KARGIL: In the aftermath of the Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council-Kargil (LAHDC-K) election, the National Conference-Congress alliance has achieved a resounding victory, dealing a significant blow to the BJP.

The poll result was announced on October 8.

The National Conference secured a commanding 12 seats, while the Congress claimed 10 out of the 26-member council. In a surprising twist, the BJP managed to secure only 2 seats, including one where the NC and Congress fielded candidates against each other. Additionally, 2 Independent canclinch seats. LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Brigadier (Dr) BD Mishra (Retd) inaugurated the Milk Pasteurization Plant at Agling on October 4.

The LG later held a meeting with members of the National Dairy Development Board (NDDB) and concerned officials from the UT Administration at Raj Niwas to discuss the Dairy Development Plan

Chairman and Managing Director, NDDB, Dr Meenesh Shah informed the LG that as per the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed by the UT Administration along with LAHDC Leh and National Dairy Development Board (NDDB) last year, the Milk Pasteurisation Plant at Agling, with a capacity to pasteurise 2,000 litres of milk per hour, has been set up at a total cost of ₹ 4.62 crores. He also informed the LG that the total milk producing animal population in Ladakh stands at 46,105 as per the Livestock Census 2019 while the milk production stands at 117 TLPD (Thousand litres per day) as per the integrated survey 2017-18.

Stating that the Indian Army deployed in Ladakh requires 50,000 litres of milk every day, Dr Meenesh informed that milk would be supplied to

the Indian Army to meet their requirement. He added that the Milk Pasteurisation Plant will provide employment opportunities and benefit dairy generating income.

Expert Talk:

Prioritizing Road safety in Ladakh

Dr Tashi Motup /Senior Consultant Surgeon SNM hospital Leh: The rise in road traffic accidents is in Ladakh is a growing epidemic that threatens not only the lives of the local population but also the numerous tourists who flock to this breathtaking region. As a senior consultant surgeon at SNM Hospital Leh, I have witnessed the devastating consequences of these accidents firsthand. It is imperative that we address this issue with urgency, dedication, and comprehensive solutions.

Over the past decade or so, Ladakh has seen a troubling surge in road traffic accidents. What was once a land of peaceful coexistence with nature has now become a battleground of sorts, with vehicles of all kinds speeding down the newly paved highways. The collateral damage of this rapid development has been an increase in accidents that result in physical disabilities and, far too often, the loss of precious lives.

It's as if road traffic accidents have become a new affliction for our society, silently eroding the vitality of our region. One of the most disheartening aspects of this crisis is the fact that a significant portion of the victims falls into the age group between 17 and 45, often referred to as the productive phase of life. These individuals, in the prime of their youth, are the lifeblood of our community. Yet, when an accident occurs, it can shatter their dreams, impose significant hardships on their families, and, in the worst cases, lead to fatalities. It is a sobering realization that modernity has also brought with it a culture of reckless behavior, including drinking and drug use, which contributes too many of these accidents and, tragically, fatalities.

The immediate medical response to accidents is crucial in determining their outcomes. In our remote region, where access to medical facilities can be challenging, every minute counts. If a critically injured person doesn't receive medical help promptly or isn't transported to the hospital in a timely manner, the consequences can be dire. We, as a community, must understand that it is our collective responsibility to help in such situations, rendering assistance and ensuring that the injured reach the hospital without delay.

Ladakh experiences two distinct seasons - summer and winter. The summer season brings with it an influx of tourists, longer days, and an increase in road traffic accidents. This rise in accidents during the working season is alarming, with sometimes more than 30-40 fatal cases being reported. Unfortunately, this year has seen an uptick in such cases, emphasizing the pressing need for action. It is a testament to the urgency of the situation, and it calls for collective responsibility and immediate intervention.

While it is undeniable that modernization and development are essential for Ladakh's progress, it is equally important that this progress is accompanied by responsible behavior on our roads. Every individual who gets behind the wheel must drive with care, attention, and a sense of responsibility. The consequences of reckless driving are not limited to the driver alone; they extend to fellow passengers, pedestrians, and even innocent animals that share our roads. It is our duty to ensure that our actions do not endanger others.

Promoting road safety in Ladakh requires a multi-pronged approach. First and foremost, stricter criteria should be imposed for obtaining a driver's license, especially for young drivers. Teenagers, in particular, need comprehensive training and must demonstrate responsible behavior before they are allowed to drive. Longer training periods, comprehensive written and practical tests, and mandatory driver education programs can help raise the standards of our drivers and make our roads safer.

In addition to this, we need to consider implementing a graduated licensing system, which places certain restrictions on new drivers and gradually grants more privileges as they gain experience. Such a system ensures that young drivers acquire essential skills and judgment before they have full access to the roads. It's a proven method to reduce accidents involving young and inexperienced drivers.

Stricter enforcement of traffic rules and regulations is another crucial aspect of road safety. Penalties for violations should be more stringent to serve as a deterrent. Law enforcement agencies should be provided with the necessary training and resources to ensure the effective implementation of traffic laws.

While individual responsibility and law enforcement are vital, we must also address systemic issues to prevent accidents. **Solutions**

- Establish Trauma and Rescue Centers: Ladakh's highways, especially in tourist-frequented areas like Nubra and Changthang, must have trauma and rescue centers. These facilities should be well-connected and adequately equipped to ensure timely assistance to accident victims. Basic facilities are a necessity to ensure prompt rescue and protection.
- Centralized Road Safety Authority: The establishment of a centralized road safety authority is crucial. This authority would coordinate road safety policies and initiatives, oversee improvements in road infrastructure, lead public awareness campaigns, and provide resources for law enforcement agencies to enforce traffic rules
- Invest in Road Infrastructure: Improved road infrastructure, including better road design, well-placed signage, and adequate lighting, is essential to reduce accidents. Remote areas should not be neglected in this effort.
- Public Awareness Campaigns: Launching public awareness campaigns on road safety and responsible driving can educate the community and visitors about the importance of safe driving practices. These campaigns should be culturally sensitive and accessible to all.
- Training and Resources for Law Enforcement: Law enforcement agencies should receive training and resources to enforce traffic rules and regulations effectively. Stricter penalties for violations may also be considered as
- Accident Data Recording: Maintaining a comprehensive database to record road accident data is essential for understanding the causes and patterns of accidents. This data can guide targeted interventions and improvements in road safety measures.

In conclusion, the rising number of road traffic accidents in Ladakh is a matter of grave concern that demands immediate attention. We must work together as a community, along with government agencies and organizations, to implement these solutions and prioritize road safety. Let us commit ourselves to safer roads, fewer accidents, and the preservation of life and well-being in our beloved region.

Police Commemoration Day



Every year, October 21 is observed as Police Commemoration Day. It is a day that is commemorated to honour the ten CRPF personnel who lost their lives in serving the nation from external tensions. The idea behind observing this day is to remember the sacrifices of those police officials in the line of duty.

In 1959, October 21st was a sad day for the Indian police force as 10 CRPF (Central Reserve Police Force) men were killed in an attack by Chinese PLA troops. The attack happened near Ladakh's Hot Springs area, and the police officers lost their lives in the line of duty.

On October 20th, 1959, as the CRPF patrolled the India-Tibet border, three separate units of the 3rd Battalion were sent to independent patrols near the Hot Springs area in Ladakh. The objective was to keep a lookout on the India-China border that lies to the east of Ladakh. Hot Spring in Aksai Chin in Ladakh is situated between 15,000 and 16,000 ft above the sea level on the Indo-Tibet border which was being manned by the Indian Police.

While the other two units returned, one did not. The missing unit contained a porter and two police constables.

To search for the missing unit, CRPF created a new unit led by DCIO Karam Singh. As the unit approached a small hill, Chinese troops started firing. Ten policemen died in the firing, while the Chinese captured seven. A month later, the Chinese soldiers returned the bodies of the martyred Indian police officer.

After this incident, in January 1960, a resolution was passed at the Annual Conference of Inspectors General of Police of States and Union Territories, recognising October 21st as the Police Commemoration Day.

Q. What are the early signs and symptoms of Cancer?

Q. Can specific foods like seabuckthorn and buckwheat in Ladakh have anti-cancer properties?

It is essential to base claims about the anti-cancer properties of specific foods on valid scientific evidence. As of now, there is insufficient scientific proof to substantiate the idea that foods like seabuckthorn and buckwheat in Ladakh possess elements that can cure cancer. Therefore, making definitive statements about these foods' effectiveness in cancer treatment would not be accurate.

Q. Though there is no proper data on the number of cancer patients in Ladakh but we often hear that cancer is growing in Ladakh specially stomach cancer cases. Since you have been visiting Ladakh for a medical camp from a very long time, what is your view on it?

Cancer is a growing concern in Ladakh, and if the current trend continues, it may become one of the leading causes of death in the region. While there is a lack of precise data regarding the number of cancer patients in Ladakh, my observations during medical camps over the past 7-8 years suggests an increase in certain cancer cases, particularly stomach cancer, food pipe cancer, and colorectal cancer. However, it is crucial to note that this observation is not supported by concrete statistical data, making it essential to conduct a comprehensive scientific study to analyze the rate of cancer patients in Ladakh compared to other regions. It is imperative to be aware of the disease, consult a doctor when symptoms appear, and not delay seeking medical attention. Remember that early diagnosis and timely treatment are fundamental for effective cancer management.

Q. What factors contribute to the rise in stomach and foodpipe cancer in Ladakh?

A significant factor contributing to the increased incidence of stomach and foodpipe cancer is reflux. Reflux, which should not occur in the stomach or foodpipe, is amplified by dietary habits and lifestyle choices in the region. The eating habits, smoking, and alcohol consumption in Ladakh collectively raise the risk of reflux, which, in turn, leads to a higher prevalence of these cancers in comparison to other parts of India.

Q. How important is it for individuals to undergo regular medical check-ups to prevent cancer?

Early detection of cancer is vital. It's important to remember that cancer can develop silently over several years without any noticeable symptoms. In some cases, cancer may manifest with symptoms that worsen rapidly. This is why it is advisable to consult a doctor without delay if you experience any symptoms that could be indicative of cancer. In many Western countries, regular screening for various types of cancer, such as breast, cervical, and prostate cancers, is performed to detect the disease at an early stage, enabling timely treatment.

Q. What are the approaches and procedures for the cancer treatment?

Cancer treatment encompasses several modalities, with the common treatments being surgery, chemotherapy, and radiation therapy. In addition to these, there are other procedures, including immunotherapy, targeted therapy, and hormone therapy. The choice of treatment depends on the specific type and stage of cancer. The primary treatment goal at the early stages of cancer is to eliminate cancer from the body or destroy all cancer cells. Surgery is the most common approach for this purpose. While some patients may require only

> treatments, such as surgery combined with chemotherapy and/or radiation therapy. In cases where cancer is particularly sensitive to radiation therapy or chemotherapy, such as blood cancer, chemotherapy is the primary treatment option. The choice of treatment is tailored to the specific type and stage of cancer.

What precautions should cancer patients take?

It's crucial for cancer patients to understand that the disease can recur even after successful treatment, a phenomenon known as cancer recurrence. Consequently, it is essential for patients to continue regular follow-up visits with their doctors and not discontinue medical appointments, assuming

they are entirely cancer-free. After cancer treatment, particularly chemotherapy, a patient's immune system may be compromised for a period, increasing the risk of infections. To mitigate this risk, patients are advised to maintain good hygiene, consume a nutritious diet, and avoid pollution. Regular check-ups are recommended for at least two years following treatment. Cancer is a reality in Ladakh and the growing

Q. Tell us about the survival chances in Cancer.

The survival of a cancer patient depends on the stage at which the disease is diagnosed and the prompt initiation of appropriate treatment. In stages 1 and 2, patients have a good chance of leading a normal life after successful treatment. However, in stage 3, the risk of cancer recurrence increases. In stage 4, where the disease has advanced and spread to other parts of the body, survival chances are grim. Early consultation upon noticing symptoms and the need for regular check-ups after cancer treatment are of paramount importance in improving sur-

Kargil CJM finds man guilty in 2016 road accident case

Chief Judicial Magistrate, Kargil, Ladakh presided over by Fariqa Nazir on October 13 convicted a man Manzoor Ahmad Dar in a road accident case in 2016.

After hearing the Public Prosecutor Tsering Phuntsog and defense counsel, the court said that the accused had been found guilty.

The accused has been sentenced to undergo simple imprisonment for a period of one year for a commis-

sion of offense U/S 304-A RPC. The accused is also sentenced to payment of a fine to the tune of Rs 30,000 U/S 304-A which shall be paid to the family of the deceased.

The accused is further sentenced to undergo imprisonment for a period of one month for the commission of offense U/S 279 and 337 RPC. Both the sentences shall run concurrently. The accused is also sentenced to the payment of a fine to the tune of Rs 1000/- for the commission of offences under sections 39/192, 56/196, 146/196 MV Act.


