

72nd Republic day celebration: L-G Mathur unfurls national flag

Leh: 72nd Republic day celebration began with the unfurling of the national flag by Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, R K Mathur on January 26 at Pologround, Leh.

March Past of the contingents of paramilitary forces, police, ex-servicemen, band parties, and cultural programmes were also performed.

While addressing the gathering, R K Mathur highlighted the hard work and sacrifices of the frontline workers including doctors and paramedics of Ladakh in the time of the pandemic. He said that Ladakh's fight against Coronavirus was successful because of the administrative responses and the people's cooperation. He urged the people of Ladakh not to fear the coronavirus vaccination and come forward to get vaccinated.

He spoke about health and education as the priority sectors and the multi-crore projects of setting up laboratories and developing the health, school, and sports infrastructures.

LG informed that for the first time a budget of ₹23.49 crores has been approved for the procurement of medical equipment for both the district and medical staff vacancies are being filled on priority to address manpower shortage. He said that the Administration is also working on introducing mobile units and the use of telemedicine as a prospect of health development.

Acknowledging the people's concern about employment and culture, R K Mathur said that providing employment opportunities is a key objective of UT Administration and assured to initiate regular appointments after the orders are issued based on the ongoing talks which shall give due consideration to the concerns and aspirations of the people of Ladakh.

Kargil celebrates 72nd Republic Day with patriotic fervor

KARGIL: 72nd Republic Day was celebrated with immense patriotic zeal in Kargil on January 26.

Chairman and Chief Executive Councillor, LAHDC, Kargil Feroz Ahmed Khan hoisted the national tricolor at Khree Sultan Chow Sports Stadium.

Feroz Ahmed Khan recalled the contributions of the makers of the Constitution and supreme sacrifices of the national heroes who laid down their lives for the country. He hailed the services of the Army, paramilitary forces, and police in guarding the frontiers of the country in harsh weather conditions and for maintaining peace, order, and internal security in the country.

While highlighting the achievements, developmental activities underway and plans of the present Council in Kargil district, he said that the LAHDC, Kargil is fully committed to the overall development of the district in all sectors, and several important initiatives are presently underway in this regard.

He informed that developmental works are going on in full swing Health, Public Works, Tourism, Youth Services and Sports, Rural Development while concrete measures are being taken to augment other sectors.

About the Public Works sector, the CEC said that during the current financial year, 3 major projects at a cost of more than ₹27 crore have been completed while 3 steel girder bridges have been completed under Central Road Funds (CRF). in hand under the district plan out of which many have been completed.

Regarding the projects under New Connectivity, he said that under this scheme 14 roads of a total of 38 kilometers length have been completed during this financial year, while a total road length

Entrepreneurship in Ladakh: An answer to the unemployment problem?

Naropa Fellowship, Incubation Center a step towards promoting entrepreneurship in the region

Leh: As the issue of unemployment is escalating in Ladakh, the youth of the newly formed union territory face disappointment and demotivation. With limited government jobs, and a COVID-hit economy affecting tourism, which is one of the largest industries in Ladakh, a quick and easy solution seems unlikely. Amid this crisis, entrepreneurship provides a glimmer of hope for these youth who are now looking to set up their business ventures to earn a livelihood.

Entrepreneurs are focused on finding innovative solutions to local problems. They are self-employed, and can often provide employment opportunities to others in their community.

Deachen Chusket, Naropa Fellow, 2021 batch said, "I don't want to do a traditional job where I have to report to work at 9 am every day. I don't want to be one of the many job-seekers, but a job creator."

Entrepreneurial ventures, especially those falling under the realm of social entrepreneurship, can boost the local economy and culture. Recognising the positive aspects of entrepreneurship, both the local government and private organisations are setting up initiatives to promote it in Ladakh.

One such initiative is the Naropa Fellowship, co-founded by His Eminence Drukpa Thuksey Rinpoche and Dr Pramath Raj Sinha under the grace of His Holiness the 12th Gyalwang Drukpa.

It is a year-long residential post-graduate programme focused on nurturing young entrepreneurs to preserve the culture of Ladakh, and the Himalayan region at large. The Fellowship has engaged professors and mentors from the Himalayas, India, and across the world to provide best opportunities and mentorship to the fellows. The Fellowship culminates in the Naropa Impact Summit, where Fellows get the opportunity to pitch their products, services, stories and ideas to angel investors and thought leaders and secure assistance post the Fel-

Tsewang Chostar, Naropa Fellow, 2021 batch said,

"I want to support my family, become self-dependent, and set my work schedule."

However, the journey has not been easy for the young entrepreneurs.

Chozin Palmo, a fellow from the inaugural batch, and founder of 'Jang-sa' says, "My parents want me to look for a government job instead of becoming an entrepreneur. They think that my venture is just a small business with no earning potential."

Hopeful for a bright future, she added, "The Industries and Commerce Department is slowly encouraging the youth to enter the field of entrepreneurship. This year they are finally looking for fresh ideas and promoting entrepreneurship."

The upcoming Incubation Centre in Leh that is being set up by the Industries and Commerce Department, Ladakh, is an initiative by the government to take concrete steps to promote entrepreneurship in the region. They have also set up another Incubation center in the district Kargil, which will be operational from April 2021. The vision of the centre is to provide practical and feasible ideas to entrepreneurs to enter the market through proper mentorship, training, and networking.

To promote entrepreneurship in the region, they are trying to get linkages with the government of India and networking with different ministries and departments so that the youth of Ladakh can leverage the different schemes offered by them. They are trying to create a single window for entrepreneurs to streamline the process. A startup Policy and Sustainable Industrial Policy is also being formulated for Ladakh, one which will promote and incentivise entrepreneurship.

While this brings hope for the future of entrepreneurship in Ladakh, there are still unanswered questions whether it will be accepted by society as a viable form of making a living.

Stanzin Tundup, Naropa Fellow'20, explains, "Small businesses have flourished in Ladakh for years- right from the Silk Route where trade was common. However, with modernisation, the challenges are also becoming more modern. Entrepreneurship is coming up in a big way to solve these issues. People will take some time to understand modern technologies and the set up as it threatens the traditional ways of the life of people."

With Ladakh given the status of a union territory, the youth are hopeful of new policies and opportunities in the entrepreneurial space. With encouragement coming in the form of programmes such as the Naropa Fellowship and the Incubation Center, the next few years determine if entrepreneurship could flourish in the region or not.

DC Leh reviews Intensified Pulse Polio Immunisation programme

Leh, Sachin Kumar Vaishya convened a meeting of the district-level task force for intensified pulse polio immunisation (IPPI) programme on January 25.

Sub-district magistrate (SDM), Kharu, AG Zargar; Chief Medical Officer (CMO), Leh, Dr. Motup Dorje; Deputy Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Manzoor Ul Haq; Medical Superintendent, SNM Hospital, Dr. Nurzin Angmo; District Immunisation Officer, Dr. Tashi Namgail, and District Social Welfare Officer, Leh, Tsering Chorol were present in the meeting.

CMO Dr. Motup Dorje and DC Leh Sachin Kumar discussed the strategy and joint action plans to be adopted during the first round of IPPI to be held on January 31, covering booth activity, transit points, mela/bazaars, mobile team, and house-to-house activity on February 1, 2 and 3, respectively.

District Immunisation Officer, Tashi Namgial shared their arrangements to combat the disease and plans to vaccinate a population of 9894 children below five years out of which 773 are non-locals.

It was also discussed that the health department requires 377 vaccination booths, 1504 team members, and 68 supervisors for booth activities. Similarly, they require 10 transit points, 20 team members, and two supervisors at transit points. For mela/bazaars, the medical department needs four mela/bazaar sites, 16 team members, and two supervisors. The CMO further shared that the department also requires addi-

tional 13 mobile team members for the said activities.

Dr. Tashi Namgial informed the officials that the pulse polio immunisation campaign continues to be a regular programme in India as a preventive measure against the possible spread of the disease from neighbouring countries like Pakistan, Afghanistan, and some African countries where polio is still prevalent despite India becoming a polio-free nation in 2014.

Sachin Kumar Vaishya directed the effective implementation of the IPPI programme in the district and assured help and support to the medical department.

Ladakh to be renewable energy hub of India

Green hydrogen energy could be best alternative to make Ladakh carbon neutral, says L-G Mathur

LEH: Lieutenant Governor, R K Mathur discussed renewable energy potentials and roadmap for carbon-neutral Ladakh with Minister of Power and New & Renewable Energy, GOI, Raj Kumar Singh on January 19.

The meeting was held via video conferencing. Advisor Umang Narula and Additional Secretary Ravinder Kumar were also present.

During the meeting, a detailed discussion was made on the objectives, plan of action, bottlenecks, and solutions to make Ladakh the renewable energy hub of India. Issues concerning the Ladakh power scenario, energy demand, and possibilities of replacing diesel with green hydrogen energy for electricity, heating, and transportation purposes were deliberated at length.

MNRE, SECI, ONGC, NTPC, and PGCIL officials apprised the Minister of the proposed pilot projects, other projects in pipelines, the present status of progress, and current renewable energy initiatives to make Ladakh carbon neutral. The projects included harnessing the maximum potential of solar, wind, hydro, and geothermal energy combina-

tion to provide a 24x7 electricity supply with an increased storage facility.

L-G Mathur expressed thanks to the Power Minister for his intervention to facilitate the timely implementation of these projects in Ladakh towards achieving the goal of making Ladakh carbon neutral. He informed the Minister that green hydrogen would be the best alternative to make Ladakh carbon-neutral considering its production feasibility, climatic, geographic, and road conditions of the region. He said that the success of the 200 KW Green Hydrogen CHP pilot project at the SNM Hospital, Leh would be a big achievement meeting the need for electricity, heating, and oxygen and the model can be scaled up for the use of the army and tourists.

He informed the Minister that a committee will soon be constituted to find out a long term solution for land issues for all renewable energy projects. He also requested to consider the possibility of heavy vehicles and load carriers in Ladakh to run on hydrogen fuel and electric buses for public transport.

The Minister exhorted the executing agencies participating in the meeting to submit the comprehensive project with required data, conduct surveys, study feasibility, financial requirements, set time frames, and gave a goahead to start implementing the projects on the ground at the earliest. He said that these projects will not only take Ladakh towards carbon neutrality but would also provide a sustainable source of income and employment generation.

NTPC to launch Hydrogen fuel cell-based bus/vehicle project in Leh

LEH: A team of National Thermal Power Corporation (NTPC) met Chairman/Chief Executive Councillor LAHDC, Leh Advocate Tashi Gyalson on January 27 to discuss the signing of MoU with LAHDC, Leh to launch a pilot project on Hydrogen fuel cell-based bus/vehicle project for passenger

transportation in Leh.

Deputy Chairman, Tsering Angchuk; Under Secretary, Power, UT Ladakh, Ashwani Hansa; Project Director, LREDA, Dr. Tsewang Thinlas; Subir Karma, Rahul Patabala, and Ritwick Goash of NTPC were present in the meeting.

CEC Gyalson welcomed the pilot project in Leh and said that LAHDC Leh is very keen to switch towards renewable energy in line with Prime Minister Modi's efforts to make UT Ladakh a carbon-neutral region. He assured to extend all possible assistance and help from LAHDC Leh to NTPC in the successful implementation of the pilot project.

He further requested NTPC to bring more clarity in the proposed draft of the MoU mentioning the share and equity of LAHDC, Leh, and future action plan of NTPC in Leh.

He informed of the recruitment of 385 regular employees through LAHDC, Kargil, and around 600 Ladakhis engaged in different government departments through outsourcing on an urgent basis.

He said that major focus is being given on upgrading higher education in Ladakh with setting up of Engineering College in Kargil, the introduction of 10 undergraduate and postgraduate streams in the University of Ladakh, up-gradation of Food Craft Institute, Leh to Institute of Hotel Management, a Medical college, a Mountain Research Institute, Skiing Institute and National Institute of Sowa Rigpa to ensure a better prospect for the Ladakhi youth.

R K Mathur thanked Prime Minister Modi for announcing a new Central University for Ladakh and urged the Ladakhi youth to take full advantage of these facilities at their doorstep.

To ensure sustainable development of Ladakh, LG said that major focus is being given to developing agriculture, horticulture, dairy, handicraft, and handloom sectors.

He informed that various initiatives under PM Food Processing and Micro Enterprise Scheme, Apricots, and Seabuckthorn have been selected as priority products for development under the One District One Product Classification of GOI. Like-

wise, under the national programme, 7000 households have been covered under a benchmark survey across 49 villages, and registration of 32 milk cooperatives is in the final stage and two milk pasteurization units shall come up in Leh and Kargil districts. He further informed that under phase-1 vaccination of the National Animal Disease Control Programme, 94% coverage has been achieved and Ladakh stood 1st among all UTs.

For entrepreneurial development, 2000 entrepreneurs have been trained and other initiatives are under process to promote Pashmina, seabuckthorn, medicinal and aromatic plants, etc.

The Lt. Governor also spoke about effective implementation of various centrally sponsored schemes in Ladakh, promotion of Pashmina, solar power projects, a vision of carbon-free Ladakh, promotion of tourism sector with a prime focus of winter tourism promotion, and power supply.

Earlier, the Lt. Governor of Ladakh paid tribute to the martyrs in a wreath-laying ceremony by the Indian Army at the Hall of Fame. He was accompanied by Lt. Gen. PGK Menon, GOC, HQ 14 Corps, and Maj. Gen Aakash Kaushik, Chief of Staff, HQ 14 Corps.

Different people for their commendable service to society and excellence in different fields were also honoured.

of 30 kilometers has been macadamized which would benefit more than 4000 souls.

In PHE Sector, Khan said that to provide safe and adequate drinking water facilities to people under Jal Jeevan Mission, 700 functional household connections have been provided so far, adding that as per the target fixed for the year 2022, 19000 such connections will be provided across the district.

He hailed the tireless efforts of the COVID-19 frontline workers in containing the spread of COVID-19 in the district. Apprehensions among Ladakhi youths, especially on employment generation and recruitment after Union Territory set-up is increasing as the administration has so far not issued any notifications related to jobs. More than 5,000 posts, including 1,000 gazetted posts, are lying vacant in different departments of UT Ladakh. Youth from Ladakh alleged that the much-promised UT status has created more chaos and confusion among them. They complained that youth are facing a crisis as there are limited job opportunities in the new Union Territory set-up. Let's read what they have to say about the unemployment crisis.



SONAM WANGAIL, B.sc (Physical Science): Pandemic has caused a drastic impact on economy, health and education. Yes the vaccine gave new hope but Ladakh is also facing a huge crisis in terms of employment. Unemployment is at peak. Ladakh abruptly got UT status in 2019 and since then there is not even a

single post advertisement for gazetted and non gazetted posts.

On one hand 6000 job vacancy are guaranteed specially during the Hill Council, Leh election. Meanwhile, UT administration claims absence of recruiting agency and a proper policy, reason behind delay in filling vacancies. It is high time for such policies to be implemented on ground with the combined effort of both UT administration and LAHDC.

It would be better if UT administration direct the energy of youth in development of Ladakh by recruiting them to various post and not by outsourcing. With no safeguard and job security students are in a fragile phase of depression and anxiety.

There should be balance opportunities for masses so everyone can play its role in society in accordance to it's knowledge and talent only then not only Ladakh but whole India could prosper.

Unemployment among youth: A crisis in the making

It hurts when flocks of people from other states are appointed in various departments through various outsourcing agencies.

Now it is a matter of time to see, how the things would turn out to be and hope for the best.

Ladakh needs a sustainable, inclusive transportation system

The humongous growth of traffic in Ladakh since the last decade has compelled road users to ponder about its solution. But before thinking about a solution, an understanding of the problem with a different perspective is necessary. Ladakh has and is witnessing rapid urbanization. Highways, new arterial roads, industrial

estates, housing projects, and other infrastructure are mushrooming on the areas that were predominantly agricultural land. A matter of concern is that without strategic interventions in land use management and transportation planning, environmental and economic constraints will increasingly affect cities. A strategic framework for the solution can be suggested according to the local conditions and problems.

During the last 10 years, the growth rate of motorization has increased tremendously due to an increase in population and rising income. Motorization has a negative impact on the quality of cities and citizens. According to Pendakur (1998), "The phenomenal increase in motorization all over the world has accompanied by tremendous traffic congestion, lack of adequate, efficient and low-cost public transport and detrimental impact on public health due to transport induced air pollution." According to Puchar (2005), all developing countries suffers from a transportation problem like a limited network of narrow poorly maintained and unpaved roads, congested road with a mix of motorized and non-motorized vehicles travelling at different speeds, inadequate roadway accommodation for buses and non-motorized transport, non-existent of traffic control and management, rising traffic fatalities, overcrowded, insufficient, slow and dangerous public transport and high levels of transport-related populations, noise and environmental impacts.

The mobility problem is another concern arising due to unplanned transport. The poor spend a long hour and a high proportion of their income meeting the basic mobility needs and reducing this mobility burden is important to lift the poor out of poverty. Children's independence declining as cities and towns motorize. Children's freedom to travel, explore and play independently outside the home is restricted. Stress has become dangerous for children. Aggressive drivers, fast-moving traffic, an unsafe environment for pedestrians, air and noise pollution has become very dangerous. Similarly, people with disabilities and frail old people need transport for maintaining autonomy and self-sufficiency. The urban transport system



dominated by cars and motorbikes is bad for people and special public transport must be designed for them.

Ladakh region has still scope of future road safety action which includes; standard design and planning of new road schemes, remedial measures applied to problems of existing roads, drivers training, and testing and vigilant enforcement through traffic police and other agencies

The causes of road accidents are mainly divided into four parts, Road conditions, drivers' behavior, vehicles, and environment. Growth of road transport increase in vehicles population, inadequate road infrastructure, and heterogeneity of vehicles, poor road surfaces, lack of enforcement and casual attitude of road users are some reasons for road accidents.

Three pillars of a free accident environment known as the three E's, Education, Enforcement, and Engineering. It includes road safety education for children and public training of drivers, enforcement of rules and regulations by the police department, more stringent motor vehicle laws, and better walking and crossing facilities for pedestrians.

Road safety 'should be made an essential item of the culture to promote a road safety culture. Maximum of the road accident cases are avoidable if road users exercise caution and keep cool. Measures for road safety should not only be exercised by the government organizations, agencies, and transport industry, non-government and social activists should also take a lead to spread the road safety message throughout the region.

The purpose of transport planning is not to maximize mobility, but to help gain access to goods, services, and contacts even if it involves little or no transport. Effective transportation strategies are critical because of the contribution of transportation assets to promote economic growth, providing domestic security, social cohesion, and national defense. Concise and cogent policies are required.

Sustainable transportation can be achieved by:


- Land use planning strategy: planning locations of business centers, shopping centers, and housing societies to employ market-based action
- Supply-side management strategy: designing policies to improve choices and the availably of modes of travel. This in turn includes designing public transit, construction of pedestrian and cycling infrastructures, and construction of high occupancy vehicle lanes.
- Demand-side management strategy: designing policies to discourage the use of private vehicles by imposing congestion charges, fuel and vehicle taxes, increase parking charges car-day restriction, vehicle quotas, peak period restriction, and location restriction.

The existing public transport system of Ladakh is vulnerable, due to poor attendance. The disproportionate route permits issuance for various categories of Taxis slashed down public transport frequency. While the offseason considerable amount of taxies especially M3 Category (Omni Van) intruded into the domain of public transport this puts tremendous pressure on the public transport which already reeling under the reduced productivity and inflated cost. The bus services running on the few lucrative routes are so overstuffed that getting in and out of the buses is nothing short of a miracle at peak hour. During the peak hour, the buses carry more than twice the maximum design capacity; many passengers are forced to hang perilously outside the bus while ones lucky to be inside are standing back-to-back like a tin of sardines. Clearly, public transport is severely compromised and screaming for attention.

Public transport in Ladakh needs to be fully privatized and to be run under the supervision of the government in a systematic way. Privatization will definitely ease some of the financial burdens and help to generate employability. The government policies that have encourages the manufacturers of small cars have resulted in unhappy in public with the public transport system opting for personal cars. This has only increased the burden on the already congested

Leh: Secretary, Labour, Ravinder Kumar discussed and chalks out plans regarding Labour Laws/Labour Codes and various notifications issued by the Government during a meeting convened on January 27 at Secretariat.

The action plan of unorganised workers was also discussed.

Assistant Labour Commissioner, Leh, Ghulam Nabi Tak; Assistant Labour Commissioner, Kargil, Public Law Officer, Labour and Employment Department UT Ladakh were presnt during the meeting.

Several key points were discussed during the meeting, including setting up of Labour Facilitation Centre, drafting rules and laws about labour courts, designing a new portal and App and setting up a committee.

Ravinder Kumar informed the new labour law comprises four categories to deal with wages, social security, industrial safety and welfare, and industrial relations. He directed Assistant Labour Commissioner, Leh, Ghulam Nabi Tak to explore the feasibility of implementing Centre rules and laws, and the implementation of these laws in courts in the post-UT Ladakh scenario.

He informed that the administration would draft rules and laws, and form a committee while discussing the four new labour courts.

The Labour Department was asked to complete the construction of the Labour Facilitation Centre with a bathroom, kitchen, room with a few beds, and a hall with chairs. He further directed the Labour Department to identify govt. land/sites for the Labour Facilitation Centre near the gathering areas of labourers.

Assistant Labour Commissioner, Leh, Ghulam Nabi Tak Ghulam informed the Secretary about the awareness camp to be held in Changthang in the first week of February.


Secretary Labour directed Ghulam Nabi Tak to deploy personnel at entry points at Meenamarg, Sarchu, Darcha and the KBR Airport at Leh to prepare the database of labourers.

During the discussion, it was decided that the design of the new App and the portal of the Labour Department would be discussed with NIELET, whereas the App and the portal would be made available for public use by April 1.

Speaking on welfare boards of building and other construction workers, Secretary Ravinder directed the labour department to form a welfare board. Ghulam Nabi Tak informed the Secretary that the Labour Department will invite experts to frame rules and laws at the earliest.
