The main events on Independence Day will be held at the Polo ground, Leh, and the Khree Sultan Cho Stadium, Kargil. The Independence Day parade will include a flypast by the Indian Air force over Polo Ground, Leh to commemorate 75 years of Independence and march past by contingents of Ladakh Police, CRPF, ITBP, Ex-Servicemen, National Cadet Corps, and school students from Leh and Kargil districts. In a display of the Ladakh police force's canine power, the police force's dog squad and their handlers will also participate in the parade. This will be followed by vibrant cultural music and dance programme, honouring the nation's freedom struggle and celebrating its 75 years of Independence by various groups such as the Ladakh Musical Society, Ladakh Cultural Academy, and school

grandly celebrating the 75 years of Independence in the Union territory. He directed that the Raj Niwas, all government buildings in Ladakh and Ladakh Bhawans across the country be illuminated during the 3-day long celebrations starting from August 13 to August 15, 2022. He said that iconic buildings including the Leh Palace should be lit up to mark the festivities and streets be decorated with flags and lights.

Advisor Narula directed for adequate arrangements for parking, seating, drinking water, and deployment of health personnel besides refreshments for participants especially school children during the event.

The year 2022-2023 has been declared as the year of Persons with Disability by the Ladakh Administration. Keeping with this theme and to ensure the participation of Persons with Disability in public events, Advisor Narula suggested inviting their representatives to be a part of the grand celebration.


He also asked the departments to ensure public participation in the national campaign 'Har Ghar Tiranga' by hoisting the tricolour atop houses from August 13 to 15, 2022 and suggested that the general public be encouraged to attend the Independence Day function carrying the national flag.

Secretary Tourism and Culture, Kacho Mehboob Ali Khan apprised the meeting that the tricolour will be hoisted in all the border areas including the entry and exit points of the Indus River in India and the Amrit Sarovar locations besides it being hoisted at important historical sites and mountain peaks such as Umling La pass which at 19,300 feet is now the highest motorable road in the world, other peaks include Khardung La, Chang La etc.

The main event shall be open to the general public after two years of covid when the event could be attended only by invitation keeping with the covid protocols, although wearing face masks to the event will be mandatory.

The meeting was attended by all Administrative Secretaries; Deputy Commissioner, Leh/ Kargil; SSP Leh/Kargil; Officers of the Indian Air Force, ITBP, HQ 14 Corps; Chief Engineer, PWD (R&B), Heads of Departments and other concerned officials from both Leh and Kargil.

Divisional Commissioner visits flood-hit areas of Kargil district, assesses damage

KARGIL: Divisional Commissioner Ladakh, Saugat Biswas visited several flood-hit areas of Kargil including Kargil town, Khawos, Sangrah, and Stakpa on July 28 and took stock of the situation and damages caused by flash floods besides measures being taken by the administration for relief and rehabilitation.

Divisional Commissioner conducted an extensive tour of flood-affected villages and took first-hand appraisal of the situation, extent of damages, and ongoing relief and rehabilitation measures for the affected families. He also took stock of damages to irrigation land, canals, and khuls, standing crops, trees, roads, and residential houses.

The concerned officers were asked to speed up the process of assessment of damages in coordination with PRI members and ensure the preparation of the restoration plan at the earliest.

At Brigade Bagh, Titi Chumik, and Baroo-Sokh areas, Saugat Biswas assessed the debris clearance works and directed to clear debris at the earliest and extend all support to flood-affected families. He further directed to make the National Highway functional at the earliest. At Sangrah, he assessed the damage caused by flash flood and visited damaged

houses and agriculture fields that have come under debris.

To make motorable activity without hindrance, the Divisional Commissioner directed the concerned officers to send a request to NIT Srinagar to engage a structural engineer to check the certification of the Sangrah Bridge.

He inquired from the officers about the status of the progress of works about the excavation and trailing of Sangrah Nallah and damage assessment works related to the Revenue Department and directed to do the allotted works at the earliest.

Divisional Commissioner also visited Khawos village where he took stock of the loss of agriculture and other infrastructural assets

He directed to do the trailing and excavation of Nallah and the rebuilding and restoration of the village school building at the earliest. Further, he directed to prepare a DPR for all the recurring components about flood restoration works including Khaus and Sangrah Nallah.

At Khaus, the Divisional Commissioner also took an assessment of Rural Development works as well. He also interacted with the dislocated families of last year's flash flood and enquired about the status of works

on new houses.

The family members extended gratitude to the UT Administration for extending necessary support for the reconstruction of their houses.

At Stakpa village, Div Com was informed about the status of the excavation and trailing works. It was informed that DPR regarding the trailing of Nallah has already been drafted. Moreover, the villagers demanded that 40 affected families must be relocated to a safer place. They also demanded protection walls and nallah trailing.

The Divisional Commissioner was also informed that machines of the Mechanical Division are on the ground to remove the debris and boulders from Khaus village. He added that excavation works are going on war footing across all flood-affected areas of the district.

Deputy Commissioner and CEO, LAHDC, Kargil Santosh Sukhadeve; SSP Kargil Anayat Ali Chowdhury; Assistant Commissioner Revenue (ACR), Assistant Commissioner Development (ACD), Superintending Engineer I&FC, Superintending Engineer R&B, SDM Kargil and Sankoo besides senior district officers and engineers of various engineering wings accompanied the Divisional Commissioner during the tour.

L-G reviews work progress of Industries & Commerce department

Emphasises on conducting extensive training programs for local craftsmen

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, RK Mathur reviewed the progress of works under the Industries and Commerce Department, Ladakh on July 19.

The status of various projects and schemes, viz. Industry Development Schemes/Policies; progress in the pashmina and sea buckthorn sectors; progress on implementation of various schemes such as Prime Minister Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP), Pradhan Mantri Formalisation of Micro Food Processing Enterprises (PMFME), Industrial Development Scheme (IDS) 2017 &

Weaver Mudra, District as Export Hub; capacity-building and promotion; issues concerning industrial estates; handloom & handicrafts and Comprehensive Handicraft Policy & Action Plan, etc. were discussed during the meeting.

LG Mathur directed the concerned officials to conduct a large number of training programmes in the handicraft sector, especially in wood carving, and directed to distribute requisite tools to the woodworkers. He also instructed to prioritize the Industrial Development Policy/Schemes and stressed the need for the handholding of local entrepreneurs.

Commissioner/Secretary, Industries and Commerce Department, Saugat Biswas, apprised LG Mathur of the Comprehensive Policy and Action Plan for handloom and handicrafts. He shared that it shall be acted upon immediately for livelihood generation. He also apprised of operationalizing a store in the main market of Leh town for the promotion and sale of local handicraft and handloom products of Ladakh.

Director, Industries & Commerce, Ladakh; Joint Director, Handloom & Handicrafts, and other concerned officials from the Industries and Commerce Department attended the virtual meeting.

161 existing sites, 142 new sites to get 4G services in Ladakh: MoS, Communications

NEW DELHI: Minister of State for Communication, Devusinh Chauhan stated that BSNL will convert 161 existing sites into 4G and additional 142 4G sites are planned in the Union Territory of Ladakh. This was stated in response to the question raised by the MP, Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal during a Parliament session on July 27.

JTN asked the Ministry of Communication about the processes of implementing BSNL 5G/4G in India; plans to install a 4G network on all the existing BSNL Towers and whether the government has any proposal to cover all the uncovered hamlets/villages/ areas including Border outpost of Army and ITBP under



USOF.

In response to the question, MoS Communications, Devusinh Chauhan said, "Under Atma-nirbhar initiative of the government, BSNL floated the Expression of Interest (EOI) on January 1, 2021, for registration-cum-Proof of Concept (PoC) from Indian Companies interested in participating in 4G tender. PoC has been provisionally completed. BSNL will convert the existing 161 sites into

4G and additional 142 4G sites are also planned in the Union Territory of Ladakh. Further, the cabinet in its meeting held on 14.06.2022 has, inter alia, reserved spectrum for BSNL for providing 5G services."

The minister also said, "The uncovered villages of the country, including the Union Territory of Ladakh, are being covered by the Government, under USOF scheme, and Telecom Service Providers in a phased manner".

He further said that the proposal for 4G mobile services at Border Out Posts (BoPs) of Border Guard Forces (BGFs) including Indo Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) has been received from MHA for processing and approval.

Draupadi Murmu: India's First Tribal President

Draupadi Murmu a 64-year-old tribal leader from Odisha sworn in as the 15th President of India on July 25.

Murmu was born on June 20, 1958, in Odisha's Mayurbhanj. Born in the Santhal community, the 64-year-old struggled with poverty in her childhood in one of the most remote and underdeveloped districts of the country. She has a bachelor's degree in Arts from Ramadevi Women's College in Bhubaneswar.



Murmu started her political career in 1997 as a councillor in Rairangpur Nagar Panchayat.

In 2000, she became a minister during the BJP-BJD coalition government in Odisha. She was conferred the Nilkanth award in 2007 for best MLA by Odisha Legislative Assembly. She has been an MLA twice on a BJP ticket from Odisha's Rairangpur (2000 and 2009). Murmu created history as she became the first women governor of Jharkhand, the first tribal governor of a tribal state, the first Odisha-born woman to be a governor.

- More than 40% of the world's annual output of mangoes are grown in India, far ahead of the competition from China, Thailand and Bangladesh.

- Hiroshima Day is observed on 6 August. It is the day when in 1945 an atomic bomb was dropped on the city of Hiroshima, Japan. This was the first use of nuclear weapons and just after three days of Hiroshima, another nuclear weapon was dropped on Nagasaki. This happened during World War II, that is, 1939-45. The explosion which was caused due to the bombing wiped out 90% of the city. It immediately killed 70,000 people and tens of thousands later died due to radiation exposure.

In Conversation with

Stanzin Nurboo, Traditional Sculpture

Interviewed by Stanzin Dasal

Q. Can you tell us a little about yourself? How did you start learning traditional sculpture and shaped yourself as an artist?

I studied till class 8th from Govt. Middle School, LehDho, and pursued 6 years degree course in Ladakhi traditional sculpture from the Central Institute of Buddhist Studies, Leh Ladakh. During the course, we didn't just learn about the art, the process, medium, etc, but the ability to communicate, to relate to the reality the understanding of culture, values of the work, sacred, and the work of human virtues. My family always encouraged me to become an artist because they believed in me and my skill. I would say my parent's support had a huge influence on me to learn and work as a professional artist. In 2014 I completed my course at CIBS and started working as a professional.

Q. Tell us about your first work and the statues you have worked upon.

In 2013, I made a small statue of 1st His Holiness Dalai Lama Gyalwa Gendun Drub at Tashi Lhunpo Monastery, Bylakuppe, Karnataka. The project was carried out during my training days. Later, with references to my work I carried out several projects including Gyaltsab je (one of the key disciples of Je Tsongkhapa) at Tashi Lhunpo Monastery, Bylakuppe, Karnataka in 2015, sculpted 13 feet statue of thousand armed Arya Avalokisteshwara at Thukjey monastery in Tsokar, Changthang with one of my colleagues and worked for different monasteries like Sera monastery in Karnataka, Agling, Thiksey and Achinathang monastery in Ladakh. In 2019, I sculpted the statue of Guru Padmasambhava in Keylong, Himachal Pradesh, and also worked as a contemporary artist in Dharamsala. Along with the monastery, I also worked in shrine rooms of many families.

Q. Can you tell us about the status of traditional art in Ladakh? Are youths in Ladakh interested in pursuing it?

Traditional art is a very important part of our culture and tradition. But with time we are witnessing various changes such as the material used in sculpting the statues changed from clay to cement, brass, bronze, etc. One can easily observe that a maximum of the ancient statues in monasteries of Ladakh are made of clay and is also believed that clay statues have more spiritual values. The value of clay idol is more as it consumes a lot of time and is the best material because it is eco-friendly. Today with time the demands and process of making statues are

changing. There was a time when there was no proper institute to learn the arts but after CIBS the status of traditional art grew better.

Interest and passion to learn traditional art are very important. There are certain specifications while making a statue which is very important to follow and for which learning with utmost sincerity and dedication is important. Also, many give up in between because they expect good money from a very difficult start. To get good work and more projects you have to be a good artist.

Less support from the family, lack of confidence to continue it professionally, less patience, financial issue, etc are other issues

Q. What are the challenges faced by the artist of Ladakh?

We need to value the artwork as we give it to the government job. Hardly people in our society ever glorified the fact of being an artist; no one spoke about artists as being special or better. Very few encourage the child to pursue

art or sports as a profession which is why the seriousness towards these fields is less. If we won't make the importance of the art known there will be no interest in it. Secondly, the faith and importance of local artists are less.

Despite having all the talent and skills, several big projects in Ladakh are offered to people from other states because in our society there is this narrative set that whatever is not local is best. Tendering process is also an issue because most of the big projects are funded by the government. The contractors try to complete the project with fewer expenses, thus, end up hiring less experienced people and average-looking projects. Once the project is finished you can't do anything about it. People need to be more attentive and aware of what is being built around them and find the differences. There are many instances of statues and stupas in and around Leh which can be easily differentiated. Some very limited people restore and work on stupas and much of the work is carried out by daily wagers and labour from outside which spoils the very essence of the stupa. A good artist will charge more but will be delivering work with perfection

MP raises question regarding KBR Airport in Parliament

NEW DELHI: MP, Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal raised a question regarding declaring or operating Kushok Bakula Rinpoche Airport, Leh as an International airport, establishing a custom office, and also the provision of a cargo terminal in the new building of the airport on July 21 during the ongoing parliament session.

In response to the question, Minister of State for Civil Aviation, Gen. (Dr) V.K. Singh

(Retd) stated that the Kushok Bakula Rinpoche Airport, Leh is a domestic airport and is notified as Custom Airport by the Ministry of Finance under Custom Act, 1962. He said that at present no such proposal is under consideration. Regarding the declaration and operation of Leh airport as International Airport, Minister replied that it depends upon traffic potential and the demand from the airlines for operation of International flights, bilateral air services agreements, besides provision for ground lighting facilities, instrument landing system, adequate runway, length, immigration, health, and Animal &Plant quarantine services, etc.

Replying to the proposal to make provision for cargo at the New Terminal Building of KBR Airport, Leh, it was stated that it is in the planning stage. However, the Domestic Air Cargo movement is being facilitated through the interim building which has an annual handling capacity of 22, 161 metric tonnes, he added.

Also, we need to give importance and value to the local artist so that we could encourage more and more best of the artist from our region and promote the Ladakhi style of art. It will be great if we could impart the importance of Ladakhi art and culture to everyone and most importantly if possible to the school-going children so that they can value and have in-depth knowledge of the ancient art and culture of Ladakh.

Q. What is your advice to the young aspirant artist?

There will be confusion and doubts while learning the art, many will not support or discourage you but the point is to go on and work with patience and dedication if you want to excel. Learning is a process, getting exposure and interacting with different artists will help.

The DC also applauded employees of PHE and other agencies for the smooth execution of JJM works in the subdivision and expected to reflect the same works in other areas of Kargil.


Earlier, the DC Kargil took a detailed meeting with BDC Chairpersons of Drass and Bhimbhat
