"We are in the initial stage and our performance may not be the best in such championship but the biggest thing I feel at this time is the exposure and ex-



First Buckwheat Flower Festival held in Leh

Aims to promote buckwheat potential & production

SKURBUCHAN: The 1st Buckwheat Flower Festival was organised by the UT Administration Ladakh in collaboration with Skitchan Kunfun Deton Tsogspa Skurbuchan on September 11 and 12 at Skurbuchan village.

The two-day festival is part of the Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav celebrations commemorating 75 years of India's Independence. Various dishes prepared from buckwheat and other farmer's produce were showered.

Inaugurating the festival, Executive Councillor, Agriculture, LAHDC Leh, Stanzin Chosphel said that the Buckwheat Flower Festival has been organised to promote the importance and significance of buckwheat. Ladakh Administration issues Resident Certificate Order

Prescribed age limit for entry into government service also relaxed by two years

LEH: The Administration of Union territory of Ladakh, today, issued an order to temporarily define 'Resident of Union territory of Ladakh' for the purpose of appointment to all the non-gazetted posts borne on the establishment of any Department or service of Administration of Union territory of Ladakh on September 4.

According to the Ladakh Resident Certificate Order 2021, any person who possesses a Permanent Resident Certificate issued by the competent authority in the districts of Leh and Kargil or belongs to a category of persons who would have been eligible to

be issued Permanent Resident Certificate by the competent authority in the districts of Leh and Kargil shall be eligible to receive the Resident Certificate.

The order further says that children of persons possessing a Permanent Resident Certificate or children of persons who belonged to a category of persons who would have been eligible to be issued Permanent Resident Certificate by the competent authority in the districts of Leh and Kargil shall also be eligible to receive the Resident Certificate.

The provisions of this order authorises the Tehsildar or any other officer notified by the Administration as the competent authority to issue the Resident Certificate.

The Administration of Union Territory of Ladakh also enhanced the upper age limit for entry into government services against all posts meant for direct recruitment other than those pertaining to gazetted officers. The upper age limit has been enhanced for the reserved category candidates from 43 years to 45 years, for the general category candidates from 40 to 42 years and for the physically challenged candidates from 42 to 44 years. The order further states that this age relaxation would be a onetime exception and this relaxation shall remain in force for a period of two years

tiative is one of the firsts in this direction.

He stated that with ongoing climate change world over, becoming Carbon Neutral is not a choice but a necessity. Further, he stressed the need for commercial-scale of production with the help of innovative technologies such as lift irrigation system to bring maximum benefits to the farmers and generate employment opportunities to the youth.

"The commercial development of the agriculture sector is vital for the economy of Ladakh, as Tourism has proven to be uncertain recently and it is best to give importance to the primary sector," stated LG Mathur.

He also highlighted the need to include sectors such as dairy, poultry, fisheries, etc. to the concept of 'organic'.

Cluster villages of Igoo, Shara, Chamshen, Partapur, and Skampuk have been awarded Participatory Guarantee System (PGS) Green certification, completing the first phase of certification. Two more phases will be completed over the next two years.

CEC LAHDC Leh, Tashi Gyalson stressed the need for exploring sustainable projects in the agricultural sector of Ladakh. He highlighted that the youth need to explore more scope and possi-

bilities in this sector with sustainable solutions. He appreciated the contribution from the stakeholders which includes the line departments, scientific research institutes, and the governing body led by the concerned ECs in promoting and exploring various initiatives for making Ladakh the first Organic UT in the country. He also requested the scientific community and the UT Administration to recommend feasible schemes and initiatives to be introduced in the Changthang sub-division via the agricultural department to generate a new source of livelihood for the region.

MP Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal stated that Ladakh was facing challenges due to lack of adequate funds and resources to form such policies before becoming Union Territory. He highlighted that it was LAHDC that worked on the formation of an organic mission policy in the year 2018 to make Ladakh self-sustainable and fully organic in the future like it was before introducing and experimenting with modern technologies in the region. He stressed the need for implementing Prime Minister, Narendra Modi's initiative of having 'Vocal for Local' in this mission towards making Ladakh an Organic state in the country after Sikkim.

LEH: A review meeting on winter stocking in both Leh and Kargil district for the forthcoming winter was convened by Divisional Commissioner, Ladakh, Saugat Biswas on September 10.

Divisional Commissioner, Biswas inquired about the stocking of kerosene, sugar, diesel, petrol, medicine stocking and supply equipment, essentials commodities for the winter. The concerned officials from both districts updated the status of all the essential commodities stocking.

The Cooperative Department was directed to start the process of procurement of essential supplies and to utilize the cold storage at the optimal level. He directed the Deputy Commis-

tion Limited (HPCL) were urged to provide dealerships to locals in inaccessible areas to address the issue of lack of availability of fuel.

District Forest Officer (DFO) Leh, Mohammad Ali informed that about 2600 quintals of firewood are stocked by the department in Leh for the winter. Similarly, Chief Animal Husbandry Officer (CAHO) Leh, Mohammad Iqbal apprised the Divisional Commissioner, Saugat about the steps being taken for quick procurement of fodder, feed, medicines, fish seeds, etc by the department.

Saugat Biswas also enquired about the operations of DG Sets during winter and urged the department to ensure servicing and upkeep of the DG Sets for uninterrupted supply.

The concerned officers of various departments & representatives of the Merchant Association of both the districts apprised Biswas regarding the problems they have been facing. The Merchant Association representatives were directed to work in close coordination with the office of the Deputy Commissioner and Cooperative Department for ensuring seamless supplies.

Div Com, Ladakh, reviews progress of relief & reconstruction work after flashflood in Kargil

Secretary DMRRR, Ladakh, Saugat Biswas enquired about the temporary and permanent restoration projects in Kargil from the concerned officials. The repair and restoration projects in the wake of the recent flash floods include schemes for crops and houses damaged due to flood, drought, irrigation khul, soil conservation, rural development, water restoration, livestock loss, Power Development Department (PDD), bridges and roads, and mechanical division.

He also asked about the ongoing work to provide relief to the affected families and the work completed to date. He also enquired about the release of funds for the completion of the work at



the earliest.



IT Secretary inaugurates 5-day training on Data Analytics in Life Sciences

Also launches Science, Technology and Innovation Hub (STI) website

LEH: A 5-day training program on advanced data analytics techniques in life sciences is organised by the DST-SEED funded Science, Technology and Innovation Hub, Ladakh at NIELET from September 6.

Secretary, Information Technology of Ladakh, Saugat Biswas inaugurated the training program and applauded the collaborative efforts of CSIR-IMTECH, NIEL-IT Jammu & Leh, and PGIMER Chandigarh for establishing the DST-SEED funded STI Hub in Ladakh. Saugat Biswas said that the training will be instrumental in Re-skilling, Up-skilling, and new skilling of the participant. He also launched the website of the STI Hub stihubladakh.org.

The training of the trainers' program from 6th to 10th September 2021 intends to train the participants in advanced data analytics techniques involved in life sciences. The course will help participants to handle, analyze, and interpret massive real-life datasets in life science. The expert lectures and practical sessions employ programming approaches on real datasets in Python & R, AI/ML for predictive model-

ing, and case studies.

Twenty-five researchers, scientists, and academicians participating in the training program from twelve institutions - DR-DO-DIHAR, University of Ladakh, SNM Medical College Ladakh, University of Kashmir, Central University of Jammu, NITTTR, UIDAI, HNB Garhwal University, NIELIT, etc. The eminent speakers are engaged from six different institutions – IIITD, CSIR-IGIB, SKUAST, PGIMER, University of California, and UPES Dehradun.

Director CSIR-IMTECH, Sanjeev Khosla mentioned that STI Hub is an exemplary collaborative project by CSIR-IMTECH, Chandigarh, along with PGIMER, Chandigarh, NIELIT Jammu, and NIELIT, Leh. He further said that it is a collaboration wherein three organizations have come together to promote Innovation, Skill Development, Digital Healthcare with tele-diagnostics, creation of knowledge base, and awareness in Agriculture, Horticulture, and Animal Husbandry. With this, it has become the first such STI Hub in Ladakh, UT.

Director, NIELIT Jammu, DS Oberoi encouraged the participants to put forth their queries to the speakers for maximum learning during the training program.

Scientist and Controlling Officer NIELIT, Leh, Phuntsog Toldhan briefed all five days' scheduled session plans. He said that the training aims to help researchers and trainers impart their respective trainings more efficiently and effectively

Scientist at CSIR-IMTECH and Project Leader STI Hub, Chander Shekhar spoke about the infrastructure and facilities available at Hub. He said the STI Hub shall significantly boost entrepreneurship in IoT-based devices, edutech, agritech, etc. The Hub aims to actively promote ideas, engage mentors, alumni, fund providers, experts, consultants, and industry to build an empowering ecosystem through various programs and activities. Also, the STI Hub shall promote digital health and scientific knowledge among people in rural areas in agriculture, horticulture, and animal husbandry.

Secretary IT stressed on providing the information about the project to sectorial officers of Administration of Union Territory of Ladakh also.



dia. On September 5, 1888, Dr. Radhakrishnan was born to a Brahmin family in Tiruttani of Andhra Pradesh. He was a renowned philosopher, statesman, and teacher. Dr. Radhakrishnan was a celebrated academician. He taught at Chennai's Presidency College, Calcutta University, and served as a Vice-Chancellor of Andhra University from 1931 to 1936. In 1936, Dr. Radhakrishnan was invited to fill the chair of Spalding Professor of Eastern Religions and Ethics at Oxford which he retained for 16 years.

He was nominated multiple times for the Nobel Prize and was also graced with the Bharat Ratna award in 1954. The British Royal Order of Merit made him an honorary member in 1963.

Dr. Radhakrishan took the office of the Second President of India in 1962, and on this day his students sought his permission to celebrate his birthday, September 5 as a special day. However, he expressed his wish not to celebrate the birthday and rather suggested that it would be an honour if this day was celebrated as Teachers' Day to recognize the contribution of teachers in society. Since 1962, India celebrates Dr. Radhakrishnan's birth anniversary as 'Teachers day', a tribute to all the teachers

Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru once said on Radhakrishnan, "He has served his country in many capacities. But above all, he is a great teacher from who all of us have learned much and will continue to learn. It is India's peculiar privilege to have a great philos-



opher, a great educationist, and a great humanist as her President."

Teacher's day is a great opportunity to show love and respect and to express gratitude to all the teachers who carry a big responsibility, the job of shaping the minds of the students. They impart knowledge and skill to excel in academics, groom personality, shape careers and teach children to be better human beings. 

In Conversation with

Zabir Ahmed, Farmer/ Proprietor, Ladakh Agro Products

Interviewed by Stanzin Dasal

Q. What drove you to become involved in the Integrated farming system?

The agriculture system or pattern of Ladakh can't be compared with other parts of the country. Farmers of Ladakh are on the field for almost 5 months during the peak summer months and in winters greenhouse is the only option available. I wanted to do farming in a very integrated way involving poultry, fish culture, livestock raising, and agriculture. Integrated farming is important in Ladakh keeping the geographical and climatic conditions in mind. Livestock rearing becomes immensely important along with agriculture to keep the cycle ongoing and to maintain the balance. I feel that integrated farming allows people to stay at fully functioning farms to observe work routines and activities that are undergone in the agriculture business on a day-to-day basis. Along with vegetables and other crop cultivation, I have a cow, goats, hens as livestock. I have a Black Bengal goat which is very successful in Ladakh. After September the weather starts changing and during these autumn months I prepare vermicompost and compost using the dead leaves and plants. In the winter months, green leafy vegetables are grown in a greenhouse.

All the system is interrelated, interdependent in the integrated farming system, the waste of cows and goats are used as manures and also the poultry wastes are the best use as a manures for potato, onions, etc. Integrated farming is economically and environmentally sound.

Q. What would you say is the biggest challenge faced by the farmers of Ladakh?

Farming successfully itself is a challenge in this cold desert area and lack of market opportunities, where farmers can sell their produce directly at good rates are major challenges faced. The farm produce of Ladakh is considered best but on the other direct market opportunity is less. In this fast-growing world where everything is going digital and technology-based, farmers of Ladakh are finding it difficult to sell their produce or do proper marketing. Also, water scarcity is becoming a major challenge in various parts of Ladakh because of less snowfall and rainfall. The technology of sprinkle and drip irrigation is there but in Ladakh that also needs to be introduced in a more efficient and accessible way.

Q. Tell us about the potential of fish and poultry farming in Ladakh.

Fishery and poultry are becoming a booming business in Ladakh. Ladakh is bestowed with a large number of water bodies with clean fresh and highly oxygenated water which is suitable for trout fish culture.

Poultry is another potential sector. Ladakh remains cut off during the winter months and the non-availability of fresh eggs is a problem. The demand for fresh eggs can be easily met by encouraging poultry farming.

Awareness programs are needed from time to time to attract youth to these new types of employment opportunities.

Q. Many takes farming activity as a last option after all the employment opportunity. What you have to say and how youths can play a pivotal role in uplifting the sector.

In some European countries, farming activity is considered very respectable work. But unfortunately, it is assumed that farming is not for educated youths. Time has changed now, many youths are exploring agriculture and excelling in various fields. Today, the administration of Ladakh is planning to make Ladakh an Organic state, and youths can play

Educated youths will be more informed and well acquainted with new technologies, market scopes, etc. Because of the change in temperature and new farm technologies, many new seasonal fruits and vegetables are growing in Ladakh such as watermelon, cucumber, brinjal, bottle gourd, etc. The potential of farming is growing in every way, one can earn a good amount in medicinal and aromatic plants also. Farming

earn a good amount in medicinal and aromatic plants also. Farming is a sustainable way of living and we must encourage youths to explore and earn good from farm activities.

If a youth is interested in farming but does not have land, in that

case, he/ she can adopt contract farming, take land for a lease and cultivate. Secondly, support from various levels is needed to encourage more youths into this sector. This will also solve the issues of the field left uncultivated because of the urban migration.

Though farm work is not a glamorous and comfortable way of making money it is a sustainable way of living and with innovation and hard work one can earn well from it.

Q. If you had one piece of advice for young farmers, what would it be?

Agriculture tourism has seen a boost in popularity in recent years. Ladakh being a tourist destination area can also explore the agritourism sector to gain more income and the farm produce may also fetch better value. It is an excellent opportunity to earn and promote sustainable development.

Message to the readers

Agri-tourism can attract a new generation of farmers, offer new opportunities for youth development in rural areas and boost the rural economy. There is a need for plans and policies on such new opportunities to diversify business opportunities and securing a feasible livelihood for farmers.

Trout fish is a high-quality boneless fish having great market value. Fish culture is a profitable venture. Youth needs to come forward and adopt pisciculture also as a source of income. Many schemes are available which can help the youth to excel in this sector. Adoption of recreational fisheries which includes the establishment of aquariums, supply, and breeding of aquarium fishes and angling can promote high-end tourism in Ladakh and provide employment avenues.
