LEH: More than a year has passed after the Union Territory status and a lot has changed ever since. The much-awaited UT status has definitely shown much hope and expectation but the reality looks different now.

There are growing disappointments and concerns among the people of Ladakh at all levels. On one hand, youths of Ladakh are anxious about job opportunities and future safeguard, while on the other hand, nearly 1700 Non-Gazetted Ladakh Police personnel are waiting for their due promotion.

After bifurcation of the erstwhile Jammu and Kashmir state, police personnel of Ladakh Police ranking from Head Constable (HC) 1988 batches onwards are still waiting for their due promotion. Their counterpart in Kashmir and Jammu zone already got promoted to Assistant Sub-Inspector (ASI) rank officer. In Kashmir and Jammu zone 1984-85 batches constables are promoted to Sub Inspector level officer but in the case of Ladakh Police, they are promoted to a rank of ASI. Similarly, Sub-Inspector (SI) of 2010-11 Ladakh Police batches haven't got their due promotion while on the other hand their counterpart in Kashmir and Jammu zone got promoted to Inspector rank officer in 2020.

It was also reported that many of the Ladakh Police personnel already got retired from their service without promotion benefits and many are getting retired soon.

First Skill development workshop held in Leh

More than 2000 youths from Ladakh show interest in the workshop

LEH: A one-day Skill Development workshop organised by the Department of Technical Education and Skill Development, Ladakh to raise awareness among youths on the skill development opportunities was inaugurated by Lieutenant Governor, R K Mathur on March 27 at Sindhu Sanskriti Kendra, Leh.

Speakers and experts from different fields shared their experiences and opportunities in various sectors such as solar technology, apparel, and home furnishing, entrepreneurship, food processing, and tourism, etc.

R.K. Mathur apprised the participants that the objective of the workshop is to understand the aspirations of Ladakhi youths and help them develop skills with certification to help them get employment or start their ventures. Giving the example of South Korea, he said, "94% of the population in Korea is skilled. To replicate it, we have to develop the society of Ladakh by segregating the youth into different groups as per their interest. For this purpose, we need your support in recognizing the skills you have so that we could provide certification. By acquiring the skills you can work within Ladakh, within the country, and even abroad."

L-G said that the skill development program will not only benefit youths from Ladakh but will also help UT Administration in understanding the unemployment situation in Ladakh so that necessary steps will be taken based on suggestions from the youth.

He stressed on commercial cultivation of high-value products in the primary


The medical camp was organised to provide medical assistance to the people living in villages.

She said that most of the patients

were of old age with BP and joint pain issues. "Our target is to reach the unreached and we are happy that

the medical camp was carried out very successfully. I would like to thank the Sarpanch and Panch of the village for their cooperation", she added.

Jayasree Singh (CMO 75 Bn, CRPF) said, "This program is conducted all over the country by the CRPF every year. In Ladakh, our main aim is to cover the villages which are located far away from the town, where people could not avail proper medical facilities. Therefore today



Sonam Dolma, Sarpanch Achi, said thanked CRPF for organising this medical camp. She said that the camp was very helpful and medicines were distributed free of cost.

Expressing gratitude, Tsering Stobdan, Panch Alchi, said, "Most of our aged people are not able to go to the district hospital for their medical checkup, but today the team of CRPF visited our village and did a free medical checkup and distributed free medicines and we are very thankful to them."

Patients from different age groups took advantage of the camp. Blood pressure and sugar test were also done. While patients with the serious condition were referred to the SNM Hospital.

COVID-19 preventive kits were also distributed among the villagers.

He said, "WCBCL was established eight years ago, since then we have been creating awareness about the wildlife in Ladakh to conserve and protect them. Today I could say that we are sharing the best platform because students are the future guard of our rich wildlife".

"It is very concern for us that the foreigners are writing books on our birds and mammals, but we are even not aware of them. According to them, there are 310 bird species found in Ladakh, out of which only 60-70 birds have the local name (in Ladakhi), which means that our relationship with the birds is very weak. In these seven to eight years, we have started birding, (a beautiful word) and soon it became popular in Ladakh. In future, birding tourism will also boost because Ladakh is not only a barren and dry land, around 25% birds of the Indian Sub Continent found in Ladakh" he added. The members of the WCBCL organised a drawing, painting, and essay competition for the students on the theme 'I Love Sparrow'. Grand photo exhibitions on the birds and mammals of Ladakh were the main attractions of the programme.

He requested the students to read about the sparrow-like habitat, lifespan, and food, etc. to celebrate this day in an effective way.

L-G Mathur inaugurates two Astronomy Labs in Ladakh

LEH: Two Astronomy labs one each at Kendriya Vidyalaya, Leh, and Kargil was established and e-inaugurated by Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, R K Mathur on March 26 at Raj Niwas.

The Astronomy labs were established in collaboration with the office of Principal Scientific Adviser, GoI, and sponsored by Shiv Nadar Foundation.

Lt. Governor said that environment protection was one of the aspirations of Ladakhi people in the newly formed UT of Ladakh. He said that the setting up of these astronomy labs is a culmination of this thought towards a practical understanding of the extra-ordinary clean environment of Ladakh.

He said that these astronomy labs would benefit not only school children and youth at large but could be utilized as a stepping stone to promote Astro tourism in Ladakh.

Mathur shared the idea to convert Hanley into a dark sky sanctuary and to explore possibilities to promote virtual tourism in Ladakh which he said would generate entrepreneurial opportunities



for the local youth.

He thanked Prof. K Vijay Raghavan, Principal Scientific Adviser, GoI, and the entire team for setting up the Astro labs in Ladakh. Also, he requested their continued support in training and lectures by eminent Astrophysicists, and help to set up 10 more labs in Ladakh.

He further pointed out the need to utilize the enriched environment of Hanley for continuous research programme by researchers and experts from India and abroad. He asked for continued support from the office of Principal Scientific Adviser, GoI, and Indian Institute of Astro Physics to get these ideas on the ground.

CEC, LAHDC, Leh Tashi Gyalson, and CEC, LAHDC, Kargil

Feroz Ahmad Khan thanked the Lt. Governor for his initiative in establishing the Astro labs. They expressed hope that these labs would prove highly beneficial to the students and raised the need to expand more such labs in other schools of Ladakh.

Prof. K Vijay Raghavan spoke about the rich legacy that India holds in the history of Astronomy citing Aryabatta and modern tradition using a telescope. He said that every child can aspire to be an astronomer and excel in the field of Astrophysics. This should not remain restricted to a particular section of society. He said that these Astronomy labs will allow the Ladakhi children to unfold their ambition and inspire them to become worldclass scientists.

KARGIL: A daylong conference on World Water Day themed, 'Water Supply and Sanitation in Cold Climates- All Year 24x7 Water Supply, Waste Management' was held on March 22 in Kargil.

The event was organised by Housing and Urban Development Department, Ladakh in collaboration with BORDA and LEDeG. Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, R K Mathur presided over as the chief guest virtually.

Speaking on the occasion, LG Mathur thanked the participants from outside Ladakh for sharing their knowledge and expertise in water management that would help Ladakh address the water shortage and conservation issues. He expressed concerns over the receding glaciers and dried up springs which are resulting in water shortages in villages. He informed that UT Administration has drafted a Ladakh Vision 2050 in which an efficient water management plan with a sustainable solution is one of the primary focuses.

DC Leh, Shrikant Suse informed that this Android mobile app is available on the Google Play Store that can be searched under RoL Ladakh . Both the portal and mobile app have been indigenously designed and developed by National Informatics Centre (NIC), District Leh.

In Conversation with Stanzin Dolkar, First woman ice hockey player

Q. Brief us about yourself and the journey as an Ice hockey player.

I love sports and since my childhood, I used to participate in various sports at school and district level. I started playing ice hockey when I was in Class 11. It was a time when there were only 3 women Ice hockey teams in Leh including, one team of Secmol and two teams of Lalok. Since then I have played ice hockey continuously for 16 years. One strong reason for me to be consistent in this game is because I was very passionate and always wanted to see more and more girls of Ladakh play and participate in the challenge cup. This was a prime reason to establish Ladakh Women Ice Hockey Foundation (LWIHF) to encourage women players by imparting training. I was the Founding President of LWIHF.


In 2007, a Swedish documentary titled 'Thin Ice' won the Silver Wolf Competition award. The film shows the love of mine for the ice hockey sport and my initiative and effort to pave way for girls to compete in championships. In 2009, I joined District Youth and Sports Services as a Physical education teacher, and in 2016; I cleared PSC and started serving as a physical education lecturer. Presently, I am working in Govt. Girls higher Secondary School as Physical Education lecturer.

Q. How many international, national, and district tournaments you played?

In 2010, I received a special invitation from the Malaysia Ice hockey Federation through Indian Ice Hockey Federation to play with the Malaysia team in the International Malaysia tournament. I got the call because they recognized my effort to uplift women in ice hockey sports. In 2010, I participated in Ice hockey development camp organised by International Ice hockey Federation in Finland. And in 2016, I played Asian Challenge Cup at Chinese Taipei. Apart from the international games, I played many national and district ice hockey tournaments.

Q. You have been constantly motivating women to play ice hockey from the very beginning. Share your experiences.

Like I said before, there was a time when women playing ice hockey is not given much importance. There were only 1 to 3 teams and many of the players left playing after few years because the future was bleak, not so much exposure, needed encouragement, and facilities were there. The women players used to borrow protective gear and equipment as they were not in a status to have their own. The story does not just end with this, there was also some kind of gender disparity because we have seen that the public is more enthusiastic about

watching men's matches than the women's one. So, there was discouragement at all levels. Amidst all these there was a need to aware, motivate young girls to play and pursue the dreams. Thus, the Ladakh Women Ice hockey Foundation was formed in 2015 to encourage women ice hockey players. The foundation worked to strengthened women players, giving coaching and training to young girls and also form more teams.

Today, the situation has changed. Women players are equally given importance and almost all the tournaments are conducted. Girl's team of Ladakh represents India at the international championship but there is still a lot to be done to encourage women in Ladakh.

Q. Ice hockey used to be a male-dominated game. You as a woman ice hockey player share with us the challenges faced by the women players and the scope for women players of Ladakh?

Yes, ice hockey was indeed more popular among men in the beginning and very few women were seen on ice surfaces playing ice hockey. It was a time when the game was played without protective gear and equipment. There were not many facilities also a short winter season to play ice hockey was a challenge to make women participate and excel in ice hockey. There was also a time when the women's team of ice hockey was not taken so seriously. Also, the number of women ice hockey teams was less which also hindered participation in every tournament. After the 2016 championship, more and more young girls were encouraged to play ice hockey.

> But the situation has changed little bit now, today we have six women teams, though men teams are more than 12. The scope of winning an international championship is high for the women team as compared to the men team. This is because the women's ice hockey team is less at the international level also.

Talking about the challenges, not just women but all the ice hockey players of Ladakh face is the absence of good infrastructure and short playing season. Players of Ladakh have good potential; they will be more groomed given the needed infrastructure. At present players of Ladakh plays on a natural ice sheet which is available for two months only. Though we represent India in the international arena but to score and win the championship we need to have facilities of international level and more time to play and practice.

Q. What is your advice to young girls who are playing or wanted to become ice hockey players?

No matter how many challenges you have to face or how difficult things get don't just quit playing. Your interest and passion for playing will take you to new heights.

Not all success comes easily, there is a struggle but you need to keep going on if you need to achieve it.

People's Voice

Waste management is a pressing need and issue in Leh with the growing population, change in lifestyle, heavy influx of tourists, and many more. Open garbage dumping and burning is still a common method practiced. But on the other hand Municipal Committee, Leh is leaving no stone unturned to make Leh town neat and clean. Administration along with public cooperation is an utmost need to make Leh district clean. Let's read what they have to say about waste management.



VANGCHEN DOLMA, Coordinator, Project Tsangda: Waste management issue is increasing even in rural and semi-urban areas. To curb this issue an initiative, 'Project Tsangda' was started in 2017 to manage the waste generated in rural areas. At present, there are seven centers established in different areas of

Leh district. The concept of the project is that it is run and managed by locals but the infrastructure was developed by the government.

Talking about Choglamsar centre, the household wastes are collected once a week and from commercial units, the wastes are collected daily. We charge ₹ 50 from households, ₹ 200 from shops. Hotels are charged according to the number of rooms. The fee charged is the income of the centre. From this limited income, we pay salary to our staffs and fuel of truck, etc. Few people hesitate to pay the user charges because we cannot collect the waste-free like Municipal Committee due to lack of fund. It may take little time to change their behavior.

The wastes collected are brought to the centre for secondary segregation because the primary segregation is done at the household level as instructed. It was quite difficult in the initial days to convince people about waste segregation at their household level, but now the scenario has changed. Wastes are segregated manually at the centre for now but we require a small segregation machine to ease the process. After segregation recyclable waste is sent for recycling and organic waste is dump into a dump pit to make manure. But dumping seems unsuccessful as it takes a very long time to get converted into

manure; therefore we are also in need of a machine to convert organic waste into manure as MC has.

It will be very good if we could set up a small recycling factory in Leh. Right now we sell the segregated waste at a very low rate.

Since its inception, Project Tsangda is working well with a lot of challenges and weaknesses with its limited income from the users. It will be more successful if the government starts funding it. Earlier, there was a stigma attached in the society towards sanitary workers, but now it has changed. Currently, we have 33 staff and receiving more applications from the public, which is a good sign. Project Tsangda is a successful model and can be implemented in the whole of Ladakh in the future as per requirement.



DORJEY TUNDUP, Inspector Municipal Committee, Leh: Waste management is a serious concern globally, and Ladakh is no exception. Our foremost role is to implement the decision taken by the elected body of the Municipal Committee (MC), Leh to keep Leh city neat and clean. For this purpose, we are doing our best

at our level to maintain the hygiene of the town. We are implementing both the traditional and scientific methods to get the best results. A Solid Waste Management Plant, which has set up in Leh under the scheme UIDSSMT (Urban Infrastructure Development Scheme for Small and Medium Town) is functioning to segregate the waste generated, which ease the recycling process. The recyclable waste materials like plastics and papers are sold to scrap dealers for recycling. But waste like tattered clothes and shoes are burned in the machine called Black-Hole. The good thing about the machine Black-Hole is that it is quite environmentally friendly, as it produces very low pollution. It is based on plasma technology.

We also have a plan to use plastics waste like plastic bottles in road construction soon. Which will be game-changing to cope with the plastics issue. We all know that with time our town is expanding and rural areas near the town are becoming semi-urban areas. To cope with this, Greater Leh Master Plan is in the process to expand the Municipal Committee area of Leh, which will include Phyang, Spituk, Ranbirpur, Shey, Thiksey, and Chushot etc. Currently, the MC area is about 60 km square. But the new MC area will be around 120 sq km. While meeting our goals for cleanup, we also come across many challenges. For example, changing the mindset of the people. It is very difficult to convince the people about their part of the responsibility. If we get public support, then it will be very easy to keep the town clean. Commercial shops also throw their garbages here and there at the end of the day, which enhance our difficulties. In addition to that, we have a shortage of staff (workforce). We are hoping that a new recruitment rule will come soon in Ladakh. At last, I want to request the public for their cooperation because the environment belongs to each one of us.



DR. ISHAY NAMGYAL, President MC, Leh: Ladakh is an eco-sensitive region, waste management becomes more important than any other region. So we cannot ignore the waste that is being generated here. For this purpose, MC Leh is working at a war footing zone to keep Leh's town neat and clean. It's been

two years since the elected body came to Leh, in which 13 wards are there. We are still working under the erstwhile state J&K MC Act 2000, as UT Act has not been enacted yet. A few decades earlier our waste generation was zero, because of domestication and the absence of plastics usage. Now many households have left domestication in Leh town due to which even leftover food becomes waste. In addition to that utilization of packaged products has enhanced by multiple times in Leh. During winter, Leh town generates two to three tons of waste which increased up to twelve tons per day in summer. In collaboration with LEDeG, we have started collecting dry and wet (organic) waste separately. Dry waste like plastic and paper are recycled at Skampari and the wet waste is decomposed to make manure. We had been throwing our waste at Bomb-Guard for many years and now it has become a serious issue. Now we have quantified it and around 1.72 lakh cubic meter waste is there, of which 16% are plastics and 10% are papers (gatta) etc. The good news is that within two years it will be cleared through tendering.

Waste that cannot be recycled like tattered clothes can be burned in the

For promotion, we need clear vacancies in Ladakh Police which is not there because the final allocation between the two Union Territory is still pending. Things are under process and it will take time to get all things on track".

"As soon we get the final numbers of Ladakh Police we will start the functional promotion. Non-functional or in situ promotion was in our hand and we did promote a few of the officers", he added.

Satish Khandare further added that J&K being a

Union Territory with the legislature has some benefits.

Talking about the vacant post in Ladakh Police he informed that there are 800 posts vacant in Ladakh Police which will be filled only after the announcement of the new recruitment policy of Ladakh.

All the specialized wing of Ladakh Police such as security, CID, Traffic, SDRF are managed by the existing personnel through internal adjustment without any new recruitments. Over

burdened with work along with lack of promotion opportunities has further worsened the situation as many are going under depression.

The department is in a dire need of adequate manpower for smooth functioning.

machine called Black Hole, which burning capacity is 1 ton per day. Around 9% of wastes are scientifically buried in the landfill with proper guidelines.

Earlier we had MC dustbins at few places in which people throw their waste directly without waiting for MC trucks. But it's been not successful as during winter it freezes and the stray animals like dogs and donkeys mess up the whole area. At present, to ease the segregation process, a separate vehicle for dry and wet waste is provided. Soon we are going to start a third vehicle in which only hazardous waste like - syringe will be collected.

Household wastes are collected free to encourage people's participation to keep Leh town clean, but the minimum amount is charged from the commercial units.
