realities. Following this decision, the Department of Tourism, UT Ladakh, proactively facilitated the operationalisation of satellite phone usage for the tourism sector.

Director, Tourism, Tsering Paldan, stated that the Department coordinated closely with BSNL, Leh, to develop a clear, secure, and practical mechanism for procurement, ensuring full compliance with national security and telecommunications guidelines.

“These continuous efforts and detailed consultations culminated in the issuance of a comprehensive SOP by BSNL on December 17, 2025, governing the procurement of satellite

phones by private tour operators,” said Director Paldan.

With the new SOP, tour operators can now directly approach BSNL, Leh, and procure satellite phones through an approved, transparent, and streamlined process, enabling timely access to reliable communication tools in remote and high-risk areas.

This landmark initiative represents a first-of-its-kind measure for Ladakh’s tourism industry, significantly enhancing preparedness, safety standards, and operational confidence for adventure tourism activities. The availability of satellite phones is expected to improve emergency communication, strengthen rescue coordination, and reinforce Ladakh’s position as a responsible, safe, and globally competitive adventure tourism destination.

L-G Kavinder Gupta hails transparent recruitment, launches online domicile portal in Leh

NEW DELHI: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, handed over selection letters to provisionally selected candidates who appeared in the recent matriculation-level examinations conducted by the Ladakh Subordinate Services Staff Selection Board (LSSSSB) at the District Panchayat Resource Centre, Leh, on December 29. On the occasion, he also launched the Online Ladakh Domicile Certificate Portal, marking a significant milestone in advancing digital governance and youth empowerment in the Union Territory.

The Lt Governor highlighted the time-bound and transparent recruitment process undertaken by the Union Territory Administration through LSSSSB, noting that the declaration of examination results within just 48 hours reflected strong institutional systems and administrative efficiency.

He said the achievement has set a national benchmark and demonstrated that even remote and border regions like Ladakh can successfully adopt best-in-class administrative practices with clear intent and robust governance mechanisms.

Emphasising the values of public service, Kavinder Gupta said government service is a responsibility towards the people and not merely an employment opportunity. He urged the newly selected candidates to uphold the highest standards of integrity, discipline, and professionalism, and to adopt a citizen-first approach. He expressed confidence that the new appointees would contribute meaningfully to good governance, administrative efficiency, and nation-building in Ladakh.

Highlighting the performance of the Ladakh Subordinate Services Staff Selection Board, the Lt Governor said the Board, constituted in 2024, was established with the objective of creating a robust, transparent, and credible recruitment system. He expressed satisfaction that the Board successfully completed its first recruitment process in a fair, transparent, and time-bound manner—from the issuance of advertisements to the conduct of examinations, declaration of results, and final selection.

Referring to the launch of the Online Ladakh Domicile Certificate Portal (<https://domicile.ladakh.gov.in>), Kavinder Gupta said the initiative would

simplify procedures, reduce delays, and eliminate unnecessary visits to government offices. He added that the portal would enhance transparency, efficiency, and trust between the administration and citizens, and would be particularly beneficial for Ladakh given its challenging geographical conditions.

The Lt Governor emphasised that several central government flagship programmes, including Digital India, Smart City Mission, AMRUT, Housing for All, and infrastructure development initiatives launched under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, have accelerated development, attracted investment, and generated employment across various sectors. He specifically mentioned free LPG connections under the Ujjwala Scheme, rural and urban housing under PMAY, Har Ghar Nal Se Jal, and the mission-mode construction of roads and highways, which have transformed the country’s development trajectory while strengthening national connectivity and defence preparedness.

Former CEC LAHDC Leh meets Union Minister Kiren Rijiju, raises key development issues

NEW DELHI: Former CEC, LAHDC Leh, Adv. Tashi Gyalson called on Union Cabinet Minister for Parliamentary Affairs and Minority Affairs, Kiren Rijiju, on December 22, and discussed several key issues related to infrastructure development and administrative matters concerning UT Ladakh.

During the meeting, Adv. He highlighted ongoing approved projects, including the construction of 200-seater Computer-Based Test (CBT) centres at Leh and Kargil, with project costs of ₹7.00 crore and ₹7.50 crore, respectively. He informed that these projects are nearing completion and are expected to be operational in the coming financial year.

Emphasising the importance of the initiative, Adv. Gyalson said the CBT centres would significantly benefit students by facilitating the conduct of major competitive examinations using a common question paper, thereby resolving the long-standing issue of multiple paper sets caused by inadequate examination infrastructure in the region.

He also urged the Union Minister to expedite approval of proposals already submitted under the PMJVK scheme, while informing him that additional development proposals are likely to be submitted in the future.


In addition, Adv. Gyalson sought the Minister’s intervention regarding the transfer of arts, artefacts, and archival materials, which, despite the bifurcation of the erstwhile state into two Union

These initiatives aim to inspire positive inner transformation, promote ethical values, and contribute to the creation of a more compassionate and harmonious society.

Q. With rapid development in road connectivity, Zanskar is witnessing economic growth. At the same time, what changes and concerns do you foresee for its culture and heritage?

If we look back 10 to 15 years, the people of Zanskar faced immense hardships due to poor road connectivity, especially during the winter months. Travelling to Leh was extremely difficult, and I personally remember the struggles and risks involved in such journeys. However, over the last four to five years, there has been remarkable improvement in road and telecom connectivity, which has significantly eased daily life for the people.

Along with these positive developments, we have also witnessed rapid changes in our society. Improved connectivity has led to a substantial increase in tourism, bringing economic opportunities and exposure. At the same time, this has also posed challenges to our traditional culture, values, and way of life. People from different parts of the country and the world are visiting Zanskar, and their influence—if not managed carefully—can gradually affect local traditions and social norms. In recent months, these changes have become increasingly visible.

While development has undoubtedly made life more comfortable and accessible, it is equally important to remain conscious of its negative impacts. There is a strong need to create awareness among the people, especially the youth, about preserving our cultural identity while embracing progress.

The opening of road connectivity from Himachal Pradesh has also raised concerns about the possible influx of drugs and other illicit substances into the region. This poses a serious threat, particularly to the younger generation. In the past, awareness initiatives have been undertaken to educate people about these dangers and the ways to prevent and control such issues. Going forward, continued vigilance, community participation, and collective responsibility will be crucial to safeguard Zanskar's social fabric, culture, and future generations.

How does the Zanskar Buddhist Association plan to function in a neutral manner without the influence of political parties in Zanskar?

The political landscape in Ladakh has undergone significant changes compared to the past. In view of these developments, representatives from all sections of society—including Goba (village heads), youth, women, and monastery representatives—have collectively resolved to keep the Zanskar Buddhist Association completely free from political influence.

The ZBA will function as a purely socio-religious and cultural body, guided by community welfare rather than political interests. Its members are committed to working solely for the betterment of the Buddhist community in Zanskar, with a focus on social harmony, cultural preservation, and spiritual growth.

By maintaining this collective understanding and discipline, the ZBA aims to uphold neutrality, inclusiveness, and trust, ensuring that its decisions and actions remain in the larger interest of the community and the region.

Q. What is the Zanskar Buddhist Association’s stand on Ladakh’s safeguard demands and its support to the Apex Body Leh and Kargil Democratic Alliance (KDA)?

The Zanskar Buddhist Association has consistently stood in support of Ladakh’s safeguard demands. Whenever we were called upon to participate in shutdowns, rallies, or peaceful movements for Ladakh’s rights, the ZBA has extended its full support and solidarity.

We also stand in solidarity with those who lost their lives, as well as with the injured and detained during the unfortunate incident of September 24. Their sacrifices and suffering will always be remembered as part of Ladakh’s collective struggle.

Regarding the absence of representation from Zanskar in the Apex Body or the Kargil Democratic Alliance, I would like to clarify that I have only recently assumed charge as President of the ZBA. Therefore, it would be premature for me to comment on this matter at this stage. However, this issue will be discussed and deliberated upon collectively by the people of Zanskar, including senior leaders, representatives of the ZBA, and other community stakeholders, to decide whether formal representation is required.

The primary focus of the people of Zanskar remains the long-pending demand for district status. This is a struggle that the people of Zanskar have pursued for more than 70 years. While the announcement for district status has been made, its implementation is still awaited. We sincerely hope that the district is formally established at the earliest.

Following the implementation of district status, we will also raise the demand for a separate Council for Zanskar, so that the region can have dedicated administrative representation and address its unique developmental, cultural, and governance needs.

Q. What is the Zanskar Buddhist Association’s stand on the September 24 violence that resulted in deaths, injuries, and arrests?

The events of September 24 have left a deep scar on the hearts of the people of Ladakh, one that will never be forgotten. The loss of four young lives due to bullet injuries, the death of another youth who died by suicide, the dozens who were injured, and the arrest of many people—including Sonam Wangchuk under serious charges—have deeply pained the entire region.

The struggle of the people of Ladakh for their legitimate rights and safeguards will always be remembered, and so will the sacrifices made during this movement. We pray that such tragic incidents are never repeated in the future. It is the collective responsibility of the administration, the government, and all leadership—political and social—to ensure that such situations do not arise again and that dialogue and peaceful engagement remain the path forward.

The Zanskar Buddhist Association stands in full solidarity with all those who lost their lives, those who were injured, and those who suffered arrests during this unfortunate incident.

LG Kavinder Gupta launches STP Incentive Scheme–2025 to promote sustainable tourism in Ladakh

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Kavinder Gupta, launched the Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) Incentive Scheme–2025 on December 17, notified by the Department of Tourism, UT Ladakh, aimed at promoting sustainable tourism and protecting Ladakh’s fragile ecological balance.

During a presentation, Secretary, Tourism, informed that the scheme encourages the installation of decentralised Sewage Treatment Plants (STPs) in hotels and guesthouses to ensure scientific wastewater treatment, prevent pollution, and promote responsible tourism.

Recognising hotels and guesthouses as the backbone of Ladakh’s tourism economy, the scheme seeks to address environmental challenges arising from improper wastewater disposal through clean and sustainable waste management practices.

ment practices.

The scheme applies to new and existing hotels and guesthouses in UT Ladakh with a room capacity of 10 to 19 rooms. Eligible establishments must be provisionally or permanently registered with the Department of Tourism and possess valid permissions or No Objection Certificates (NOCs) from competent authorities.

Under the scheme, eligible units installing decentralised STPs will receive financial assistance of 75 percent of the equipment cost, subject to a maximum ceiling of ₹5 lakh. An additional 10 percent incentive will be provided for hotels or guesthouses owned by women residents of UT Ladakh. Eligible expenses include equipment cost, installation, transportation, and consultancy, excluding GST and other non-admissible expenditures.

The scheme aligns with the Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974 and the Air (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1981, as notified by the Ladakh Pollution Control Committee (LPCC). While installation of STPs is not mandatory for obtaining Consent to Establish or Operate, eligible units are strongly encouraged to install STPs and avail of the scheme benefits, ensuring compliance with prescribed effluent quality standards.

To avail the incentive, applicants must install LPCC/CPCB-approved STP technology, obtain necessary consents from LPCC, and submit the prescribed application to the Department of Tourism. Upon verification and satisfactory commissioning, the incentive amount will be released through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) to the beneficiary’s Aadhaar-seeded bank account.

The scheme is voluntary and applicable only to hotels and guesthouses with 10 to 19 rooms. The responsibility for installation, operation, maintenance, and compliance of the STP rests with the beneficiary, while the Department of Tourism reserves the right to inspect, modify scheme provisions, and recover incentives in case of non-compliance.

He said the Prime Minister’s visionary leadership has accelerated development in remote and difficult regions, ensuring that no citizen is deprived of progress due to geographical challenges.

He further noted that sustained improvements in roads, healthcare, education, power supply, internet connectivity, and administrative services are significantly enhancing the quality of life in Ladakh. Under the Prime Minister’s leadership, initiatives focused on transparent govern-

nance, digital services, rural development, skill development, and the strengthening of Panchayati Raj institutions are being implemented at a rapid pace. He added that development of border areas is vital for the overall development of the nation.

Responding to local demands, the CEC assured that funds for the extension of the existing playground would be provided under the CAPEX budget in the coming financial year. He also informed that an alternate road is being explored to decongest traffic on the Goma–Kargil Road, subject to technical feasibility. Additionally, he stated that LAHDC Kargil plans to strengthen the old District Hospital with modern health facilities and adequate manpower.

Executive Councillor Kacho Mohd Feroz, in his address, congratulated the local residents on achieving this milestone and said that LAHDC Kargil is working in mission mode to develop world-class sports infrastructure across the district. He also expressed optimism that one or two Khelo India events may be organized in Kargil, which would significantly

CEC Kargil reviews winter preparedness, focus on Zojila connectivity

KARGIL: Chief Executive Councillor, LAHDC Kargil, Dr. Mohd Jaffer Akhoon chaired a comprehensive review meeting on December 22 to assess winter preparedness and strengthen inter-departmental coordination, with special focus on maintaining connectivity through Zojila Pass and other sub-divisional roads linking remote areas with the district headquarters, besides ensuring uninterrupted delivery of essential services across the district.

During the meeting, the CEC reiterated that all necessary efforts will be made to keep Zojila Pass open for the maximum possible duration during winter. He emphasised that Zojila remains the only vital lifeline for Ladakh’s connectivity, and its timely maintenance is of paramount strategic and public importance.

Dr. Akhoon directed all concerned line departments and executing agencies, including BRO, Project Vijayak, NHIDCL and Mega Engineering, to work in close coordination to ensure smooth winter operations. He instructed the SDM Drass to identify accommodation facilities available with the Army and NHIDCL at Gumri and Menamark for use during emergencies, particularly for stranded travellers and passengers. He also directed 24×7 deployment of an ambulance at the Matiya Sub-Centre to ensure prompt medical assistance.

The SDM Zaskar presented a detailed update on road connectivity, availability of essential commodities and supply of medicines in the region. In this context, the CEC directed officials of Project Vijayak and NHIDCL to deploy adequate manpower and machinery at vulnerable locations along the Kargil–Zaskar road for emergency snow clearance and to ensure timely clearance of the

Nimo–Darcha road.

Considering the ongoing Losar festival in Zaskar, the CEC directed the Power Development Department (PDD) to extend power supply hours to facilitate smooth celebrations. He also instructed the Cooperative Department to ensure the availability of subsidised food items for the public during the festive period.

Emphasising the need for uninterrupted road connectivity during snowfall, Dr. Akhoon instructed NHIDCL to ensure regular maintenance and snow clearance on the stretch from Iqbal Bridge to Minji, so that traffic movement and essential services remain unaffected.

Regarding drinking water supply, the CEC directed the Executive Engineer, PHE, to identify vulnerable areas in and around Kargil town facing water scarcity and ensure the supply of potable drinking water through tankers wherever required.

During the meeting, the CEC also directed the Executive Engineer, PMGSY, to submit a detailed list of roads falling under the Defect Liability Period (DLP) and instructed PMGSY authorities to immediately clear and maintain roads that are incomplete or yet to be formally handed over to the Public Works Department (PWD). He further directed concerned departments to dump soil along roadsides at critical points to prevent vehicle skidding during snowfall.

The Deputy Commissioner, Kargil, briefed the meeting on the current status of Zojila Pass, future planning, strategic logistics, and monitoring through the Emergency Operations Centre (EOC). He also highlighted arrangements for Labour Sarais at various locations to support stranded passengers during winter.

boost winter sports activities in the region.

Joint Director, Youth Services & Sports, Tahir Hussain Zubdavi, highlighted that besides table tennis and badminton, the indoor stadium can function as a multi-purpose facility for various indoor sports such as boxing, taekwondo, judo, wrestling, weightlifting, and other games.
