Ladakh youths organise peace protest over unemployment

LEH: All Ladakh Unemployment Youth Association (ALUYA) organised a peaceful protest rally against the rising unemployment issue in Ladakh on October 18.

The protest was supported by all student unions, the apex body, and civil societies and demanded permanent job creation, end to outsourcing and deputation services.

It's been nearly two years since the new Union Territory is formed and so far, no job opening in Ladakh forced the educated youths of Ladakh to come out on the street and shout. The much-promised UT status has created more chaos and confusion among the people. On one hand, leaders count the achievements but on the other hand, fail to address the unemployment and safeguard issue.

Tundup Tsering, President ALUYA said, "Unemployed youths of Ladakh had great expectation of job creation in the new UT set up. We did wait for months

and years for the streamline of the newly born administration but unfortunately last winter they introduced an outsourcing system through which many were recruited on a contractual basis without any transparency. The administration forced us to come on the roads and shout for our rights."

He also spoke about the need of establishing the Ladakh Public Service Commission.

"Not a single job was created in the last two years and from the statements of political leaders, it seems still uncertain.

The protest was scheduled to culminate at Leh main market but has to change the venue to Pologround at the last moment. Students alleged that the book fair in the name of Late Tashi Rabgias organised by BJP and camps for issuing Resident Certificate at tehsil office by the administration is a conspiracy to subside the protest of youths.

MP Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal also stated that Ladakhis need to remember the contributions of such eminent scholars. He added that the youth of Ladakh should revisit the rich legacy left behind by late Tashi Rabgias in the field of art, culture, and literature and enhance the literature culture with the help of prominent scholars in the present time.

DUBAI: Ladakh showcases its development and vast opportunities in the region at the India Pavilion, Expo 2020 Dubai. The Administration of Union Territory of Ladakh and FICCI kickstarted the proceedings as part of the 'Ladakh Week' on October 22 scheduled to go on till 4 November.

A series of events showcasing opportunities across focus sectors like sustainable infrastructure, connectivity, food processing, and tourism in UT Ladakh will be showcased.

Delivering the keynote address during the inaugural session 'Development after UT & Vision 2050', Saugat Biswas, Divisional Commissioner/Secretary, Industries & Commerce, Ladakh said,

"Ladakh is going to be here at the India Pavilion for the next 14 days. We want to bring Ladakh face to face with the world at the Expo 2020 Dubai."

Talking about the opportunities in the region, he said, "Ladakh became Union Territory on 31st October 2019 and since then a lot of development activities have taken place across focus sectors like sustainable infrastructure, connectivity, food processing, and tourism. Ladakh police pay tributes to martyrs on Police Commemoration Day

377 police personnel lost their life serving the country this year

CHOGLAMSAR: Rich tribute was paid to the martyrs during the Police Commemoration day observed by Ladakh police on October 21 at Police line Choglamsar.

Family members of the martyrs from Ladakh were also invited and honoured on the occasion. UT administration officials and security forces also paid tribute to the martyrs who sacrificed their lives while serving the nation.

S.S Khandare, ADGP, Ladakh Police said, "On this day our boys had sacrificed their lives while defending the integrity of the nation at Indo-China border in 1959. It is a proud moment for the entire police force of the country. Today, we must all learn a lesson and take an oath to protect our country and society. When it comes to performing our duty we must not compromise."

He informed that every year around 1000 police personnel

sacrifice their lives while performing their duty in India. This year around 377 police personnel have lost their lives while serving the nation.

Rajiv Pandey, SSP, Leh read out the names of all the 377 police personnel who lost their lives while serving the country this year. Gulzar Ahmad, Head Constable, Ladakh Police was one of them.

Kunzang Dechen, one of the Hot Spring survivors shared that

they use horses for patrolling or transportation of ration and used to sleep in open during the harsh climatic condition as no shelter was there at that time at the border. It used to take more than 15 days to reach there as road infrastructure was not good.

Police Commemoration Day is observed on October 21 every year to pay respects to the 10 policemen who were killed by Chinese troops in an ambush at Hot Springs area, Ladakh on October 21, 1959.

Lobzang Spaldan, President LEAF, questioned Hill Council and MP Ladakh that why they have not announced it earlier. Why every activity has to coincide with the student's protest.

Thupstan Chhewang, Chairman Apex body said, "We have thanked BJP led centre government for granting us Union Territory (UT) status. We hoped for many good things but unfortunately, nearly two years are gone, and not so much has been achieved so far. Unfortunately, UT administration, Hill Council, and District Administration are trying their best to subdue the protest. As per the constitution, we have the right to protest in a democratic way to fulfill our demand."

He threatened the UT administration and Hill Council of holding a bigger protest if they fail to address the issues of students.

"We have waited and tolerated a lot therefore next time we cannot give assurance of peaceful protest. Don't let Ladakh become another Kashmir or North East", he added.

"Domicile law in line of J&K UT was rejected by Apex Body but has suggested them to determine the resident certificate based on PRC issued by the erstwhile J&K state. All this time they have delayed the recruitment process unnecessarily saying that the resident of Ladakh can't be issued based on PRC but today the Resident Certificate is issued on the reference of PRC", he added.

Ashraf Ali Barcha, President Anjuman Imamia stressed the need of having holistic development and strengthening of Ladakh's future. He said that on one hand, everyone talks about preserving and promoting the culture and identity of Ladakh and on the other hand the youths of Ladakh are getting weakened.

He asked political leaders to stop petty politics and think about the future of Ladakh in a real sense.

"Travelling in a helicopter is not the real development of Ladakh. The leaders should understand that it is the people who elect them as their voice and it is their responsibility to work for the welfare of the people", he added.

Dr. Abdul Qayum said, "We are a population of few and why we are not able to understand the issues of Ladakh, whether it is UT Administration or Hill Councils. At the onset of UT, we talked about plenty of job creation and infrastructural prosperity. But the situation is stepping from bad to worst. The work which could be fulfilled earlier is delaying more."

Stanzin Chosphe, President, Student Union Nubra said, "The protest is not only for the students but for the future safeguard of Ladakh. Nowadays many educated youth and degree holders are working in hotels and agencies due to a lack of job opportunities. We have to think that our parents send us to Delhi, Chandigarh, and Bengaluru, etc for better and higher education. What they feel when their child doesn't get a job later?"

With this, the bank has opened its 5,086th branch in India and abroad, which is fully computerized and digitized with an E-gallery facility to provide 24x7 services to Leh's residents. The new branch aims to boost economic activities in the region, but will also facilitate local people to various banking products like housing, education, vehicle,

and agricultural loans, and also reap the benefits of other government schemes.

Addressing the gathering, Managing Director A K Das termed the opening of the branch in Ladakh a historical moment. He said, "Though the population is small but, the business potential in Ladakh is immense. The bank will continue to provide the best-quality banking facilities to its customers and connect more people to mainstream banking with fully digitized facilities."

He further informed that for the defense and paramilitary personnel, the bank added that it has a unique salary account scheme providing free insurance cover.

The bank has reduced the interest rates for vehicle loans to 6.85% and 6.50% for housing loans.

First-ever Ladakh Bird Festival organised

LEH: The first-ever Ladakh Bird Festival organised by the Department of Wildlife Protection, Ladakh in collaboration with the SECURE Himalaya Project commenced on October 28.

CEC, Hill Council, Leh, Tashi Gyalson extended his gratitude to the Department of Wildlife Protection for conducting the first Ladakh Bird Festival and stressed the need for encouraging Avifauna as a part of our culture. Highlighting the importance of the festival, CEC Gyalson stated that it should be a reminder for all of us to work collectively in preserving the fragile ecosystem and educate ourselves and promote the diverse biodiversity of Ladakh.

Principal Secretary, Forest, Ecology & Environment, Pawan Kotwal said that Ladakh has a huge biodiversity. It falls on the pathway of migratory birds and is a paradise for both birds and bird lovers. He said just as humans have highways birds have flyways. He added that we have a huge responsibility to be the custodian of the land. 'Live and Let Live' should not only be applicable for humans but should include all creation as well.

Further, he informed that according to some experts more than 350 species of birds have now been identified in Ladakh. He observed that one of the biggest



strengths of Ladakh is that its people do not hunt. Therefore, it has become a huge refuge for birds and animals alike.

Member of Parliament, Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal congratulated and thanked the dignitaries, officials, and experts on behalf of the people of Ladakh for organizing the first-ever Bird Festival. He said it is the moral responsibility of all Ladakhis to protect the birds in the region.

Chief Wildlife Warden, Department of Wildlife Protection, Ladakh, Preet Pal Singh thanked the dignitaries for gracing the occasion and said, starting from today a large number of events such as panel discussions, field visits, and cultural programs would take place. He assured

all the events taking place in the next three days would be documented to enhance learning about the subject.

As part of the festival, a photo exhibition was held on birds found in Ladakh. The animated storybook 'Tashi the Explorer' was also launched on the occasion. The inaugural session was followed by a panel discussion on Emerging threats to avifauna in Ladakh, and the role of citizen science in bird monitoring and another discussion on Birds in the culture and history of Ladakh was also held.

The First Ladakh Bird Festival is being organized as part of the Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav, celebration. The three-day event is taking place from 28th to 30th October 2021.

Fire and Fury Corps organises medical camp in Leh

Secretary Power chairs meeting for future energy planning of Ladakh

LEH: Secretary Power & NRE, UT Ladakh, Ravinder Kumar discussed and reviewed the energy requirements of UT Ladakh during a meeting with the concerned officials on October 28 at Civil Secretariat Leh.

The concerned officers were asked to make an energy plan for the next 10-15 years keeping in mind the present energy scenario, future energy demand, and supply scenario in the UT down the line of 10-15 years minimum.

Secretary, Ravinder Kumar stressed various factors such as the introduction of e-vehicles, increase in power demand in urban and rural areas due to reliable power availability, sources to meet the demands in line with Carbon Neutrality, augmentation in transmission capacity in and out of UT, Short term and long-term strategies to meet the future demands. The Secretary instructed the SECI to engage consultants to review the actual

power demand in Ladakh and also asked SECI to assure that the 50MW Solar Plant at Taru will be ready to deliver power by October 2022.

Additional CEO, RECPDCL submitted that the distribution infrastructure of the UT needs to be upgraded/augmented in line with the future increase in power demand. RECPDCL is engaged as a handholding agency to PDD Ladakh as well as PMA for the preparation of DPR and action plan for the Revamped Distribution Sector Scheme. He asked RECPDCL to depute manpower for DPR Preparation based on the actual ground situation to meet the actual infrastructure demands, Addl. CEO, RECPDCL confirmed the same and committed to deploying manpower immediately.

Chief Engineer, PDD Ladakh also highlighted some of the failures in materials erected under various CSS such as V-cross arm breakage, Top pin insulator failure, bending of pole top portion,

LA failures, etc., and Addl. CEO was asked to submit a report on these failures and future remedial.

General Manager, SLTS/RE Ladakh submitted that the present SLTS has a power transmission capacity of approximately 150 MW and he informed that PGCIL has taken up the matter for providing stability of the line by providing 15KMs of Cabling at Zojila portion and necessary reactors at Alustang. For augmentation of the transmission capacity of the line, replacing the existing ASCR conductor with HTLS conductor can be taken up. Additionally, PD LREDA submitted that at present all the solar street lightings other than in urban areas are required to be accounted for energy consumption and needs to be metered.

Secretary Power, Ravinder directed RECPDCL to prepare a comprehensive report on the Energy scenario of Ladakh based on inputs from all the stakeholders.

National-level workshop on 'Access to Justice' held in Leh

LEH: A national level workshop on 'Access to Justice for the marginalized in Ladakh' was organised by District Legal Services Authority (DLSA), Leh in collaboration with the Department of Justice (DoJ), Ministry of Law and Justice, GoI under the directions of Ladakh Legal Services Authority (LLSA) on October 28 at DC Conference Hall.

Chairman, DLSA, Deepak Sethi spoke about the role of legal services authorities and government departments in ensuring access to justice for the people of Ladakh.

Director, DoJ, Shailesh Srivastava shared about the initiatives and activities of the Department of Justice in making the Access to Justice programme a success. He added the collaboration with the state law departments and authorities is essential for achieving its goal.

Scheme Coordinator, DoJ, Ravin-



der Pare spoke about the Designing Innovative Solutions and Holistic Access to Justice in India (DISHA) scheme launched by the department, implemented for five years from 2021-2026. He added that DISHA aims to merge different Access to Justice programmes implemented by DoJ while upscaling them to the pan-India level.

LOBZANG SPALDAN, President LEAF: We have demanded Union Territory (UT) status for economic development, equal say, and more job opportunities. On October 31, 2021, we have completed the two years of UT status and it is sad to see that not a single job was created till date. The much-awaited Resident certificate could have been issued a long time back but have been delayed unnecessarily. Though the process of issuing Resident certificates is started finally,

But I do not see any recruitment in the coming days as vacancies of posts will be notified by MHA. Therefore it may take a few years more.

On all platforms, we have come across speeches claiming that there is no dearth of funds in the UT but in these two years, we haven't seen that the common Ladakhi is getting all the benefits. For example, in the case of tourism, few hoteliers have got the benefit of UT administration. Both economically and socially, UT could not bring any prosperity in the life of common Ladakhi. Today one person is handling more than two departments, shortage of manpower is crystal clear. How administration can function well in such a situation.

Being from Zaskar I could see that UT administration policy is urban-centric, as we do not see any satisfactory development in backward rural areas. Opportunities are more for people living around Leh. But youth from rural areas like Nubra, Changthang, Kargil, and Zaskar do not have the same opportunity, as UT level events and workshops are limited to Leh city only. It will further deepen the income disparity in Ladakh which will be a serious issue one day.

Recently, Panchayat Account Assistant and forest guard exam was conducted and we went to Hill Council, Leh with some grievances. Only assurances with no outcome indicate that bureaucracy is an overpowering elected institution. It also seems to undermine the value of democracy.

I could not see the ideal Ladakh which we dreamt of for the last seventy years unless the power remains with the elected representatives

as bureaucrats are not accountable for the economic and social welfare of common Ladakhi, they just work according to their norms. They will not think about the future of Ladakh. Therefore strengthening of political institutions is a must, which can be achieved either in the form of UT with the legislature or through statehood. But ultimate power should be in the hand of elected representatives.



TSEWANG YOUROL, Spoke person ALUYA: We indeed used to lack funds, jobs, and other facilities in the erstwhile state of J&K, but with the formation of UT we expected that core issues like unemployment, social development, and quality of education will improve.

More posts will create in the new setup was the expectation of all youth, unfortunately not a single was created to date. Today many degree holders are living idle in their rooms and are negatively affecting the education system in Ladakh. It is indirectly sending a message to young generations that education cannot give you livelihood. There are many issues to discuss but as a student, I will try to limit my opinion around education. It pains to learn that still most of us have to go outside Ladakh for better and higher education even after UT because of the condition of our higher institutions whether it is EJM College or CIBS.

At the school level, our education system is outdated and ineffective. In addition, the learning system in schools has gone from bad to worse after the Covid pandemic. Shutting schools for a long time is a sign of failure of the administration. The gap between rural and urban education is deepening. Therefore inclusive growth is a must to the overall development of Ladakh. Rural education should get more concern and attention as real Ladakh exists in villages. With UT status we expect that infrastructural facilities and overall education quality will improve in government schools. But the reality is that most of the students do not know how to write an application in rural areas.

Not every child is the same and can come at the same levels but Govt. is trying to convey that all youth should become an entrepreneur. Everyone has their own choice and interest, some study and excel in one

particular field to do the job they are interested in, the government should understand this. Every youth does not have the same entrepreneurial skills and needed funds. Government shows that becoming an entrepreneur in Ladakh is easy, but the reality is the opposite.

We should understand that the foundation of any developed society is education, not buildings and roads. Therefore education system needs to be improved. Safeguard for Ladakh after UT status is a must because of our unique demography fragile environment and limited resources. Therefore safeguard becomes necessary for the existence of Ladakh. Delaying in safeguard will destroy Ladakh.



PADMA STANZIN, President SOUL: For the time being, UT has not been able to fulfill the expectations of the people of Ladakh. People are still in confusion about whether UT has been properly set up or not. Leaders are saying that we have just taken the first step and more time will be required for proper settlement of UT. In this way, we have to suffer more. But I think two years is enough to understand the basic problems of Ladakh. Students are suffering due to a lack of jobs and safeguard is still a mystery.

The much-hyped crores of funds for Ladakh after UT status are invisible because the life of the people is just the same as before. Moreover, the rising inflation has made their life more difficult. Constructing mega projects and organising mega-events may become necessary as a state; it may boost tourism and ease their movement. But these activities cannot benefit the common citizen.

I have been studying in Ladakh, and I feel that education has been the most neglected sector for years. Under J&K we had various problems and were quite hopeful that these problems will solve after UT. Unfortunately, UT administration has also neglected the sector. On one hand, the existing institutions are struggling through various problems like certificates, degrees, and other issues and on the other



Constitution Day of India

Constitution Day or Samvidhan Diwas is celebrated annually in India on 26 November. The day is also known as National Law Day, commemorating the adoption of the Constitution of India. The Constituent Assembly of India adopted the Constitution of India on 26 November, 1949 and it came into effect on 26 January, 1950.

The Constituent Assembly, the body meant to draft the Constitution of India, held its first session on December 9, 1946 attended by 207 members, including nine women. Initially, the assembly had 389 members, but after independence and the partition of India, the strength was reduced to 299. The assembly took over three years to draft the constitution, spending over 114 days considering the




content of the draft alone.

The Constitution Day is celebrated as a mark of tribute to India's first Law Minister BR Ambedkar, who played a pivotal role in drafting the Indian Constitution.

It is a set of written principles and precedents of the Government of India that frames fundamental political principles, procedures, rights, directive principles, restrictions, and duties of the government and the citizens of the country. It declares India to be a sovereign, secular, socialist, and democratic republic and assures its citizens' equality, liberty, and justice.

In Conversation with Kacho Ahmad Khan, State Awardee, Actor/Director

Interviewed by Stanzin Dasal

Q. Congratulation on receiving State Award under the Theatre Artist category. Tell us about yourself and how you got interested in the world of theatre and film?

I am from Gongma Minjee village of Kargil district and like every other village child; I grew up listening to the folklores and stories told by my late father. The way he used to tell a story made me imagine the whole scenes which have helped me in developing a creative mind. Back in those days, we used to have a tape recorder and my dad use to make me record azaan, folk songs, etc. I love to hear my recorded voice. All these beautiful small things ingrained the love for art and creativity. In school, all my classmates and teachers used to make me sing a song, and speak during morning assembly. I became much like a contractor that time, 'If anyone hesitates to speak in front of the assembly I speak on behalf and they use to give stationeries, carrot, turnip, etc, in return.

My first performance in a drama was when I was in class 10th used my creativity and made the dress as per my character. Everyone appreciated and loved it, at that moment I felt that it's a very cool thing to be in drama. When I was in Class 11th a joke from 'Ajang Jor Jor' in Leh was very famous, it used to come in audio form. One of the teachers during a scout camp offered me an opportunity to record jokes like Ajang Jor Jor. I start working on it but the jokes turns out all action-based, and it can't be narrated. I asked them that we need to change it because it's not coming out the way it is needed. The teacher asked me to write the script to shoot in video form. The video was shot and was loved by all. Time went by and I went to Delhi to pursue my higher education. The sole purpose of coming to Delhi was to study Mass communication or get into the creative line. My friends and senior asked me to pursue regular academics like every other student and with their help, I got enrolled myself in Jamia University for a BA course.

During my college days, one day I saw a poster related to music I joined the session and took part in all the activities which were fun and interesting. The word theatre was new for me but after being part of the group I came across that the theatre is drama only. I did my first street play 'Baat ka Batankghad' and played the role of a vegetable vendor. I used to listen to the call of a vegetable vendor passing my room every day and mimicked the way he used to call people to buy vegetables. I rehearsed and performed before the director, he was impressed.

I was a part of Jamia Drama Theatre Club and have been actively associated with them. A friend named Mahesh asked me to fill the form of the National School of Drama. He lured me by saying that great actors named Naseeruddin Shah, Anupam Kher was alumni of NSD. Hearing that, I felt that it is something that I need to experience. I got selected in NSD in the year 2010 and graduated in the year 2013. That's how my journey in theatre started!

Q. You are the Founder Director of the first theatre group in Kargil named RANTHAG. Brief us about its journey and the role it is playing in society.

Ranthag is a traditional water mill used to grind wheat, barley, buckwheat, etc. I found it very interesting; it acts like a small industry where grains are refined. For e.g, you put roasted barley in it and you will get 'Ngamphey'. Inspired by it we named the theatre group Ranthag because it also plays a similar role, grooms the personality of a person, and shapes them up to become a good artist. RANTHAG stands for Regional Art and Theatre Art Group and was formed by selecting the best performers from various workshops. Ranthak awares people about the ongoing social issues, importance of culture, language, and many more.

Initially, it was difficult to attract people to the group because it was newly formed and also the acceptance of the society is low. Gradually people started accepting us because we gained the confidence of people through our work. Today, many parents ask us to enroll their children and many come voluntarily to join the group.

Over the years, we have screened many plays such as 'Sartaks', a story on divided families; 'Khongey Chi Samed' etc.

Q. What is the status of theatre in Ladakh? How important is it to promote it?

Talking in terms of Kargil district, 30-40 years back there used to be a group named Sadabahr Drama Club, Gulbahar Dramatic Club, etc. who used to perform but has not been successful because of some issues. And after such a huge gap we have restarted the theatre with some professionalism and most importantly ethics.

Theatre lacks support in Ladakh because those who are in theatre are straightforward, maybe that is one reason the acceptance is low. Through theatre the reality comes out most of the time, there is no hiding and many don't want all this to be shown or seen, this is why it is mostly ignored or given much importance. Nevertheless, many people such as NSD alumni, Mipham Otsal are putting all their effort for so long to promote the theatre and cultural identity of Ladakh.

To promote theatre we need to experiment and explore many new things. Screening the same thing all the time will be a bit boring, we need to bring change with modern thoughts keeping the tradition

and culture intact. We need to understand the taste of the audience, the ongoing trend and work on it to keep the theatre alive.

Q. We have seen your short films on social issues and awareness. How impactful do you think such films are?

Short films on social media platforms are quite needed in today's time because of wider reach in a short time. Through theatre, it will take a lot of time but videos are much easier and simple. The moral or awareness messages carried out in speech will have less impact but the same message if shown through video will reach out to the audience more. What we see will have more effect than what we hear.

There are two reasons behind making short videos, firstly I put my views and opinion through this video, and secondly to promote Purig dialect.

Q. What steps are needed to initiate by the UT Administration/Hill Council regarding the preservation of our culture and tradition?

Today, we have seen various festivals and programs being organised by the UT Administration everywhere but the most unfortunate thing I have observed is that very few people are aware of such festivals. Neither the public nor the tourists are aware of it, only the VIPs and officers are present. It seems the whole idea is to entertain VIP. The artists are informed just a day or two back about such programs and asked to perform. Presenting the cultural show just for the VIPs will not keep the tradition and culture of Ladakh alive.

Artists of Ladakh have so far contributed a lot to society and they are the ones who have carried out the tradition so far.

But, there is no plan for their welfare. Many artists of Ladakh are meeting their day end by performing and have been affected a lot during the pandemic. Nobody is concerned about that.

I appeal to everyone to support all artists and we should all take responsibility to preserve our own culture and identity. UT administration should work at ground level; just doing a festival for VIPs will not help.

hand, Ladakh is getting Central University. I feel the government should first strengthen the existing institutions.

Though the covid pandemic has hit us badly, it also helped us in realizing our fault. Today we can say that the strategy of UT administration in terms of education was an absolute failure. It is also unfortunate that the administration does not permit us easily to do a peaceful protest. Some results and actions are seen only after hues and cries. It seems that the UT administration is intentionally delaying the process of each demand of Ladakh, whether it is safeguard or jobs.
