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
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Hill Council, Leh, approves ₹ 207.42 crore District **Plan for 2021-22**

Passes resolution on exemption of funds up to ₹ 5 lakh from tendering process

LEH: Hill Council, Leh approved ₹ 207.42 crores for the District Plan of LAHDC Leh under the Capex Budget of the year 2021-22 on April 9.

The two-day General Council Meeting of the 6th LAHDC Leh was held under the Chairmanship of Advocate Tashi Gyalson, Chairman/CEC, LAHDC, Leh on April 8-9 at Council Secretariat.

The House discussed department-wise allocated budget, which includes Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Wildlife, Tourism, Education, Employment, Power, Health, CAPD, Roads & Buildings, Culture, U&R Development, PHE, NFB, and Labour Welfare department. A sum of ₹195.54 Crores under Major Works, ₹ 9.12 Crores under Machinery & Equipment, and ₹ 2.76 Crores under Motor Vehicles has been allocated for the financial year 2021-22 in the District Plan of LAHDC Leh.

All the Councillors of LAHDC Leh sought answers to their queries during the question hour to the concerned Executive Councillors (EC) holding different portfolios. They also raised their concerns over several issues.

The House unanimously passed a resolution on the exemption of funds under different schemes up to ₹ 5 Lakh from tendering process.

This year's budget focuses mainly on the completion of the ongoing/spillover works. Only a few new schemes have been considered keeping the urgency of the public demand in mind. Funds for three new departments, including Antiquities, Culture, and Libraries, have been proposed this time. Funds for the clearance of the liabilities of previous works under various schemes have been earmarked. A new scheme- Housing for Poor- has been proposed to construct a Housing Colony for the poor houseless families in Leh town. The Councillor Constituency Development Fund (CCDF) has been fixed at ₹ 60.00Lakhs

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LAHDC, Kargil, approves ₹ 207.43 crore Annual District Plan

KARGIL: General Council Meeting of LAHDC Kargil was held under the Chairmanship of Feroz Ahmad Khan, Chairman/CEC, LAHDC, Kargil on April 7 at Conference Hall Baroo.

Hill Council, Kargil approved ₹ 207.43crore for the District Plan of LAHDC Kargil under the Capex Budget of the year 2021-22. The budget comprises ₹ 187 crore 86 lakh under Major Works, ₹ 16 crore 35 lakh under Machinery and Equipment, and ₹ 3 crore 22 lakh under Motor Vehicles.

Deputy Commissioner and CEO, LAH-DC, Kargil, Santosh Sukhadeve gave a brief presentation of physical and financial achievements registered during the last financial year. He said that out of the amount of ₹232 crore 42 lakh allotted, an amount of ₹181 crore 96 lakh was spent on the implementation of various developmental schemes and welfare programmes in the district which represents 78.29% of the released allocation. He further informed that most of the civil works stand tendered and allotted and work will be kick-started as soon as the

budget is released.

Addressing the meeting, Feroz Ahmed Khan said that the major focus of LAH-DC, Kargil will be the completion of works that are nearing completion besides completing all ongoing works in different sectors. He directed all sectoral officers to start the development works in the right earnest besides pacing them up keeping in view the short working

Threadbare discussions and deliberations were held on the draft annual plan budget wherein members put forth their suggestions and several important decisions were also taken up regarding the implementation of schemes on the ground.

Resolutions on CAPEX Budget and funds meant for other centrally sponsored schemes to be made non-lapsable and carried over to the next fiscal for effective utilization and completion of works, to bring Special Development Package (SDP) under the purview of the LAHDC, execution of works under

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

SDM Zanskar appreciated the teachers for their efforts in increasing student enrollment in Government schools. He also stressed the teachers to be punctual and dedicated towards one's duty for further success of the school and students.

Head Master Lobzang Tashi applauded the education department and founding members for merging three least-roll schools

Tundup Wangyal, one of the founding members of the school said, "The main purpose of merging the schools was to make the government schools effective so that students from the region could get quality and regular education. We noticed that there were schools in each village but the schools were on the verge of shutting down as there were very few students. Private schools have no say in the region and therefore the possibility of success of cluster schools was high. Therefore we convinced parents and villagers. Later, students from other villages also started joining the schools."

Advisor Junu Tsogspa on behalf of parents and villagers expressed the need for more qualified teachers, computer lab and emphasised the importance of Eklavya Model Residential School at Skagam so that more students can be accommodated from the region.

ALTOA demands amendment in new trekking, tourist routes order

The order states that tourist/trekkers are not allowed to have night stay on all new routes

LEH: All Ladakh Tour Operator Association raised the need for amendment in the approval of new tourist and trekking routes and re-opening of Man -Merak - Chushul - Tsagala - Tsaga – Loma – Nyoma – Mahe & Chamser – Lungser Peak.

The members of ALTOA met Jamyang Tsering Namgyal MP Ladakh on April 6 and informed that Hanle was open for Tourism and overnight stays, but after the MHA issued a press note on the opening of new tourist and trekking routes in Ladakh on December 18, 2018, everything changed. They stated that the Government has issued this approval letter with an impractical clause that disallowed night

stays.

"Hanle which was earlier open for overnight stays became a day excursion itinerary. This has greatly impacted the employment and economic prospects of the people living in this border region of Ladakh and impacted the tourism potential of Ladakh", said ALTOA President.

The Govt. of India has officially declared four new trekking routes and 5 tourist routes without allowing night stays. The order states that a night stay is not allowed to ensure safety and security. ALTOA questions that how can a person trek from Point A to Point B without staying overnight?

They requested MP Ladakh to

address their concerns with the MHA so that they can amend the order and allow night stays.

ALTOA also informed that the DC office has started giving permits till Merak only. But the road connection from Pangong to Tsomoriri and Tsokar lake is a sought-after road journey by domestic and foreign tourists alike. The Maan -Merak - Chushul -Tsagala – Tsaga – Loma – Nyoma - Mahe was open for Tourism but was closed in 2020 due to the Indo-China standoff.

"Now that the Indo-China standoff has deescalated, we request the Government to open this circuit for the promotion of tourism which will also promote border tourism in the region", ALTOA

They further requested to open Chamser & Lungser peaks which were earlier open for domestic & foreign trekkers. Since 2015 the areas have been restricted by the Indian Army & ITBP.

ALTOA said that the early amendment on this issue will boost employment and the economic benefits will reach the farflung border regions of Ladakh.

CCDF up to ₹5 lakh based on a resolution passed by the target beneficiaries, round the year availability of Directors in the directorates created for Kargil to ensure effective resolution of public issues besides establishment of proper official and residential infrastructure for these directorates, provision of funds to meet drought emergencies and natural disasters under the un-tied funds were passed.

Other resolutions passed includes framing recruitment rules separately for District Cadre, Divisional Cadre, and UT Cadre and immediate filling up of the vacant posts in different departments through the concerned recruiting agencies. Also, the resolution for the introduction of sustainable and efficient

energy building models towards Carbon Neutral Ladakh by designing and constructing all future Government buildings in the district by passive solar principles and elements of local architecture and building materials was passed.

While urging the officers to effectively implement development schemes on the ground for better results, CEC said that the role of the implementing agencies is of prime importance to ensure completion of public welfare schemes in a time-bound manner and the targets set are achieved in full. He said that utmost care should also be taken to ensure that funds earmarked are properly utilized for the particular scheme and strict adherence of formalities is ensured to meet the requisite quality and quantity parameters.

UPSC Civil Service Examination to be held in Leh too

UPSC has allocated a centre at Leh for the first time for the civil service examination to be held on June 27.

er (ADC), Leh, Sonam Chosjor, shared that a total of 465 candidates have opted for Leh as the centre for the UPSC CSE exams

Eliezer Joldan Memorial (EJM) Degree College and Central Institute of Buddhist Studies (CIBS) are the centers for UPSC CSE. Principal, EJM Degree College, and Director CIBS are the venue supervisors. DC Leh would be the custodian-cum-co-

ordinating supervisor and Deputy Director, Employment, Leh, Rigzin Spalgon and Assistant Secretary, JK BOSE, Leh, Tashi Tundup have been appointed Local Inspecting Officers.

Sonam Chosjor shared that UPSC officials would soon be arriving in Leh to sensitize and train the concerned officials on conducting the UPSC examination in Leh.

L-G Mathur stresses on developing localised textbooks for schools in Ladakh

NEW DELHI: Lieutenant Governor, R K Mathur discussed the need to develop localized study materials for schools in Ladakh with Shridar Srivastava, Incharge Director, National Council of Educational Research and Training on April 3 at Ladakh Bhawan, New Delhi.

As suggested by Dir. NCERT, L-G agreed to send the first group of teams from Ladakh to work in collaboration with NCERT to localize the existing textbooks and to create more local content, including content development in locally approved languages. He added that independent teams would also work on authentication of the texts created by the first group of teams. The first developments of textbooks may be up to the primary class level.

Shridar Srivastava informed LG about the availability of e-content of NCERT materials through QR Code that can be made available offline to the students. He also suggested utilizing services of community radio and Doordarshan for education dissemination in far-flung areas of Ladakh.

UT Ladakh signs MoU with Solar Energy Corporation of India for 50 MW SPP

LEH: UT Administration, LAH-DC Leh, and Solar Energy Corporation of India (SECI Ltd) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on April 6 for setting up a 50 MW solar power project at Taru, Leh.

The three parties signed MoU in presence of the Lieutenant Governor Ladakh, R K Mathur. CEC, LAHDC Leh, Advocate Tashi Gyalson; Member of Parliament, Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal; CMD SECI, Jatinder Nath Swain; Advisor to LG, Umang Narula; Secretary, PDD & NRE, Ravinder Kumar and Deputy Commissioner Leh, Shrikant Balasaheb Suse were present.

L-G Mathur lauded SECI for taking the initiative of setting up a reasonably large project of 50 MW and contributing to meet the power needs of Ladakh by using clean solar energy. He informed that similar projects are in discussion with SECI which would lead Ladakh closer to attaining the vision of a carbon-neutral

He added that these projects would also play a crucial role in contributing to the economic growth of Ladakh.

He also stressed that Ladakh's potential to produce 33GW renewable energy could play a huge role in taking Ladakh on the path of carbon neutrality by reducing and eliminating the dependency on fossil fuels for generating power.

LG Mathur appreciated the participation of LAHDC Leh and MP Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering

Namgyal for their efforts to help the initiative succeed.

LG Mathur also informed about a pilot project being discussed with SECI to meet the energy requirement for heating and electricity to the Sonam Norboo Memorial Hospital in Leh by using clean hydrogen energy.

Terming the MoU as a historic new start for UT Ladakh, Chief Executive Councillor, LAHDC Leh, Tashi Gyalson shared that the MoU is the result of prolonged deliberations with SECI to make it beneficial for the locals under the guidance of Lieutenant Governor, UT Ladakh. He added that the project was initiated to make Ladakh economically self-reliant by providing new employment opportunities for Ladakhi people.

MP Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal, expressed his hope that the tripartite MoU would be a great step towards fulfilling PM Modi's vision to make Ladakh a carbon-neutral region. He shared that this step would help generate employment opportunities for locals and fulfill the aspirations of the people of Ladakh. This MoU is a step towards making Ladakh self-reliant in

the energy/power sector. He also requested the UT Administration and LAHDC to further extend such solar projects to meet the needs of schools and hospitals at all levels.

Secretary, PDD & NRE, Ravinder Kumar shared that Ladakh can produce 33 GW of power, including 26 GW of solar power. He said that Ladakh has surplus power in the summer while there is a power deficit in the winter. He said that the project would reduce the dependency of Ladakh on the Northern Grid.

Speaking during the event, CMD

SECI, Jatinder Nath Swain, described the MoU as a significant moment for the organisation. He shared that the MoU with UT Ladakh of 50 MW solar power is designed to produce 16MW power at a constant rate for 14 to 16 hours which would go a long way in securing energy independence for the region. He also highlighted that the MoU would open up avenues and will act as a test-bed for other developers and corporations, both private and public, to invest in Ladakh to tap the enormous potential of renewable energy in the form of solar and wind.

One-day farmer awareness programme held at Chemday

CHEMDAY: A one-day farmer awareness programme on organic farming was organised by the Department of Agriculture, Leh as a part of Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav on April 9 at Chemday Community Hall, Kharu block.

Chief Guest of the occasion, Secretary, Agriculture/ Horticulture, UT Ladakh, Ravinder Kumar requested the farmers to adopt organic farming to sell their produce at a higher price. He also urged them to avail benefits of the greenhouses by cultivating varieties of vegetables.

He shared that implementing the Mission Organic Development Initiative (MODI) scheme to turn Ladakh into a certified organic region by 2025 is the major step taken by UT Ladakh.

Secretary Ravinder informed that UT Administration is attempting to reduce the region's dependency on imports during the winter months for vegetables and become self-sufficient. He also highlighted the problems of depleting water resources and requested everyone to follow and adopt water conservation technologies such as mulching, sprinklers, and drip irrigation.

Chief Agriculture Officer, Leh, Tashi Tsetan, who is the Mission Director Organic Farming highlighted the achievements and the services provided by the department to the farmers. He urged the farmers to adopt organic farming practices as a sustainable means of livelihood and income generation. He also shared his views on maintaining proper health and hygiene through the consumption of organic produce.

To achieve the goal of promoting organic farming in the Leh district, he sought the cooperation of the farmers and other allied sectors, including Animal and Sheep Husbandry.

He shared that the Agriculture Department in collaboration with the Animal and Sheep Husbandry is making efforts to revive the Rarzi and Barzi practices.

Chairperson, Block Development Council, Kharu, Deachen Dorjay highlighted the grievances including the need to increase the quantity of peas (matar) seeds distributed in the block since Sakti village is the largest producer of peas in Ladakh. He also requested a horticulture office in Kharu block.

Sub-divisional Agricultural Officer (SDAO), Leh, Shakeel-ur-Rehman spoke about the importance of soil nutrients management and water conservation through mulching technology.

Sarpanch, Kunzang Yangdol, officers of the department, and farmers of Chemday and Kharu villages headed by their nambardars were present during the event.

The department aims to take forward the vision of the Digital India Initiative of Govt. of India and also to ensure faster, efficient, and effective delivery of government services in UT Ladakh. The training is being organised to enhance the current skill sets of the officers of UT Ladakh through the proposed training programmes conducted by NISG.

The main objective of the programme is to familiarise the participants with a range of concepts, practices, and examples of how government process reengineering, optimization, and application of ICT in an optimized process environment can be undertaken by government organizations.

The broad areas covered under the programme include Digital India, MMPs, IT Policy, eGovernance evolution, e-governance lifecycle, service quality, developing a vision statement and service prioritization, process maps, collecting data for process mapping, government process analysis, implementation of re-engineered processes and change management.

It will enhance operational efficiency in administration and service delivery, improve citizen focus and experience, minimize process complexity, cost, and service delivery time, increase transparency levels and reduce administrative burden.

The training was attended by Administrative Secretaries, Deputy Commissioner, Kargil, and Head of the Departments, and other senior officers of UT Ladakh.

DDMA Chairman reviews Covid-19 testing and surveillance arrangements

In Conversation with

Lobzang Visuddha, Chairman, WCBCL

Q. Tell us about yourself and how your interest in wildlife developed?

In the year 2011, I met Rajneesh Suvarna, a bird watcher who came to Ladakh to watch bird species of Ladakh. It was a new thing for me to see people coming from different parts of the world to see birds and mammals of Ladakh. That was a turning point in my life and the reason which attracted and forced me to explore the field. I started birding with some of my friends, right with the house sparrow. Gradually, I gained more and more interest to explore and study the different species of birds found in Ladakh. Also, having a Buddhist study as educational background, helped me a lot to be a nature lover.

After getting more and more interest in wildlife, many started approaching me for wildlife guide, especially birding guide. Thus, I realized that there are a need and scope of professional wildlife guides in Ladakh, and to cater the need we (WCBCL) started imparting basic birding guide and nature guide training to many youths of Ladakh. There is still a huge demand for local professional nature guides in Ladakh, with complete and comprehensive knowledge of wildlife.

Q. How many species of birds are found in Ladakh and any new species recorded recently?

Ladakh has many hotspots like - Suru valley, Shey-Thiksey marshes, Panamik to Turtuk, and high altitude wetlands like- Chushul, Yaya Tso, Tsokar, Puga, Tsomoriri and Hanley basin, etc. There are around 310 bird species recorded in the checklist Birds of Ladakh, to which around 45 new bird species are added by WCBCL members.

Recently recorded birds in the list are -Rook, Rustic Bunting, and Rough Legged Buzzard. Rough-legged Buzzard is a new record for India as well.

Q. What are threats to the migratory birds and can you tell us about the birds that are on the verge of extinction?

This barren and dry-looking land is home, breeding ground, and resting point for many rare migratory birds, including Black-necked Crane. But where there is a development, there is a conflict with nature and wildlife. The migration of birds is a natural process, therefore maintaining balance becomes very necessary.

Drying up of Guphuk lake near Spituk is the best example of a threat to the migratory birds. The lake is a resting point for around 30-40 bird

Wildlife is as important as clothes, food and shelter. Our existence depends on them, therefore developmental activities should be carried out keeping the aspiration of the people and ecological sensitivity intact. Peaceful coexistence of humans and wildlife is utmost importance.

species. Wetlands, where the birds used to get their food in the form of water bugs, aquatic vegetation, invertebrates, seeds,

grains, and small fish and worms, are being encroached at a large scale by doing construction. Feral dogs are also one of the threats to wildlife, they kill around 300-400 small birds and mammals in months if remain loose in the wild.

Therefore we must control the population of long-range/stray/feral dogs.

Birds such as Black Necked Crane, Saker, Cinerous Vultures, Palla's Fish Eagle, Siberian crane are some of the threatened bird species from Ladakh.

Q. Poaching cases in Ladakh are a serious concern. What you have to say about it and the reason behind less conviction?

The wildlife department is understaffed with near around 35-40 manpower strength which is very less as compared to the vast geographical area. Patrolling/policing can't be done all the time and in all the areas. I feel that poaching is happening more frequently because of the lenient law. The existing law states Rs. 25000 maximum as a fine with bailable. There is a need for a strong wildlife act, stricter and more stringent action to create deterrence among the poachers.

People are also not aware of such cases and we must create awareness among the people through radio and social media regarding poaching. So that people could inform the stakeholders on time, whenever such acts come to their notice. Back in those days, Bakula Rinpoche educated people about wildlife when people did not know about wildlife act in Ladakh. He advised people about the importance of wildlife and why we should not kill them; it was effective. Therefore, religious heads could play an important role in wildlife conservation.

Q. What are the challenges and threats faced on wildlife due to increasing tourism?

Unprecedented human developmental activities because of the increasing tourist influx are one of the biggest threats for wildlife. We have seen many people driving off roads disturbing the wildlife habitat, bikers chasing wild asses, feeding the wildlife such as marmots, foxes, etc, polluting the land and water. Tibetan Gazelle once seen in good numbers in the Changthang region is now found in a small part of Hanle village periphery known as Kalak Ter-Ter. The number of species is reduced because of vehicular movement, tourism, and army camps. Similarly, Pallas Cat keeps changing its habitat to avoid human presence. Many birds visit Ladakh for breeding, but many cannot breed due to disturbance and habitat issues. It is said that in Tsokar 15 years back the number of Bar-headed Goose and Ruddy Shelduck used to be more than 1300-1500, which has

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

But he did not stop there. "If you are not satisfied with your incremental changes", he had said, "you can go for a more daring and revolutionary move."


But that too needs a daily, steady change, though in a bolder way.

Ladakh promised more than 6000 jobs, which seems to build a castle in the air now. So far UT Administration has done nothing to solve the crisis, instead, they did recruitment through outsourcing.

We are still in confusion as far as a safeguard is a concern, I have been gone through few articles of the Constitution, and therefore in my opinion Sixth Schedule is the best for Ladakh's safeguards. There may be some flaws that can be amended later. It is the job of the ruling party to solve the issue because they have been elected by the people. If they can't solve the crisis then they must resign.

Strengthening of LAHDC is the need of the hour. There should be open debate and discussion among Hill Council, UT Administration, and the expert from Ladakh to get the best solution. In my opinion, both CEC must come together to draft a recruitment policy by forming a committee at the Council level.




TSERING NORDON, Student Activist: The transition period from district to UT Ladakh has not been smooth. There has been turmoil regarding so many issues. The biggest issue that concerns me is the protection of our land, traditions, and culture to have the overall development that we want. This kind of pro-

tection does not mean that we want to be disintegrated with India. Post UT I expected that there would be something substantial, a kind of domicile coming in the form of the 6th schedule. It has almost been a year and a half now. The kind of development we want should be at par with the local needs of the people and the environment. One of the major concerns that we are facing post UT status is unemployment. Before UT status we had a commission for recruitment

and all the students used to apply in JKPSC. As of now, we don't have any commission board for recruitment and the jobs are contractual. All the recruitment now is been taken by UPSC and I fear that the students from far-flung areas who are not as privileged and as economically stable like the students in the plains might suffer. There is no equal level playing field.

I think I am still in confusion how I feel post-UT and I am more dissatisfied than satisfied because this is not the UT we asked for. We asked for a UT where we could be ruled by someone who would understand our needs. Being in a democratic India people of Ladakh should be asked what they want. There is much to do about all these issues. Firstly, they should form a commission for recruitment because the youth are frustrated regarding unemployment. Secondly, we need a very strong and vocal apex body for protection. Thirdly, as a woman, I'd like to say that there should be a reservation in LAHDC for women like there is a 33% reservation in the parliament. Last but not the least, there should be a dialogue negotiation between Leh and Kargil. They have always been locking their horns over issues. So, the step forward should be the integration policy for Leh and Kargil.



STANZIN CHOSPHEL, President, Student Union Nubra: We had been demanding UT status for quite a long time and there were great expectations. Subsequently, the expectations that we had and what we got are not satisfactory. Our environment, culture, and jobs are not se-

safeguard. The apex body and the student leaders are still soliciting some form of security. I expected that a lot of jobless students would get a chance to apply for the vacancies. But the development is cynically directing more.

Initially, we celebrated the UT status without knowing the consequences but now we all are aware that it is not something we wanted. In 2020 student presidents visited places like Bodoland and Meghalaya to study and research the 6th schedule on the ground where we acknowledged how effective it is.

In the form of education, there are hardly any changes or development. Everybody has an idea about the Khelo India scheme which was introduced post-UT to villages like Nubra. This scheme focuses on excelling in sports so there were inter-village sports competitions. The word 'Khelo' means 'play' but I feel that it is more about playing with the future of the children.

Lieutenant Governor R.K. Mathur stated to be self-dependent and asked not to rely on Government jobs. He emphasized entrepreneurship and also held a Skill Development workshop.

I still have a year to graduate and I might prepare myself to be self-reliant but what about the people who graduated and are done with their Ph.D. in the specific fields? They have been hoping for job recruitments for almost two years now. MP Ladakh informed us about 6000+ job recruitments that might happen for Ladakh and if it does then we would highly appreciate and be grateful to the government. Initiatives like skill development workshops are in a way for the betterment of Ladakh and such strategies are most welcome.

One of the leading issues is that our land and people need a safeguard and it is distressing to see that we are not in safe hands. For now, the only key to shield Ladakh is some kind of a law like Permanent Resident Certificate (PRC) which is null and void after bifurcation but we need something through which we can prove to be the residents of our land.



STANZIN THARDOTH, Former President, LSWSD: After bifurcation, the people of Ladakh expected an era of overall development of Ladakh along with safeguard but unfortunately, the ground reality is very different. One and a half years after Union Territory status, unemployment and safeguard have become

burning issues. Ladakh is a region of unique culture, tradition, fragile environment and further 97% population are tribal safeguard becomes a necessity. Although the area of Ladakh is huge but being a

Cleanliness and hygiene amidst COVID-19

Covid-19 pandemic has grappled the world. Although the world has witnessed many pandemics before, Covid-19 has changed us and our surroundings in every possible way. Most importantly, this

pandemic has taught us to keep ourselves healthy and hygienic more than ever. We have to sanitise and wash our hands, maintain social distance and wear masks to protect ourselves from the coronavirus. Sanitising means keeping ourselves clean and hygienic, which is nothing unusual. Initially, the people were conscious and took measures to fight Covid-19. However, the Covid-19 cases have increased exponentially in Ladakh and across the globe. Does that mean that the people not doing enough to keep themselves and others protected?

The virgin landscapes of Ladakh have witnessed overexploitation by the footfall of the tourists, especially the generation of waste, in the past few decades. We have been blaming the tourists for this problem. However, we saw heaps of waste in 2020 despite the absence of tourists in Ladakh due to the nationwide lockdown.

Even when the administration advised the people to stay indoors, many went out for picnics with friends and families and littered picnic spots near the riv-

People are throwing garbage openly on unused lands. The spot near Dewachan, Mahabodhi, is one such example. Disposal of waste in landfills is not suitable for a region like Ladakh.

Phunsok Angmo, a thematic expert on solid waste management (SWM), who wrote a detailed strategy plan (DSP) for the EU-Liveable Leh project, is focused on the quantum of waste generated due to Covid-19. According to Phunsok, domestic hazardous waste like gloves, masks, PPE kits, face shields and sanitiser bottles add to the waste in Ladakh. Bio-medical waste, including face masks, PPE kits, gloves and testing kits (both rapid and RTPC), are also produced. There are numerous challenges in the disposal of waste, and these wastes eventually end up in the landfill at Bomb Garh.

Such methods of disposal of waste impact the sanitation workers and the people.

The Municipal Committee Leh and the urban local body are making efforts to maintain the town's hygiene using traditional and scientific methods. The local administration came across Tesla Blackhole, a plasmic decomposition laser-based technology, in 2018. The machine works without electricity and fuel and turns waste into ash, except glass. The ash is used to fertile the soil and construction of roads. The Blackhole is a sustainable way for waste man-

Anub Tsetan Paljor, a member of the Water and Sanitation (Watsan) team of the EU-Liveable Leh project, said: "The administrative bodies in Leh are serious about the hygiene of Ladakh. With the new surge in Cobid-19 cases over the last couple of weeks, it seems like the second wave is hitting. So, everyone is alarmed. The public in Leh is seriously following Covid Appropriate Behaviour such as using a face mask and maintaining social distance. It depends on each individual whether to follow basic hygiene practices like washing hands. This year has taught us a lot about how even the simplest of acts like washing hands can help reduce the chances of contacting Covid-19. People are unable to maintain social distancing. No matter how much we try, we end up going to a restaurant or café or maybe the market these days, where we fail to maintain social distancing. The administration should look into partial lockdown like night curfews of the Covid-19 cases continue to increase.'

Anub stressed that there are sections of the population more vulnerable than others to Covid-19. These are the healthcare workers, police personnel



and emergency workers. Then there are sanitation workers who clean, collect and dispose of garbage (solid waste, liquid waste, biohazardous, etc.) of the entire town. Such frontline workers are the most exposed and need all possible means to protect themselves. The cleanliness of Leh town depends upon

The absence of dustbins at places like the traffic police chowk at Skalzangling and the Skara-Shenam road compels many people to litter the roadside. The timing of the MC Leh garbage truck is another big challenge.

These are tough times and need the support of each other to live a healthy and hygienic life.

reduced to around 400 now. Humans are disturbing and reducing wildlife habitats and pushing them into very limited areas.

There has been always a tussle between wildlife and tourism. Regulating the number of tourists at a time and proper guiding can be an effective solution. There is an immense need for promoting responsible tourism because it is affecting the wildlife and ecology of Ladakh.

Q. Sanctuary and the national park have restricted the pace of development activities. What is your take on that?

The demarcation of sanctuaries and national parks

in Ladakh was carried out at a higher level without the engagement of the local population, during the rationalization of the boundaries. For example, the maximum area of Karakoram Sanctuary is considered roughly 15,000 sq km, and the minimum area is considered somewhat 6000 sq. km, look at the difference. We don't know where it starts and where it ends.

Therefore, proper demarcation is needed to smoothly pursue developmental activities without harming wildlife habitats. For example, Tsokar which is recently declared as the 42nd Ramsar site in India has a proper demarcated boundary, which includes only the part of the lake, not the settlement area. Conservation along with development is a must for peaceful co-existence.

LEH: Secretary, Animal / Sheep Husbandry and Fisheries Department, Ravinder Kumar convened a meeting with the National Dairy Development Board (NDDB) on April 9 at Secretariat.

Detailed discussion on the benchmark report for Leh and Kargil, exploring the possibility of collaboration with Mother Dairy for milk procurement operations and milk supply to the army was held. The meeting also discussed on developing marketing operations in the region and preparation of DPR for Kargil district.

Secretary, Ravinder informed that they have already completed the documentation process and will register the societies soon.

Talking about the sampling, the officials from NDDB informed that the sample was taken from 50 villages and is above 20%. Out of 78,000 litres of produc-

tion estimation around 65% of production is from the Kargil district. Also, the officials from NDDB stressed for a dairy development initiative in Kargil as well. Secretary informed that the department is planning to have a dairy development initiative in Kargil also.


LEH: Ravinder Kumar, Secretary, Agriculture/Horticulture Department UT Ladakh convened a meeting on April 2 to discuss the Ladakh Green House Project and its tendering process for effective and timely implementation in UT Ladakh.


He asked the officers to flout the tenders block-wise and asked to complete the project this year. He further informed that at the district level, block-wise tendering will be done as per the terms and conditions.

For tendering process, he asked DC, Leh, to form a committee that will comprise members from different departments. Also, he asked to form a monitoring committee that will monitor & inspect the project.

Ravinder Kumar also informed that these greenhouses will be set up in all major areas and the dependency for airlifting food to Ladakh will be substantially reduced once the produce starts coming before winters.

Keeping in view the heavy snowfall in Kargil, the Chief Agriculture Officer, Kargil requested the Secretary to change the design of the greenhouse as per the requirement of the area. Director, DIHAR was asked to send a team to Kargil to decide on the design. The officers were asked to ensure the quality of greenhouses and to complete it before July 2021.















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
