I'm a Buddhist monk, but I respect all religious traditions because at their core is a common message about the value of love and compassion. It's not helpful to talk critically about 'my religion' or 'their religion'.

National Conference on Nalanda Buddhism in 21st Century: Challenges and Response held in Leh

L-G emphasises revival of Nalanda tradition

LEH: National Conference on Nalanda Buddhism in 21st Century: Challenges and Response was held on August 11 at Central Institute of Buddhist Studies (CIBS) in Choglamsar.

The conference was organised by Indian Himalayan Council of Nalanda Buddhist Tradition (IHCNBT) in collaboration with Ladakh Buddhist Association (LBA) and All Ladakh Gonpa Association.

Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Brigadier (Dr) BD Mishra attended the conference. Terming the conference on Nalanda Buddhism in the 21st century as a serious topic, LG emphasised the need to understand the importance and seriousness of the subject to ensure the proper progress and promotion of the Nalanda Buddhist tradition. He recalled his school days when he came across the book, 'The Light of Asia' written by Edwin Arnold and the profound impact the book had on his life. Calling the book a 'Treasure of Knowledge,' LG stated he came to know about the Four Noble Truths and the Eightfold Path from the book.

Sharing his pain to know about the destruction and burning of the Nalanda University following the invasion by Bakhtiyar Khilji at the end of the 12th century, LG stated that the incident teaches us the importance of staying united and the promotion/progression of people of different faiths together.

Highlighting different subjects taught at Nalanda University such as medicine, astrology and logic, etc, LG emphasised the revival of the Nalanda tradition and not just keeping it limited to a dream. He stated that the Prime Minister of India, Narendra Modi is committed to the revival of ancient traditions such as the Nalanda tradition. Appreciating the devotion and dedication of monks and nuns, LG emphasised developing their personalities to enable them to compete with the mainstream so that they can compete in various national-level examinations without forgetting the basics.

He highlighted the importance of standing united to achieve the vision for a developed and prosperous Ladakh. Emphasising the vision for the next 30

years, he stressed the need to take necessary measures to ensure that the Sangha, its darshan and the community are promoted. He stated that unity, cooperation and a single mission should be the goal of the people of Ladakh for the larger interest of the nation.

Chairman, LAHDC Leh. Tashi Gyalson highlighted the relevance of Nalanda tradition of learning in the present age and emphasised its promotion on the global stage. He also highlighted the need for its revival and adaptation for the benefit of people across the globe.

Tashi Gyalson highlighted various initiatives taken by LAHDC Leh with help from UT Administration to promote monastic education. He emphasised on promotion of Bhoti as culture and identity are dependent on it.

MP Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal emphasised promoting Nalanda tradition by using Bhoti as a means. He suggested and recommended promoting Central Institute of Buddhist Studies (CIBS) as a centre of Bhoti learning as the institute already has an approved syllabus and faculty members. He proposed the opening of CIBS feeder schools at monasteries across the Himalayan states.

Vice-President, kh Buddhist Association (LBA), Chering Dorje Lakruk, in his address, highlighted Nalanda University as a key center of learning during the ancient period when students/scholars from across the world came for higher studies and learning.

Advisor Kotwal recommends projects worth ₹2744.80 crore



UT Level Standing Committee meeting chaired by Advisor Ladakh

LEH: UT Level Standing Committee chaired by Advisor Ladakh, Dr. Pawan Kotwal, recommended projects worth ₹ 2744.80 Cr under the Central Road & Infrastructure Fund (CRIF) and Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY-III Phase IĬ).

In the meeting, a total of 53 new/upgradation road projects and 54 bridge projects, spanning 900 km, were proposed under CRIF, with an estimated cost of ₹ 2140 crore for roads and ₹ 605.1 crore for bridges.

Additionally, the committee reviewed 11 road upgradation projects covering 82 km under PMGSY-III Phase II. The projects aim to enhance road connectivity, shorten distances between villages, and connect unconnected habitations to foster sustainable development in rural areas.

Commissioner/Secretary, PWD, Ajeet Kumar Sahu

presented the progress of the ongoing CRIF and PMGSY projects. Under CRIF, 18 projects were completed out of the 22 sanctioned for 2019-20, and works for 17 projects sanctioned during the 2022-23 financial year are in progress. Similarly, under PMGSY-I & II, the department successfully completed 1029.70 km of roads, with a remaining balance of 57.10 km is ex-

Advisor Kotwal emphasized the need for timely project completion to meet set timelines, ensuring enhanced connectivity and development for the people of Ladakh.

September 2023.

The proposed projects underscore the Laďakh Administration's commitment to strengthening road infrastructure and ensuring better connectivity for its citizens. The initiatives will contribute to the overall development and prosperity of the

LG gave a detailed presentation on initiatives taken by the UT Administration along with the two Hill Councils and PRIs for the overall development of Ladakh, including women empowerment, skill development, preservation of pashmina and wood carving, production of apricot and sea buckthorn, promotion of ice hockey and other winter games, promotion of horse polo, carbon neutral initiatives, electric vehicles, Mission Organic Development Initiative (MODI), JJM, Homestays and unique culture of Ladakh, etc.

Highlighting the importance of warfare, strategy and military alliance for Armed and Paramilitary forces, LG emphasised on strategy, organisation, boosting troops' morale and fighting capability along with keeping the nation's security, sovereignty and integrity intact as the responsibility of the officers as they are the future leaders of the nation. A total of 60 water supply schemes, including 29 in Leh district and 31 in Kargil district, were inaugurated which are fully completed.

Councillors on August 3.

It was informed that Ladakh has achieved 80% FHTC coverage in all rural households of Ladakh and three blocks in Ladakh- Lungnak, Thiksay and Singay Lalok along with 68 villages-33 in Kargil and 35 in Leh- have achieved 100% saturation of FHTCs.

Chairman/CEC, LAHDC Leh, Tashi Gyalson said that it is because of the JJM scheme that people of Ladakh living in remote areas have access to potable drinking water. He made some valuable suggestions, viz. improvising soak pits being constructed under MGNREGA, making public stand posts (PSPs) functional in the winter, providing additional budget to carry out O&M works, building capacities of PRI members to enable them to take ownership of the scheme and review the functioning of FHTCs at schools and Anganwadi centres in Ladakh.

M P Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal made several observations about the implementation of the JJM scheme in Ladakh including the panchayats where tap connections were functional during the winter and the need to sustain it, the need to empower the PRI members to take over the responsibility of various works under JJM scheme, the need to inform him about necessary steps to resolve JJM-related issues of various villages flagged by him and stringent action needs to be taken against defaulting contractors, etc.

Advisor to LG, Dr. Pawan Kotwal, who is the Chairman of Apex Committee JJM Leh, lauded the efforts of the department and stakeholders and assured the PRI that government would be provided with all support in O&M of JJM

Mission Director, Jal Jeevan Mission Ladakh and Commissioner/Secretary PHE/IF&C, Ajeet Kumar Sahu apprised that Ladakh was lagging in all the states and UTs in the initial months of the mission's inception and today ranks amongst the highest performers. He further stated that 17 additional blocks have achieved more than 80% coverage and are expected to achieve saturation by 15th August 2023.

During the meeting, various bottlenecks in implementing Jal Jeevan Mission were also discussed, viz reliable power supply including installation of sub-station, etc. as well as a few community issues.

The public representatives raised certain apprehensions about the sustainability of the scheme during winter, the proper policy of handholding PRIs to enable them to effectively operate the scheme, the construction of soakage pits to ensure the functionality of the schemes, early restoration of damaged roads and lanes which were dug during the execution of the scheme, the addition of public stand posts and handpumps as a back-up plan during the winter months.

The Jal Jeevan Mission

Ladakh has also contributed to making Ladakh carbon neutral and more than 1.1 MW capacity of solar plants have been installed so far, which will not only be useful for the water supply scheme but also provide surplus electricity to the nearby household.

Jan bhagidhari was the critical component of the success of the Jal Jeevan Mission. PRIs were involved from the planning stage to the implementation. As per the water supply scheme guidelines, after completion of the scheme, it is to be handed over to the village committees for its operation and maintenance. Considering this aspect, the UT administration has also prepared an O&M policy providing the required funds, powers and manpower support to the PRIs for maintaining these schemes.

Additionally, the social audit of these schemes has been made mandatory where all the stakeholders including the Gram Sabha discussions of issues and solutions for the success of the Jal Jeevan Mission Scheme are recorded and uploaded online. Block-level and district-level committees monitor the implementation of the scheme while technical committees monitor the technical aspects of the scheme.

A robust grievance redressal mechanism and portal have been set up to address the grievances being received by the Jal Jeevan Mission team.

Ladakh after 4 years of UT status

Tundup Thinlas, President, Former President ALUYA: When Ladakh became Union Territory, there were high expectations especially among the youth, for increased job opportunities. It's been 4 years after UT status and the job expectations among the youth are just the same and we are not seeing any significant progress. There is a delay in everything despite several requests to speed up the recruitment process. It's been 4 years, and even today, the administration and political leaders are saying that it's just a little late. The fact is, it's not just a little late but very late because there hasn't been a single joining the civil department in these 4 years.

Youths of Ladakh are frustrated and desperate for jobs because all these years the political leaders had raised high hopes among the youth by announcing varius ous numbers of job opportunities. They promised 12,000 posts and even provided some exact data, mentioning the formation of a Women's Battalion. They keep on showing dreams, but none have been fulfilled so far. Looking beyond recruitment, we have received a fund of 6,000 crore.

However, over the past 4 years, a total fund of 24,000 crore has been allocated. Despite such substantial funds, it is disheartening to see limited progress in development activities on the ground. The UT status for Ladakh is indeed a significant milestone, providing us with a new identity. Previously, not many people were aware of Ladakh, but now it has gained recognition. We have also witnessed the emergence of a separate political landscape, which is a major development for us. When Ladakh was under J&K, our aspirations couldn't be fulfilled due to the dominance of Kashmir-centric politics, leading to biased treatment and discrimination. Now, with direct rule under central government, things have changed. In terms of funds, previously we only received around 50/60 crore for district capital expenditure, but now it has increased to 300 crore, which is a substantial improvement. With such funds, it is important to see the impact on the ground. For that, our leaders need to be innovative, and visionary, and focus on good policymaking, employment generation, and youth-oriented programs to take Ladakh forward. Having a safeguard is very important for Ladakh since we are a culturally and geographically unique trans-Himalayan UT with a small population of only 3 lakhs. Previously, Articles 370 and 35A provided safeguard, but their removal has raised concerns. We need measures in place to protect Ladakh and ensure its preservation.

PT Kunzang, BJP Spokesperson: It has been four years since we became a Union Territory, and there has been significant progress during this time compared to being part of J&K. The amount of funding we receive now is much higher and the development has increased tenfold in areas such as road infrastructure, connectivity, healthcare, education, and overall infrastructure. We can see all of this happening on the ground. When it comes to major achievements, we have seen the construction of connectivity link roads and national highways, the upcoming new airport named Kushok Bakula Rinpoche, railway planning, and surveys for tunnels in various locations like Zojila. In terms of education, Sindhu Central University is progressing well, and there have been upgrades in medical and engineering colleges, as well as development efforts in vibrant villages near the border. On the economic front, our apricot fruit, wood carving, and pashmina all received GI tags. 5G has also been launched, and the Haj committee has sent all plicants of Leh and Kargil to Haj. The budget of the hill council has increased significantly

The attainment of Union Territory status for Ladakh is indeed a dream come true, fulfilled by the Modi-led BJP government. It stands as one of the greatest achievements for the region. Initially, our biggest demand was to become a Union Territory, which was fulfilled by the Modi-led BJP government. However, we later demanded the status of a Union Territory with a legislature. Currently, we lack safeguards, but the BJP has always been

committed in protecting Ladakh and will continue to work towards implementing safeguards.

In 2022, the BJP passed a resolution to demand job opportunities and land protection for the environment in

Ladakh, and they will continue to do so in the future. We should hold hope for Ladakh to receive constitutional safeguards soon. It is important to have safeguards because Ladakh has a small population, and there is a danger of it being wiped out. Therefore, the BJP will always advocate for Ladakh, which is beneficial for the younger generation and the protection of our culture and land.

BJP is ready to do whatever it takes to achieve this.

Sajad Kargili, Political Activist: After the removal of Articles 370 and 35A, our transition to a Union Territory has not brought the expected improvements. We are disappointed with the lack of job opportunities and development in Ladakh. The absence of safeguards, industrial and job employment policies, and inadequate health infrastructure are major concerns. We feel that our ecological and democratic security is at risk. It is important to address these issues and work towards a better future for Ladakh because there are more negative impacts than positive ones since Ladakh became a Union Territory. Direct interference from the central government is a prominent concern. I think we must urge our public representatives to establish policies that prioritize job opportunities. For instance, the establishment of a Ladakh Service Commission would be benefi-

Tundup Norboo Cheetah, President, District Youth Congress: After Ladakh became Union Territory, the older generation here is quite happy, but the younger generation has concerns about the future of jobs, land, and business. Initially, everyone was delighted when their demands were met, but then senior BJP leaders left the party, creating a fear that the UT might bring problems to our land, culture, and jobs. There have been so many protests in these past four years. BJP leaders who resigned are now openly criticizing the party. Initially, all BJP elected representatives were demanding the Sixth Schedule for Ladakh, even in their manifesto. However, now they are saying that Ladakh doesn't require Sixth Schedule. This gives the impression that these individuals are being directed from above.

The biggest disadvantage is that public representatives do not have executive and legislative power, and even the judiciary system is absent. In any part of India where there is no power in the hands of the elected representative, it becomes very difficult and raises questions on democracy. If Ladakh does not have democracy, then living in such a Ladakh means we will never have representation in India's constituency. In the current UT setup, democracy does not seem to be valued. People say that the council has power, but as a councillor, they can only create small rules and cannot legislate.

Ladakh has 2 districts in its territory where 2,72,000 people reside. LG, commissioner secretaries, principal secretaries, and others are working for their welfare. It is a significant achievement to have such a big setup for a small population. Now Ladakh can represent itself in national tournaments and platforms, gaining more recognition. As per the Indian constitution, political leaders and experts have emphasized the need to focus on human empowerment along with infrastructure development.

Ladakh has been primarily focusing on infrastructure, but the importance of human development has been overlooked. Currently, students are protesting in Ladakh, and people from outside are coming for business, but they face challenges in land and job control. Due to these factors, Ladakh as a whole has not achieved full empowerment. To reinstate democracy in Ladakh, it is important to fulfill the promises made to empower the region after it became a Union Territory. One way to empower Ladakh is by granting legislative powers, which are mentioned in Article 371B and can be inserted into the Sixth Schedule. If Ladakh is granted the Sixth Schedule, the council will have executive, legislative, and judicial powers, making it a powerful tool within India's parliamentary system. Currently, Ladakh must obtain all three powers.

Also, the Ladakhi student union should be strong and fearless.

- The first struggle for independence was in 1857, very famously called the Sepoy Mutiny or the Indian Rebellion of 1857 was led by Mangal Pandey. Rani Laxmi Bai of Jhansi, Bahadur Shah Zafar, Tatya Tope, and Nana Sahib were the others who led the resistance against British soldiers in 1857.
- The Indian national flag with three horizontal stripes of red, yellow, and green was hoisted on August 7, 1906, at Parsee Bagan Square in Kolkata. The first variant of our current national flag was designed by Pingali Venkayya in 1921. The current flag with saffron, white and green stripes with the 24-spoke Ashok Chakra
- was officially adopted on July 22, 1947, and hoisted on August 15, 1947.
- The Quit India Movement, also known as the August Movement, was a movement launched at the Bombay session of the All India Congress Committee by Mahatma Gandhi on August 8 1942, during World War II, demanding an end to British rule in India.
- India did not have an official national anthem at the time of Independence. The song 'Bharoto Bhagyo Bidhata', composed in 1911 by Rabindranath Tagore, was renamed 'Jan Gan Man'. It was adopted by the Constituent
- Assembly of India as the National Anthem on January 24, 1950.
- The boundary line between India and Pakistan, also known as the Radcliffe Line was demarcated by British barrister Sir Cyril Radcliffe on August 3, 1947. It was officially published only on August 17, 1947, two days after India got its independence from the British.
- India's national song 'Vande Mataram' composed by Bankim Chandra Chatterjee was part of his novel 'Anandamath' written in the 1880s. Vande Mataram was adopted as the national song on January 24, 1950.

The art of living a day



I think most of the time during any day, we are auto-piloted. That means we do things without being really fully aware of what we do because we do out of sheer habit. Mostly, such things are those that are routine and do not need our full attention. I know of people who don't remember what they had eaten or done a few hours ago. That is all because they had done the acts involuntarily!

Nothing wrong, I suppose, but the point some of us might raise is that we are wasting our day, and that much of the time is gone without doing anything of substance. Agreed, and so the issue is how to make our day more productive and meaningful. Those who are successful tell us that it is so very simple: All that you have to do is to plan and divide your day so that each work is bracketed within a particular time-frame.

Such a plan has several advantages: The foremost is that you are not only utilising your time and energy actively and efficiently but also the chances of some important work being left out gets minimal. True, one may not be able to fulfil everything strictly as the outlines drawn first in the morning. That kind of situation can happen quite often with most of us because of several factors during the course of the day. No issue, that is normal. One can always regroup in the next day's plan to let it happen successfully by giving it top priority.

That reminds us of one important thing: To prioritise your work to be done so that no time-bound work is left out undone. The relatively less important work left out can be done any day.

The whole idea of writing this is to make a point that the way you spend a day determines the quality of your life. You need to focus on 'today', as tomorrow can be dealt with as it comes! Most of the failures are a result of 'losing' today as a result of our love ad obsession to live in the past and the future!

Universal Responsibility and the Environment

By His Holiness Dalai Lama

As a boy studying Buddhism, I was taught the importance of a caring attitude toward the environment. Our practice of nonviolence applies not just to human beings but to all sentient beings - any living thing that has a mind. Where there is a mind, there are feelings such as pain, pleasure, and joy. No sentient being wants pain: all wants happiness instead. I believe that all sentient beings share those feelings at some basic level.

In Buddhism practice we get so used to this idea of non-violence and the ending of all suffering that we become accustomed to not harming or destroying anything indiscriminately. Although we do not believe that trees or flowers have minds, we treat them also with respect. Thus we share a sense of universal responsibility for both mankind and nature.

Our belief in reincarnation is one example of our concern for the future. If you think that you will be reborn, you are likely to say to yourself, I have to preserve such and such because my future reincarnation will be able to continue with these things. Even though there is a chance you may be reborn as a creature, perhaps even on a different planet, the idea of reincarnation gives you reason to have direct concern about this planet and future generations.

In the West when you speak of "humanity," you usually mean only our existing generation of human beings. Past humanity is already gone. The future, like death, has yet to come. Western ideas usually deal with the practical side of things for only this present generation of human beings.


Tibetan feelings about the environment are based entirely on religion. They are derived from the whole Tibetan way of life, not just from Buddhism. For example, consider Buddhism in Japan or Thailand, in environments different from ours. Their culture and their attitude are not the same as ours. Our unique environment has strongly influenced us. We don't live on a small, heavily populated island. Historically, we have had little anxiety with our vast area, low population, and distant neighbors. We haven't felt as oppressed as people in many other human communities.

It is very possible to practice the essence of a faith or culture without practicing a religion. Our Tibetan culture, although culture, although highly influenced by Buddhism, did not gain all its philosophy from Buddhism. I once suggested to an organization dealing with Tibetan refugees that it would be interesting to do some research on how much our people have been affected by their approach to life itself in Tibet. What are the factors that make Tibetans generally happy alld calm? People are always looking for answer in our unique religion, forgetting that our environment is just as unusual.

Concern for the environment is not necessarily holy, nor does it always require compassion. We Buddhists express compassion for all sentient beings, but this compassion is not necessarily extended to every rock or tree or house. Most of us are somewhat concerned about our own house, but not really compassionate about it. We keep it in order so that we can

live and be happy. We know that to have happy feelings in our house we must take care of it. So our feelings may be of concern rather than compassion.

Similarly, our planet is our house, and we must keep it in order and take care of it if we are genuinely concerned about happiness for ourselves, our children, our friends, and other sentient beings who share this great house with us. If we think of the planet as our house or' as "our mother - Mother Earth - we automatically feel concern for our environment. Today we understand that the future of humanity very much depends on our planet, and that the future of the planet very much depends on humanity. But this has not always been so clear to us.



Until now, you see, Mother Earth has somehow tolerated sloppy house habits. But now human use, population, and technology have reached that certain stage 'where Mother Earth no longer accepts our presence with silence. In many ways she is now telling us, "My children are behaving badly," she is warning us that there are limits to our actions.

The Tibetan Buddhist attitude is one of contentment, and there may be some connection here with our attitude toward the environment. We don't indiscriminately consume. We put a limit on our consumption. We admire simply liv-

ing and individual responsibility. We have always considered ourselves as part of our environment, but not just any part. Our ancient scriptures speak of the container and the contained. The world is the container - our house and we are the contained- the contents of the container.

From these simple facts we deduce a special relationship, because without the container, the contents cannot be contained. Without the contents, the container contains nothing, it's meaningless.

In my Five-Point Peace Plan I have proposed that all of Tibet become a sanctuary, a zone of peace. Tibet was that once, but with no official designation. Peace means harmony: harmony between people, between people and animals, between sentient beings and the environment. Visitors from all over the world could come to Tibet to experience peace and harmony. Instead of building big hotels with many stories and many rooms, we would make small building, more like private homes, that would be in better harmony with nature.

It is not at all wrong for humans to use nature to make useful things, but we must not exploit nature to make useful things, but we must not exploit nature unnecessarily. It is good to live in a house, to have medicines, and to be able to drive somewhere in a car. In the right hands, a machine is not a luxury, but something very useful. A camera, for example, can be used to make pictures that pronote understanding.

Bur everything has its limit. Too much consumption or effort to make money is no good. Neither is too much contentment. In principle contentment is a goal, but pure contentment becomes almost like suicide, doesn't it? I think the Tibetans had, in certain fields too much contentment. And we lost our country. These days we cannot afford too much contentment about the environment.

Peace and survival of life on earth as we know it are threatened by human activities that lack a commitment to humanitarian values. Destruction of nature and natural resources results from ignorance, greed, and lack of respect for the earth's living things. This lack of respect extends even to the earth's human descendants, the future generations who will inherit a vastly degraded planet if world peace doesn't become a reality and if destruction of the natural environment continues at the present rate.

Our ancestors viewed the earth as rich and bountiful, which it is. Many people in the past also saw nature as inexhaustibly sustainable, which we now know is the case only if we care for it. It is not difficult to forgive destruction in the past that resulted from ignorance. Today, however, we have access to more information. It is essential that we re-examine ethically what we have inherited, what we are responsible for, and what we will pass on to coming generations.




