# Bhoti Quran translation: Ladakh's journey to preserve culture and promote understanding Pioneering effort to make divine wisdom accessible to all

LEH: Language serves as a bridge, connecting people and their beliefs. Translating religious scriptures into native languages is a profound way to unlock profound understanding and preserve linguistic heritage. The ongoing effort to translate the Quran, the holy book of Islam, into Bhoti stands as a remarkable initiative.

Under the guidance of Mohammad Umar Nadvi, Imamia Jama Masjid, Leh, and with support from Anjuman Moin ul Islam Leh and Ven. Konchok Paldan, the translation of the Ouran into Bhoti has been in progress. It embarked upon its journey in 2002, starting with selected verses before progressing to a comprehensive, systematic translation process that commenced in 2019.

Nadvi shared that the team has completed seven translations and is currently in the revision phase, aiming for a release in June and July of the upcoming year, ensuring wider accessibility to the translated text. The anticipated final print is expected to originate from Saudi Arabia, marking a significant milestone in this monumental endeavor.

# Discussion on rationalisation of Karakoram/Changthang Wildlife Sanctuaries held

LEH: Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Brigadier (Dr) BD Mishra (Retd) reviewed and discussed the the LG Secretariat on December 9.

Chairman, LAHDC Leh, Advocate Tashi Gyalson; Member of Parliament from Ladakh, Jamyang Tsering Namgyal; Deputy Chairman, LAHDC Leh, Tsering Angchuk; Advisor, Dr Pawan Kotwal; Executive Councillors- Tashi Namgyal Yakzee and Ghulam Mehdi; Commissioner Secretary, Dr Vasantha-kumar; Secretary to LG, Ravinder Kumar; APCCF Brij Mohan Sharma; Chief Wildlife Warden, Sajjad Hussain Mufti; Deputy Commissioner, Leh, Santosh Sukhadeve and officials from Wildlife Institute of India, Dehradun, joined the meeting physically and virtually.

Advisor, Dr Pawan Kotwal apprised the LG of the legal status of the Wildlife Sanctuaries. He informed about the notification and management of the protected areas under J&K Wildlife Protection Act 1978, the Act being repealed vide J&K Reorganisation Act 2019 and the extension of Central Wildlife (Protection) Act 1972 to UT Ladakh and the exercise of determination of rights of the people living in Karakoram Wildlife Sanctuary in 2022 which has not been completed yet. He also informed that there is no legal distinction between the core area and the buffer zone of the protected area of wildlife sanctuary.

Kotwal informed the LG about the letter written by him to Dr Sathyakumar, Scientist G at WII Dehradun, to 'generate maps of the wildlife sanctuaries in accordance with the boundaries laid down in the notifications No's

> Highlighting that the exercise of rationalization of boundaries of Karakoram and Changthang Wildlife Sanctuaries has been going on for the past few months, LG stated that the issues/parties involved in this aspect are the protection of wildlife of Ladakh, the people of Ladakh inhabiting+ the area and then the ground reality and requirement of the people. He highlighted the importance of following the present situation and the condition of the people living in these wildlife sanctuaries. He asked WII Dehradun not to go beyond the Terms of Reference (ToR) provided by the administration.

> L-G asked the concerned officials of Wildlife/Forest Department, UT Ladakh, to prepare a case pointing out all the dichotomies, public grievances and interim permission needed for people engaged in tourism activities to run homestays, hotels/guest houses in wildlife sanctuaries, so that necessary guidance can be sought from the Ministry of Home Affairs before proceeding further on the exercise of rationalisation of the boundaries of the Karakoram and Changthang Wildlife Sanctuaries.

# Ladakh's struggle for gazetted jobs continues

In Ladakh, the quest for gazetted post-recruitment persists even five years after attaining UT status, triggering age restrictions and youth unemployment, culminating in a crisis. Despite the democratic right to voice concerns, many in Ladakh hesitate due to looming threats. Of over 20 approached students, merely 6 have bravely spoken up, held back by fear of repercussions. The UT administration's promises over the past half-decade, including meetings and promised order dates, remain unfulfilled, necessitating urgent attention to quell the worries of Ladakh's youth. This frustration has birthed issues like drug abuse and mental health challenges, emphasizing the criticality of addressing Ladakh's employment concerns promptly.

Tundup Thinles, Former President ALUYA: In the past 4 years since Ladakh attained Union Territory status, there hasn't been any recruitment for Gazetted posts, and to this day, no new notifications have surfaced. L-G BD Mishra's actions have notably delayed effective governance delivery, particularly evident in the significant delay and absence of recruitment processes. This lack of action is conspicuous on the ground, amplifying the distressing reality of stagnant recruitment. The inactivity of our public representatives, MPs, and councillors exacerbates the issue, leaving Ladakh's youth in a dire predicament. Five years of preparation

recruitment have been futile due to overage limitations, hindering applications and selections. I, too, am adversely affected by this predicament, unable to apply even if positions are re-advertised. This delay has detrimentally impacted numerous lives in Ladakh, disqualifying qualified candidates due to age constraints. Not only Gazetted but also non-Gazetted recruitments have stagnated, with recent Ladakh Police recruitment being a rare exception. However, progress remains elusive elsewhere. The ongoing discussions regarding a separate cadre for Ladakh offer potential solutions to the burgeoning employment crisis. Ladakh faces an acute employment challenge, urging authorities not to overlook this critical issue.

> Zulfikar Ali, Vice President, Student Union Nubra: Since the inception of the Union Territory of Ladakh, there hasn't been a single announcement for government job vacancies, leaving candidates in a state of extreme frustration. This concerning situation poses risks of drug addiction and immense family pressure on job seekers. I earnestly implore the authorities to expedite the process of filling these crucial vacancies. In tandem, we aim to raise awareness by collaborating with the Nubra Student Union and conducting outreach programs in villages across Nubra. Our goal is to shed light on these pressing issues and garner support from the community.

> Stanzin Nurbu Apex Body Youth wing: The ongoing recruitment process for a gazetted post in Ladakh is in its final stages, yet persistent delays are triggering frustration among dedicated students and youth who've invested years in preparation. It's crucial to prevent this issue from escalating into a political battleground during the forthcoming elections. Ladakh's highly educated youth are determined not to let their efforts go in vain. However, the absence of job offers, except for positions in the Ladakh police force, is a cause for concern. Urging the authorities to expedite this process, I appeal for swift action to benefit the entire youth community in Ladakh. Numerous well-qualified individuals have toiled diligently, and

witnessing them compelled to apply for lower-level positions is disheartening. This pressing situation warrants immediate attention and resolution.

> Padma Stanzin, LEAF President: It's disheartening that even after 5 years since attaining UT status; there's been no recruitment for gazetted posts in Ladakh. The lack of advocacy from our representatives, bureaucrats, and administration at the required pace has left Ladakh's youth suffering and disenfranchised. Many highly qualified individuals, capable of holding officer positions, find themselves applying for non-gazetted roles due to the absence of opportunities.

The situation worsens as promises regarding joining dates for SSC candidates, even after case

file sub-jury completion, remain unfulfilled. Events like Rozgar Mela seem to exploit youth support without addressing their employment needs. Approximately 30,000 unemployed candidates from Ladakh, as per SSC data, highlight the pressing issue of unemployment in the region.

Education and recruitment should take precedence, yet the lack of attention to this issue by the UT administration is evident. Despite discussions with public representatives, including MP Jamyang Tsering Namgyal and CEC Advocate Tashi Gyalson, no concrete steps have been taken.

Recent mentions of a separate cadre for Ladakh by December raise hopes, but stringent adherence to timelines is crucial. Failure to deliver could prompt the youth to make unemployment a manifesto issue in the upcoming 2024 elections. Despite pledges for efficient governance, the delay in gazette posts' recruitment signifies a significant failure on the ground, contrary to promises of transparent and prompt administration.

Moreover, the absence of an exam center in Ladakh due to infrastructure challenges implies further delays in recruitment rules. Stakeholders, the Hill Council, UT administration, and MPs must prioritize addressing youth issues. Supporting the youth will earn their support and encouragement in return.

> Tsewang Dorjay, student: Since 2019, the recruitment for gazetted posts has remained pending in Ladakh. Previously, during the Kashmir administrative service, some gazetted posts were filled, albeit with minimal representation. However, under the current UT administration, promises were made to establish the Ladakh administration service. Unfortunately, progress on this front has been sluggish, as a recent notification indicated the formation of a body that will further delay the process of development, recruitment, and candidate joining. This elongated procedure is likely to span several more years.

The current administration in Ladakh comprises more bureaucrats than politicians. While the UT administration requires bureaucrats, equitable public representation is equally essential. We urge the Ladakh government to expedite the formation of the Ladakh administrative service at a fast-track level, appointing Ladakhi students to gazetted posts promptly. Furthermore, an SSC post advertisement was released a year and a half ago, and the selected candidates are yet to commence their roles. If this pattern persists, many youths will surpass the age limit, extinguishing their prospects.

As elections approach, representatives may begin offering incentives and making false promises. However, a pragmatic and feasible manifesto that addresses critical issues would benefit everyone. We hope for substantial progress in the days ahead, ensuring a fair advantage for all spheres, transcending the allure of mere electoral freebies and false assurances.

> Rigzin Dorjay Student: I strongly believe that every Ladakhi is currently contributing to various fields of work. However, the absence of a local gazetted or Ladakhi head in leadership positions could significantly impact the future of Ladakhi youths. There's a risk of losing Ladakh's essence and traditions if an outsider assumes authority without a deep understanding of our region. This scenario would be detrimental to our future generations.

I've maintained faith and optimism in the UT administration since October 31, 2019. However, their promises of providing jobs have yet to materialize. Presently, students face immense pressure from their families due to these unfulfilled assurances. I appeal to the Member of Parliament to pri-

oritize the resolution of youth issues by promptly providing gazette posts without further delay. This step is crucial in securing the future prospects of Ladakhi youths and preserving the heritage and identity of Ladakh.

**International Mountain Day** 



The day was designated by the United Nations General Assembly to celebrate International Mountain Day on 11 December. According to the UN, "Mountain host about half of the world's biodiversity hotspots and 30% of all key Biodiversity Areas."

More than half of humanity's everyday life relies on mountain freshwater. 80% of the world's food is supplied by 20 plant species and six of them originated and have been diversified in mountains namely maize, potatoes, barley, sorghum, tomatoes, and apples.

Mountains are not only important for inhabitants but also for millions of people living in lowlands. They are the sources of the world's major rivers and also play a crucial role in the

International Mountain day also focuses on the opportunities and on the development of mountains. It also educates people in understanding the role of mountains in the environment and their impact on life. It is celebrated every year with a particular theme.

The formation of International Mountain Day history dates back to 1992 when Agenda 21 "Managing Fragile Ecosystems: Sustainable Mountain Development" of Chapter 13 was adopted at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development. No doubt, it put a milestone in the history of mountain development. By seeing the increasing attention towards the importance of mountains, the UN

General Assembly declared in 2002 the UN International Year of Mountains and designated 11 December as International Mountain Day from 2003 onwards. Therefore we can say that the first time International Mountain Day was celebrated on 11 December 2003. Every year it is celebrated with a particular

International Mountain Day 2023, under the title "Restoring mountain ecosystems" is a chance to increase awareness about the relevance of mountain ecosystems and call for nature-based solutions, best practices and investments that build resilience, reduce vulnerability and increase the ability of mountains to adapt to daily threats and extreme climatic events.

# **DID YOU KNOW**

- typically has a volume of around 1km3 and a density of around 1.003km per m3 - that's a density that's around 0.4 per cent lower than the air surrounding it; this is how they are able to float.

# Skalzang Rigzin, President, Ladakh Mountain Guide Association

# Interviewed by Yangchen Dolma

Q. Can you please provide a brief introduction and share your experiences, as well as the challenges you've encountered while climbing various mountain peaks?

I'm Skalzang Rigzin, hailing from the Sham valley and have been deeply immersed in the world of mountain guiding since 1997. I am currently serving as the President of Ladakh Mountain Guide Association (LMGA). Over the years, I've led expeditions to peaks like Rimo, and amidst the lockdown, I ventured into freelancing as a mountain guide. My 26 years in the mountains have witnessed traverses across the Garhwal, Nepal, and eastern regions, conquering notable summits such as Saser Kangri, Rimo Kangri, among others.

The pinnacle of my achievements came in 2022 when I stood atop Lhotse, the world's fourth highest mountain at 8,516 meters. Moreover, I undertook the challenging Annapurna ascent, notorious for its high fatality rate. What adds to these feats is that both summits were reached within 16 days, sans supplemental oxygen or Sherpa support, setting a record for

India.

Challenges were aplenty; weather obstacles like fog and storms often compelled our return. Balancing the demands of both the climb and ensuring the safety of our clients was demanding yet enriching. These experiences have been a crucible of learning, providing invaluable insights.

Looking forward, my aspirations include scaling iconic peaks like Everest and other lofty summits.

Q. What unique features or attractions distinguish Ladakh as an ideal destination for mountaineering and adventure tourism?

Ladakh boasts a multitude of distinctive features that set it apart. Renowned for its breathtaking landscapes, towering mountain passes, and an array of thrilling outdoor pursuits, it's an adventurer's haven. In this region, visitors revel in rafting along its rivers, scaling rock faces, and even indulging in ice climbing amidst the winter.

One of Ladakh's allure lies in its abundance of uncharted mountains, offering boundless opportunities for exhilarating adventures. Despite the occasional challenge in securing permissions due to its proximity to the Pakistan and China borders, the region offers a wealth of exploration. Adventurers can immerse themselves in activities such as trekking and mountaineering, especially in the Nubra, Zanskar, and Changthang regions.

With its expansive glaciers and an extensive range of outdoor pursuits, Ladakh emerges as a true paradise for outdoor enthusiasts.

Q. Brief us about the Ladakh Mountain Guide Association. What role does it play, and what contributions does it make to the region?

In Ladakh, our community of professional guides recognizes the necessity of implementing a structured policy. This policy aims to raise awareness about the pivotal role guides play in environmental conservation, youth education, and the promotion of high-quality tourism. In 2019, we established an association specifically designed to cater to local guides, prioritizing membership for them. Our primary objective was to elevate the standards and professionalism within the guiding profession.

We aspire to showcase that being a mountain guide is not only a passion but also a viable career choice, comparable to traditional professions like medicine or engineering. Additionally, our association, LMGA, annually organizes the Ice Climbing Festival, now gearing up for its 5th edition from February 2nd to 4th this year. Last year's festival saw the enthusiastic participation of approximately 700 students, and we eagerly anticipate hosting this event once more.

Unlike Nepal, Ladakh lacks life insurance policies tailored for guides. Therefore, as LMGA, we've taken the initiative to advocate for the introduction of such policies. Recognizing the importance of insurance coverage for guides, we are actively working to facilitate positive changes in this area, striving to ensure our guides have the necessary support and protection.

Q. What do you consider as the essential qualities or skills that aspiring mountaineers should possess to excel in their pursuits?
