Ladakh Festival showcases rich culture amidst challenges

LEH: The annual 'Ladakh Festival,' a four-day cultural extravaganza held in Leh from September 21st to 24th, showcased Ladakh's rich cultural heritage and artistic diversity, but faced challenges in attracting tourists and locals.

The festival commenced with an inaugural ceremony on September 21st at the Pologround in Leh, where limited tourists and locals were in attendance. One of the primary issues affecting the festival's success was the late announcement of the festival date, which left minimal time for promotional activities. The lack of an aggressive and proactive campaign by the tourism department and other stakeholders also contributed to lower attendance.

Kargil gears up for 5th Hill Council election on Oct 4

85 candidates in the fray to try their luck



KARGIL: Kargil is gearing up for the 5th Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council (LAHDC) election, scheduled to take place on October 4. A total of 278 polling stations will be set up across all 26 constituencies. Among these, 114 have been classified as hypersensitive, 99 as sensitive, and 65 as normal polling stations. The votes cast during the election will be counted on October 8, as per a recent notification from the election department.

This fresh notification follows the Supreme Court's verdict regarding the reservation of the plough symbol for the National Conference party. Consequently, the election date was rescheduled from September 10 to October 4. Prior to this decision, the High Court of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh had dismissed the Ladakh administration's plea against a single-bench order allowing National Conference candidates to contest the polls using the party symbol. Additionally, the apex court imposed a fine of Rs 1 Lakh on the administration in this regard.

Notably, this Hill Council election in

Kargil is the first of its kind following the declaration of Union Territory (UT) status for Ladakh in August 2019. In order to ensure a free, fair, and transparent electoral process, Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) will be utilized. The administration is also focusing on providing necessary security, training for polling staff, and maintaining strict vigilance during the elections.

In the run-up to the election, the National Conference and the Congress have announced an alliance, and political campaigning in the district is currently at its peak. The existing council headed by National Conference leader Feroz Ahmad Khan is completing its five-year term on Oc-

As the election date approaches, a total of 85 candidates including 17 from Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), 22 from Indian National Conference (INC), 17 from National Conference (NC), 4 from Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) and 25 Independent are in the fray. The contest promises to be a significant and closely watched event in Kargil's political landscape.

the end of December 2023.

Vishwakarma Scheme was launched India, Narendra Modi for traditional artisans and craftspeople on the occasion of Vishwakarma Jayanti at the India International Convention and Expo Centre (IICC), in Dwarka, New Delhi.

Vishwakarma Scheme is a new programme that envisages end-to-end providing holistic support to traditional artisans and craftspeople in scaling up their conventional products and services.

Union Minister of State for Home Affairs, Ajay Kumar Mishra said that the idea behind the scheme is Prime Minister Narendra Modi's desire to make the lives of the people better. It is because of this reason that the scheme is being launched on the PM's birthday, he

The minister said that ever since he has been in power, PM Modi has made a positive change in the lives of people, whether it was in the capacity of the Chief Minister of Gujarat or the Prime Minister of India. Mishra

said that the unorganized sector has been a source of employment since ancient times and it is unfortunate that not much has been done in the past for the upliftment of the traditional arts and artisans of the country.

Giving a brief outline of the workings of the scheme, Mishra said that transactions and marketing by the Prime Minister of the government will help support. artisans and craftsmen with certification, promotion, and marketing of their products. He said that this will help arts and crafts that have reached the verge of extinction to survive and flourish in the present competitive times. He added that artisans will also be eligible for a stipend so that people can maintain their traditions and keep their traditional crafts alive.

> Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Brigadier (Dr) BD Mishra (Retd) conveyed his best wishes on the occasion of Vishwakarma Jayanti and remarked that it is dedicated to the traditional artisans and craftspeople. He said that India has touched new heights under the leadership of Prime Minister Modi and said that it is unfortunate that artisans who have been working for generations are finding it difficult to survive in the present times. He added that the implementation of the scheme is a timely and much-needed initiative of the government and expressed hope that it will benefit the arts and crafts that are on the

verge of extinction.

Member of Parliament, Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal said that the scheme will benefit the local artisans of Ladakh to boost their business.

PM Vishwakarma will be fully funded by the Union Government with an outlay of Rs 13,000 crores. Under the scheme, the Vishwakarma will be registered free of charge through Common Services Centres using the biometric-based PM Vish-wakarma portal. They will be provided recognition through PM Vishwakarma certificate and ID card, skill upgradation involvbasic and advanced training, toolkit incentive of ₹15,000, collateral-free credit support up to ₹1 lakh (first tranche) and ₹2 lakh (second tranche) at a concessional interest rate of 5%, incentive for digital

The Scheme aims to strengthen and nurture the Guru-Shishya parampara or family-based practice of traditional skills by Vishwakarma working with their hands and tools. The prime focus of PM Vishwakarma is to improve the quality as well as the reach of products and services of artisans and craftspeople and to ensure that they are integrated with the domestic and global value chains.

The scheme will provide support to artisans and craftspeople in rural and urban areas across India. Eighteen traditional crafts will be covered under PM Vishwakarma. These include (i) Carpenter; (ii) Boat Maker; (iii) Armourer; (iv) Blacksmith; (v) Hammer and Tool Kit Maker; (vi) Locksmith; (vii) Goldsmith; (viii) Potter; (ix) Sculptor, Stone breaker; (x) Cobbler (Shoesmith/ Footwear artisan); (xi) Mason (Rajmistri); (xii) Basket/ Mat/Broom Maker/Coir Weaver; (xiii) Doll & Toy Maker (Traditional); (xiv) Barber; (xv) Garland maker; (xvi) Washerman; (xvii) Tailor; and (xviii) Fishing Net Maker.

Highlights importance of providing nutritious food to children, pregnant & lactating mothers

The month of September has been marked as POSHAN Maah to address the issue of malnutrition under the Government of India's Flagship Program POSHAN Abhiyan. The theme this year is Suposhit Bharat, Sakshar Bharat, Sashakt Bharat" (Nutrition-rich India, Educated India, Empowered India).

Highlighting the impor-

tance of improving the nutritional outcomes of adolescents, children, pregnant women, and lactating mothers, LG praised the Prime Minister of India, Narendra Modi, for coming up with schemes such as Poshan Abhiyan for healthy future generations. He commended Anganwadi workers for their selfless work of taking care of children and their nutritional requirements. He stated that the Anganwadi centres are the second homes of young children.

L-G stated that India will develop as a nation if we provide nutritious food to children and pregnant/ lactating mothers as it will ensure a healthy society. He sought cooperation from everyone in aiming for healthy children, especially those between 3-6 years so that these children will remain healthy throughout their lives right from their schooling

He distributed laptops to Anganwadi supervisors for timely updation of data on Poshan Tracker and also handed over monetary incentives of Rs 500 per month to the eligible Anganwadi workers and Anganwadi helpers. The stalls put up by the different ICDS projects and Anganwadi centres, informed of the various schemes such as the Integrated Child Development Programme, Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana, Scheme Adolescent Girls (SAG), Mission Poshan 2.0. supplementary nutrition provided to children pregnant/lactating mothers, etc. For a better understanding of an Anganwadi set up, a model Anganwadi Centre was on display along with the prototype of Aanganwadi centre for the nomadic region of Changthang.





Q. Tell us about your childhood days, your education, and your political career.

I was born and brought up in Hemis Shukpachan and studied until class 5th in the village school. Later, I continued my education up to class 10th at Govt. High School Tingmosgang. During those days, very few students appeared for matriculation exams, and in 1967, I was one of the 22 students from the district who took the 10th exam and 12 of us got failed. Times were such that even an 8th grader could secure a teaching job, so I worked as a teacher in Likir.

At one point I came to know that Ven. Lama Lobzang is taking many students from Leh to study in Delhi, so, I joined a group of students, but I returned after two years due to difficulties in settling down. Back in Leh, I reappeared for the subject in which I had failed in class 10th and successfully cleared it. I had a strong desire to continue my studies, but financial constraints prevented me from pursuing higher education in Srinagar like many of my friends did. During this time, obtaining a 10th-grade pass was a significant achievement in Ladakh. The Ladakh Buddhist Association recognized my passion and appointed me as an office secretary for a monthly salary of 100 rupees. The LBA officials recognized my dedication and encouraged me to become a deed writer (Arzi Navis) in Srinagar. After obtaining my license, I set up my chamber in Leh near the LBA office.

In 1976, during the first parliamentary election in Ladakh, with Kushok Baku-Rinpoche as the candidate, I was asked to work at the Congress office for party-related activities, which marked the beginning of my political career.

Q. You have worked with the Ladakh Buddhist Assocition and accomplished incredible work for the benefit and fare of many people. Brief us about it.

I served as the General Secretary of the Ladakh Buddhist ciation from 1974 to 1977, with Advocate Sonam Gyaltson President. One of our notable achievements during this time was organizing the first Kalachakra Initiation by His Holiness the Dalai Lama in Ladakh in 1976. When the Deputy Commissioner of Leh, Mr. Rehman, suggested organizing it at the NDS ground, we recommended the Choglamsar Jevetsal land, situated by the Indus River with lush green surroundings, to make the devotees more comfortable.

Also, in 1998 we were successful in inviting Dalai Lama to Ladakh after an 8 years gap, this decision not only proved to be the best but also led to His Holiness Dalai Lama's frequent visits to Ladakh, strengthening the communal and social bonds here. We also handed over the Jevetsal Photang to His Holiness in 1998.

We also obtained an allotment of 75 kanals of land in Leh town under LBA, a significant revenue generation initiative. Furthermore, we played a pivotal role in transforming the narrow road at Leh gate into the magnificent structure it is today.

During my tenure, the seed for the demand of Union Territory (UT) status for Ladakh was sown. We organised around 85 demonstrations at various levels, published a booklet titled 'Why UT for Ladakh?' distributed across India, organised eight national seminars on the demand, and participated in countless press conferences. I participated in dialogues and conferences at national and international levels, advocating for Ladakh's UT status. Today, I can proudly say that I kept the voices of UT demand alive during the turbulent times in Jammu & Kashmir and amidst the challenges of those times.

> Q. Since Ladakh is a Union Territory now, people of Ladakh are demanding safeguard under the 6th schedule of the Indian constitution. What you have to say about it?

Drawing on my experience as a member of the National Commission for Scheduled Tribes and my involvement in understanding the functions of Hill Councils in Darjeeling and various Union Territories have given me insight into tribal rights and laws. Ladakh, which was once part of the erstwhile state of Jammu& Kashmir, enjoyed protection under Article 35A and 370. However, as a Union Territory now, its opened up to the mainland, necessitating safeguards for land, jobs and the environment.

I believe that constitutional safeguards under the 6th schedule of the Indian constitution are essential for Ladakh. While we had high expectations from the BJP to fulfill our demands, it appears they are reluctant to ensure these safeguards under

the 6th schedule. Regardless, I firmly believe that Ladakh's safeguard can only be assured through the 6th schedule of the Indian Constitution.

Q. What you have to say about the status of Hill Council in UT set up and how important is it for further strengthening and empowerment?

Despite statements indicating that Hill Councils have power in the UT setthe reality is quite different. Currently, Ladakh has an annual budget of Rs. crore, but the Hill Councils of Leh and Kargil are allocated only approximately Rs. 500 crore out of the total UT budget. The majority of funds are controlled by non-elected representatives, and the Councils have limited oversight over these funds. It's challenging to claim that Hill Councils hold significant power in this context.

Q. What are your thoughts on the statehood demand for Ladakh?

geographical location, and strategic considerations, I am somewhat skeptical. At present, our primary focus should be on achieving the safeguards offered by the 6th schedule, which is no less than statehood in terms of protecting Ladakh's interests. There is a time and place for every demand, and right now, prioritizing the 6th schedule is the prudent approach.



Q. Having been in politics for so long and witnessed changes, how do you perceive the political situation today? Are there any notable changes?

I have had the privilege of working alongside leaders like Kushok Bakula Rinpoche and P Namgyal, who fought for the basic needs of the people, such as schools, colleges, bridges, and roads, with limited resources. The political landscape has shifted today, with leaders often emphasizing their contributions, which should be an inherent part of their responsibilities. Back then, leaders were more concerned with serving the people than showcasing their achievements. For instance, during Minister Sonam Nurboo's time, he used an 18-crore fund under PWD to build iron bridges in Nubra, Sham, and Rong, instead of using it for smaller, vote-winning projects.

However, the political landscape has changed. Today's leaders often focus on self-promotion and achievements. It's essential to discourage politics driven solely by money and power. Instead, we should work collaboratively for Ladakh's betterment, leaving behind petty disputes.





